TOUGH TASK-A Lone Star Gas Company pipeline crew sets section of 18-inch natural

gas transmission pipeline in Brazos River b ed just south of Mineral Wells. The river cr ossing was one of the last steps in completion of the company's 52-mile pipeline which runs from Springtown to Gordon. Small pipes lining the trench are called "sand points" The "sand point" keep excess water pumped out of the trench. Pumps are operated on liquefied gas fueled engines. Dragline in background is extending the french across the river bed, a distance of about 750 feet.
