



were supposedly initiating the freshmen students. The initiation—which should be a lot of fun for everyone involved-got out of hand in several instances in Ranger yesterday.

Many of the freshmen will carry scars for some time due to the brutal punishment they were forced to endure in the so-called initiation. These scars which are physical, will heal even quicker than some of the scars that the freshmen will carry in their mind from the immoral acts they were forced to do.


Some of the upper classmen even allowed outsiders who are not even in school, to participate in the unnecessary razing that took place.

Something that has been a tradition for a long time was killed yesterday. Never again will the initiating of freshmen be the same in Ranger. Already students who are of an age to be promoted into high school next year, are planning to miss their gradua-tion exercises in order to avoid the type of demonstrations that occurred yesterday.

Cars were seen speeding down the streets with freshmen on top, front and back, hanging on for their lives. One quick application of brakes would have meant injury and even death to those who were riding on the outside of the car. Freshmen were forced to run on the hot pavement, barefooted, until they had blisters and cuts on their feet and they could hardly walk. Many even had to see a doctor due to the injuries. Freshmen boys were stripped of their clothing and forced to run through briar patches and roll in sticker patches. They were even forced to run down public roads without their clothes.

Is this what you would call an initiation service? It seems more like the acts of brutal savages who had never heard of "love for fellowmen."

This was the freshman initiation yesterday. We hope that those involved in meting out the cruel and immoral acts realize what horrible fools they made of themselves.
