Bake in slow oven (325°F.) until done, about 30 minutes. Remove from pan at once; cool on wire rack. Sprinkle tops with confec-tioner's sugar. Freeze. Wrap in saran, individually or in the amount desired for one meal. Store in freezer. Yield: 24 squares.










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
