

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Mingus Baptist Church at 2 p.m. for Prentice Albert Johnson who died Sunday at



TRACTOR TALK

Watch Gap When Installing Plugs When installing either new o used spark plugs, always make sure that the gaps on all plugs are adjusted to the proper setting. Correct gap setting is extremely important, since it influences the entire rage of engine performance -all the way from starting to top speed.

Gaps always should be adjusted with a feeler gauge made of round wire, since a flat gauge cannot possibly measure the curv-ed or arched contour which the electrodes assume as they gradually crode through use.

Incidentally, when servicing plugs always file both electrodes flat to insure peak sparking per-formance. Filing the center electrode can be accomplished by

bending the ground electrode slightly to allow room for the file. If gaps are set less than stand-ard, you may encounter misfir-ing at idle, uneven power and poor performance in general. Too wide a gap setting may cause poor performance at high speed, hard starting and coil strain.

In Texas Apprehension, not elation, is the dominant mood among top highway officials as the State of Texas observed National Highway Week last week. State Highway Engineer D. C.

Greer set the tone for the attitude of those in the Highway field toward Highway Week.

"It is not a week of appreciat-ion, but of challenge," Greer declared. "We are more concerned with future problems than with past accomplishments. Highway Week was not to brag about what we have done, but to focus public attention on the immense highway blems that now confront us." Highway Week was proclaimed nationally by President John F. Kennedy and in Texas by Gover-

nor Price Daniel. Citizens and I will groups interested in better highways are cooperating in the obserance of the week throughout

Texas. One of Texas most critical highway problems, Greer said, is the fact that more than one-third of the total State-maintained high way milage is obsolete-or about become obsolete by modern traffic standards. This is the 25,000-mile system of Primary Highways (U. S. and State Highways).

The Primary System is "almost totally antiquated by the enor-mous increase in traffic," he said. Texas now has passed the five million mark in motor vehicles and is adding them at the rate of about a million every three years. The Primary or "trunk" system of highways serves more than a thousand Texas cities and towns, but many of these routes were built years ago and are now in-


