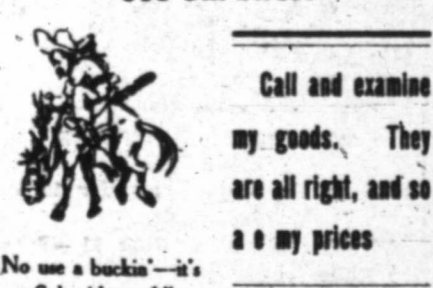

Balsac died at 51, a year younger than Napoleon, a physical wreck.
George Washington believed in plenty of sleep. He invariably withdrew from company at 10 o'clock, some member of the family coming in at that time to say, "Ladies and gentlemen, the General bids you all a very good night."
Early hardships and suffering like that at Valley Forge shortened his life, yet he lived to be 67, dying of an acute attack.
The fact is, we human clocks are so made we must be thoroughly wound up once in every twenty-four hours.
Shakespeare said that sleep "knits up the raveled sleeve of care," and that it is "nature's kind restorer."
One cannot burn the candle of life at both ends and expect to live. Yet that is precisely what is done when one filches from nature what is coming, whether by habit or by force of will or by stimulants.

Poor Richard was right when he said:

Curious Habits of Spiders.

The water spider carries air down with it when it dives. Dr. McCook saw one remain forty-five minutes under the water. One water spider builds a nest under the water attached to the stem of some plant and in the shape of a diving bell, with the opening downward. It fills this bell with air by taking down a bubble at a time. Coming to the surface, it incloses an air bubble under its body and instantly descends. Getting under the nest, the bubble is allowed to escape into it, and this process continues until the nest is full of air. The spider then lays its eggs there, inclosed in a cocoon, and leaves them to grow in this underwater palace, safe from all flying foes. When these water spiders are seen under water they look like little balls of shining silver. Little bubbles of air seem to cling among the hairs of their bodies. As spiders, like insects, breathe the air at little holes along the whole length of the body, they can easily make use of these bubbles of air for breathing.—London Standard.

Drinking Cups of the Ancients.

Silver cups made by such famous workmen as Myron, Myos and Mentor were preferred to gold cups. They were very beautifully engraved and of workmanship which has never been equalled. When gold cups were enriched with precious stones they sometimes became peers of the engraved silver vessels. Of all sizes, shapes and designs were these drinking cups, and their value was measured more by their form and design than the material of which they were made. Some had two handles, some only one and some none at all. They were large and small, low and tall, narrow and oblong. They were purely the product of the varying fancy of that prodigious age, which seemed to scorn uniformity. The early Greeks and Romans drank hot water from cups, as we now drink coffee and tea, these beverages being unknown to them. Coffee originated with the Assyrians, and tea was first used by the Chinese at a very early age.—National Food Magazine.

Curzon and Davitt.

Once in the house of commons, when George Curzon was making some defense as to alleged harsh treatment by Turks of Cretan prisoners, he was interrupted by a query from Mr. Davitt, "Were these prisoners handcuffed?" Quick as lightning came the reply, "Yes, and some honorable gentlemen ought to be no strangers to handcuffs." This was of course the signal for a violent parliamentary tempest. A day or two after Mr. Curzon went up to Swift MacNeill and expressed his sorrow at having used the expression and his desire to apologize for it in the most public manner. "Why," he said, "I thought the interruption came from you and that you, of course, would not mind. I was horrified when I discovered that it was Davitt who had made the remark. Of course I would not be capable of joking on the subject of imprisonment and handcuffs with a man who had endured nine long years of penal servitude."—London Globe.

Making Men's Hats.

Men's hats, stiff or soft alike, are made from the fur of the rabbit. A copper cone, whose very top is more or less the shape of the crown of a derby hat and whose sides are covered with minute holes, is revolved very swiftly over a suction fan. The fur is fed on to the cone, and the suction and the swift revolution draws this against the cone in the form of a fur cone very far in shape from the finished hat, but which rapidly becomes a finished hat by sizing, shrinking, shaping and trimming. Individual skill of a very high order counts for everything.—Argonaut.

News Forecast for the Coming Week.

Washington, D. C., July 31.—The Seattle exposition promises to be a center of great attraction during the week. Governor Hughes will be on hand Monday for the celebration of New York Day. Tuesday has been designated as Minnesota Day, which will be made notable by the unveiling of a bronze bust of James J. Hill. Governor Johnson of Minnesota will be one of the speakers. Another of the State executives who is expected to visit the exposition during the week is Governor Deneen of Illinois, who is to speak at the Illinois Day celebration on Friday.

President Taft and family have promised to go over to Gloucester from Beverly Wednesday to attend a big outdoor pageant to be given in the first-named city. Secretary of the Navy Meyer will also attend the affair. In the field of politics the most interesting event will be the general democratic primary in Virginia to choose candidates for governor and other State officers to be voted for at the November election. Public interest centers chiefly in the contest between Harry St. George Tucker and Judge William H. Mann for the gubernatorial nomination. As the campaign has progressed the contest between the two candidates has developed into an extremely bitter one and as a consequence the result of the primary is awaited with keen interest.

A referendum election will be held in Cleveland Tuesday to decide if the people will accept Mayor Tom L. Johnson's latest three-cent fare traction ordinance. The election marks the crisis in Mayor Johnson's eight years' effort to make his traction idea materialize. If the grant is voted down, many believe it will mean the complete elimination of the mayor as a figure in the traction question in Cleveland.

The event of the week abroad will be the visit of Emperor Nicholas of Russia to King Edward. The visit will take place at Cowes, where the Russian imperial yacht Standart will arrive Monday, the opening day of the Cowes regatta. Added brilliance will be attached to the meeting of the two rulers by the presence of the great fleet of British warships now gathered in the Solent to be reviewed by King Edward.

BRITISH NAVY REVIEWED
King Edward Looks Over the National Craft.
Portsmouth, July 31.—More than three hundred ships of the British navy, the largest assemblage of modern war craft ever seen under any one flag, in their gayest holiday dress, were reviewed by King Edward today, while hundreds of thousands, ashore and afloat, saw the brilliant spectacle. For Women and the Home.

You may cure a wasp sting by rubbing the place with a slice of raw onion.

Hot water, applied to a bleeding cut, will often stop the flow of blood very quickly.

Shaving magnesia is a good substitute for tannin powder, as it is harmless and does not adhere to the skin.

If a little carbonate of soda be mixed in the water, the flowers placed in it will keep for two or three weeks.

A rose potpourri may be made by packing fresh rose petals between alternate layers of salt and keeping the jar covered six months.

To remove rust from steel make a paste of fine powder and kerosene, rub on and let stand a little while. Then polish vigorously with a rag dipped in oil.

Never wear one pair of shoes day after day. Two pairs of shoes, worn alternately, will last longer than three pairs worn one after the other until worn out. Try it.

If the hands are stained with berries or from cleaning the various summer vegetables, rub them thoroughly with ripe tomatoes before using soap or anything that will tend to set the color.

Colored cotton fabrics will not fade by subsequent washing, if previously placed in boiling water to which has been added three gills of salt to every four quarts of water. Let it stand until cold.

Camphorated chalk is one of the best things for cleansing and rejuvenating white shoes. The preparation should be thoroughly mixed with a sufficient quantity of milk and applied to the shoes with a flannel cloth.

As a sanitary precaution in all basins and tubs, especially those connecting

with or near the sleeping apartments, the opening into the waste pipe should be kept closed at night and fresh water should be left standing in the basin.

A soft flannel cloth, dipped into warm soap-suds and then into whitening, will remove all grease and dirt from oil paint in half the time required by the old-time method, and will not in the least injure even the most delicate colors.

Any ordinary window can be made opaque at a trifling cost. Dissolve in a little quantity of hot water as much epsom salt as the water will take up. Then paint this solution over the inside of the glass. When it is dry it will resemble ground glass.

To destroy earwings on roses, dahlias, carnations and other flowers, place small inverted flower pots on stakes, or wind a piece of cotton wool dipped in oil round the stock of the rose tree, at ten inches from the ground, which quite prevents the pests from climbing above the wool. The inverted flower pots should be inspected twice a day and the insects hidden in them destroyed.

- Keep the flies away from the sick, especially those ill with contagious diseases. Kill every fly that strays into the sick room. His body is covered with disease germs.
- Do not allow decaying material of any sort to accumulate on or near your premises.
- All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding straw, paper waste and vegetable matter, should be disposed of or covered with lime or Kerosene oil.
- Screen all food, whether in the house or exposed for sale.
- Keep all receptacles for garbage carefully covered and the cans cleaned or sprinkled with oil or lime.
- Keep all stable manure in vault or pit, screened or sprinkled with lime, oil or other cheap preparations, such as are sold by a number of reliable manufacturers.
- See that your sewerage system is in good order; that it does not leak, is up to date and not exposed to flies.
- Pour kerosene into the drains.
- Burn or bury all table refuse.
- Screen all windows and doors, especially in the kitchen and dining room.
- If you see flies, you may be sure that their breeding place is in nearby filth. It may be behind the door, under the table or in the cuspidor.
- If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies.
- If there is a nuisance in the neighborhood write at once to the health department.

TO KILL FLIES:

The London "Lancet," the leading medical journal of the world, says that the best and simplest fly-killer is a weak solution formaldehyde in water (two teaspoonfuls to the pint). Place in plates or saucers throughout the house. Ten cents worth of formaldehyde will last an ordinary family all summer. It has no offensive smell, is fatal to disease organisms, and is practically non-poisonous except to insects. Pyrethrum powder, which may be bought at any drug store, burned in the house will also kill the flies.
