## NOBLEMAN JUGGED FOR INTOXICATION

### GALVESTON POLICEMAN ARRESTS BRITISH EARL, WHO SLEEPS IN JAIL.

## IDENTITY NOT LEARNED

### Had Accumulated Too Much of the Rum Which Perisheth—Paid Twenty Dollar Fine.

Galveston, Tex., Aug. 20.—His Grace,  
Sir Robert Burke, Earl of Amrah, a  
very rich and influential nobleman of  
Ireland, yesterday morning might have  
been seen adorning the mourner's  
bench in the corporation court here,  
where he was fined \$20. Until today  
the court was unaware that it had fined  
one of Great Britain's foremost peers.

The earl arrived here several days  
ago with a party of English cotton men  
being en route to Mexico to invest in  
some coffee plantations. The unfor-  
tunate nobleman spent Wednesday eve-  
ning with some friends at the Inter-  
national Club and when the meeting  
broke up, started for his hotel with  
about three sheets in the wind and the  
sidewalk all too narrow.

An ambitious policeman suspected  
the well-dressed inebriate of being  
connected with some of the recent bur-  
glaries in this city and gathering him  
under the fatherly protection of his  
arm, haled him to the police station,  
where he spent the night in a cell, just  
as if he were not colonel of His Maj-  
esty's Seventh Regiment of Hussars and  
a few other things besides. He plead  
guilty in the morning, having employ-  
ed an attorney to whom he confided  
the details of the situation.

His identity was not known until af-  
ter he had set sail for Vera Cruz. He  
is owner of a large Ireland estate and  
is a veteran of the Boer war.

## NEW MEXICO SOUTHPAW CAN PITCH GREAT BALL

Wichita Falls 6, Henrietta 0.  
Aue Alexander, a southpaw from New  
Mexico, was on the slab for Wichita in  
the game yesterday and he pitched four  
very pretty innings of baseball, show-  
ing himself one of the best ball hand-  
lers yet seen on the local diamond.  
He struck out nine men in the four  
innings and allowed but one hit.

Guthrie, who was not known to have  
pitching propensities, took Alexander's  
place in the fifth in order to give Hen-  
rietta a chance, but he declined to do  
so. He fanned four batters and yielded  
four hits in five innings, which is a  
good showing for a green pitcher.

The game was easy for the locals,  
Henrietta's errors letting in enough  
scores to tie the game up in the first  
inning with three scores. The visitors  
did not get a man to third until the  
ninth. In this inning they were robbed  
of a score by a very doubtful decision  
at the plate, in which the runner was  
safe, to all appearances. The visitors

bunch their bingles and their poor  
fielding hurt them badly.

### THIS SECTION WILL BE REPRE- SENTED AT OKLAHOMA CITY AND DALLAS.

## SEND CORN TO NEBRASKA

### Wichita's Grain May Be Shown at Na- tional Corn Show at Omaha in December.

Wichita county is to be represented  
by exhibits at the leading fairs of the  
Southwest this year and Secretary  
Gohlke of the Chamber of Commerce is  
making arrangement for having this  
section's products well displayed.  
Wichita county will be represented  
both at the State Fair of Texas at Dal-  
las and at the Oklahoma State Fair at  
Oklahoma City. If the dates can be  
conveniently arranged, an exhibit will  
also be sent to the International Fair  
at San Antonio.

The National Corn Fair is to be held  
at Omaha, Nebraska, in November and  
if a suitable exhibit of corn can be se-  
cured in Wichita county it will be sent  
to that event, with a view more of in-  
teresting home-seekers and investors  
than of competing with the expertly-  
raised corn of the older corn States.

The exhibiting of Wichita's products  
at the fairs will serve not only to ad-  
vertise Wichita Falls, but if Iowa Park,  
Burk Burnett, Electra, and other local-  
ities of this county will agree to help  
in getting up a suitable exhibit for the  
entire county, the benefits will be ma-  
terially increased. This suggestion has  
been made to those towns and it is  
expected that they will take advantage  
of it.

### GOVERNOR VEXED.

#### Thinks Taft Ought Not to Have Slight- ed Austin.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 20.—Gov. Camp-  
bell says he is vexed because Presi-  
dent Taft omitted the State capital  
from his Texas itinerary and says that  
because of this he is not likely to go  
out of his way to do especial honor to  
Taft, while the latter overlooks the  
State capital. The governor today ad-  
mitted that he had accepted the invita-  
tion to meet Taft at St. Louis and  
accompany the president down the  
river, providing he is able to leave  
Austin, but says now that he won't go.  
The governor also said that he has  
accepted an invitation to attend the  
Taft-Diaz meeting at El Paso and will  
go there, as he believes it his duty.

### ELECTRICAL STORM.

#### Louisiana's Heated Spell Broken With Fatal Results.

Alexandria, La., Aug. 20.—The heat  
wave, accompanied by a temperature  
of from ninety-five to a hundred and  
ten degrees was suddenly broken today  
by a severe electrical storm. Two peo-  
ple were killed, one was paralyzed and

### HEAVY TRADING.

## LABOR DAY IS TO BE OBSERVED HERE

### FIRST REGULAR CELEBRATION OF DAY IS NOW BEING AR- RANGED FOR.

## PLAN BIG PICNIC AT LAKE

### Central Labor Organization Puts Move- ment for the Celebration Un- der Way.

Wichita Falls' first regular Labor  
Day celebration will be held on Mon-  
day, September 6th, the union men of  
the city having gotten together for an  
elaborate observance of the occasion.  
At a recent meeting of the representa-  
tives of the unions, plans were put  
under way for a picnic and general cele-  
bration, to be modeled along the same  
lines as those held in other cities.

Wichita laboring men have never  
given Labor Day much attention and  
not a few of them have even worked  
on that day heretofore, but since the  
central labor organization is being per-  
fected, such practices will hardly be  
indulged in hereafter.

The lake will doubtless be decided  
upon as the place for the picnic and it  
is not unlikely that this feature of the  
celebration will be preceded by a civic  
parade, a feature which Wichita Falls  
has not had an opportunity of witness-  
ing in some time.

At the conference of the union rep-  
resentatives this week, plans were laid  
for a permanent central labor organiza-  
tion and the Labor Day celebration  
movement was one of the first results  
of the new organization. Committees  
have been appointed to take the affair  
in charge.

### PLAN CONSOLIDATION.

#### Formation of Big Leather Combine Now Seems Probable.

Trenton, N. J., Aug. 20.—The Central  
Leather Company of New Jersey, a  
corporation with a capital of eighty  
million dollars, today filed articles with  
the secretary of State, enlarging its  
charter powers, authorizing it to ac-  
quire the stock and securities belong-  
ing to other corporations. The move is  
said to be intended to facilitate the  
consolidation of the Central Leather  
Company and the United States Leath-  
er Company.

### POLITICIAN-PIONEER DEAD.

#### Judge John Dean of Marfa Dies in Chi- cago.

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 20.—Judge John  
N. Dean, former district attorney of  
El Paso, a former State senator, once  
a candidate for congress from this dis-  
trict and owner of practically the en-  
tire town of Marfa, died this morning  
in Chicago. The deceased drove a  
stage into El Paso half a century ago  
and fought Indians to get there.

### PACKAGE OF JEWELS LOST.

#### Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars Worth Missing in New York.

jewelry said to be worth considerably  
more than \$25,000, in charge of an em-  
ploye of a Fifth avenue firm of jew-  
elers, was lost recently on the Erie  
railroad ferry boat and a reward of five

age contained a diamond tiara, a brooch,  
a diamond studded watch and a  
large emerald.

## MILLION DOLLAR BAD MONEY DEAL

### COUNTERFEITERS HAD FAKED AN ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF MEX- ICAN MONEY IN KENTUCKY.

## FAILED TO KEEP QUIET

### Talked Too Much and Gave the Game Away, Being Arrested With the Money in Their Possession.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 20.—With the  
exception of the negro drayman who  
hailed the bogus hundred-peso Mexi-  
can notes to this city, the police have  
put behind the bars all those supposed  
to be connected with the million dollar  
counterfeit enterprise, unearthed in  
Kentucky yesterday. John Roberts,  
Marion Roberts, Nannie Harp, Marion's  
housekeeper, and Will Koenig, who  
confessed to printing the notes, were  
all arrested. Koenig and Mrs. Harp  
were released later. The Roberts  
brothers are in duress under a fifteen  
thousand dollar federal bond each, and  
John announced he would plead guilty  
in the Federal court.

The arrest of the counterfeiters was  
accomplished in Shelby county by De-  
puty United States Marshal Baylades, on  
information by W. G. Osborne of Fetter  
& Company, brokers, to whom the  
counterfeiters made a proposition for  
the disposition of the bogus notes. In  
a statement to the press today, Os-  
borne said that Marion Roberts told  
him the headquarters of the gang were  
on Wall street, New York.

### TWO NEW ADDITIONS.

#### New Tracts of Land to Be Opened to Wichitans.

It is learned that two new additions  
are to be thrown open within the next  
few months, one being east of the city,

## ATTEMPTING TO LOWER AUTOMOBILE RECORDS

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 20.—The sec-  
ond day of the auto speed carnival on  
the motor speedway here opened with  
the five mile race today. The event  
which attracted the motorists' atten-  
tion was the trial to lower the world's  
track record for the mile and kilometer.

The bodies of Berque and Holcombe,  
who were killed in the two hundred and  
fifty mile race yesterday, were taken  
east today.

Strang, in a Buick, won the five mile  
race today in four minutes and forty-  
eight seconds.

Berque and Holcombe, the driver and  
mechanic, respectively, of the Knox  
car, were in second place at about the  
150th mile of the 250 mile run, when  
the fatal accident took place. The car  
was coming down the home stretch  
when it suddenly swerved from the  
track into the left fence, turning turtle  
with the occupants underneath. They  
were taken out alive, but died very  
shortly. Both were unmarried.

As a result of the accident the  
American Automobile Association has  
issued an ultimatum to the manage-  
ment of the track that all the danger-  
ous ruts must be removed and that the  
entire surface must be tarred and oiled.  
Barney Oldfield covered a mile in  
forty-three seconds, falling by one-tenth  
of a second to equal yesterday's rec-  
ord.

## POLITICS AND THE WEST TEXAS NORMAL.

The Baylor County Banner is very sore because Seymour's claim for the West Texas Normal was not thought enough to induce the commission to visit that place and investigate the proposition. The Banner says Seymour offered a bonus aggregating a cash value of at least \$90,000, and charges that politics will have more to do with the picking of a location for this school than bonuses or natural advantages. The Banner says:

The normal is lost to us. There is not much use now in advertising the fact that we did not even get a hearing, but there is a thing or two we want to say before the issue is closed. The locating committee announced that they would eliminate a number of towns before starting on their inspection trip. It was believed that many towns would be dropped there. However, just six towns were dropped. If no larger number than that was to have been left out then the whole business ought to have been visited. However, no kick is raised on our part by the elimination of a small number of towns. The thing that galls us is the manifest injustice done this place in not giving us a hearing.

Whatever explanation may be offered it is safe to say politics was back of the whole business. Bonus, nor location, nor anything is going to locate the normal but politics, and evidently we couldn't put up the necessary "pull." There is not much more to be said, but that much is to the point. These people are out for politics, so let's give them all we have. If either Superintendent of Public Instruction R. B. Cousins, Lieutenant Governor A. B. Davidson or Speaker of the House John Marshall shall again assay to an office in the grand State of Texas then let them have in the neck all the politics that Baylor county has. In other words, let us black their names so black that the counters cannot tell whose names are printed there.

Seymour and Baylor county are sore over this business. They are not going to ache around much, but we are going to do something else now. We believe the Banner voices the sentiment of our people on this subject and this is all we have got to say. Except when the time comes when any of these men want politics the Banner agrees to especially remind them of their action in this normal matter.

The State public school apportionment has been made, which shows that each child in Texas within the scholastic age, without regard to race, is entitled to and will receive out of the State public school fund for the school term of 1909-10 the sum of \$6.25, which is a decrease of 50 cents from last year. This decrease comes principally from the fact that the rolls show there were 34,537 more school children enumerated this year than last, the totals being \$14,358 for the year 1908, as against \$48,944 for the year 1909.

When the day comes, as suggested by the New York Sun, when gigantic magaphones shall replace newspapers, there is a certain moving picture speller in Wichita Falls we would like to suggest for the job.

## WALTER WELLMAN AND THE POLE.

Recent dispatches announce that Walter Wellman has started on his trip to discover the North Pole, setting out from Spitzbergen, or some other equally euphonious Swedish place, in a balloon.

North polling is not as popular a diversion as it used to be. Time was when it was a dull day upon which nobody started out to bring it back and the roads in that direction were thick with would-be discoverers. Some of them came back and some of them didn't, but all got plenty of free advertising, which, of course, is not to be sneered at.

Just what Walter will do with the pole when he gets it is not understood. We cannot see how one pole will alleviate the lumber shortage, which, natural resource conversationists assure us, is about due and, even if it would, it isn't worth the trouble. ### RYAN'S BIRTHDAY.

Philadelphia Archbishop's Anniversary  
 Appropriately Observed.  
 Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 20.—Many  
 congratulations were received today at  
 the residence of the Most Rev. Patrick  
 J. Ryan to remind him that the day  
 marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of  
 his entrance upon his duties as Arch-  
 bishop of Philadelphia. An elaborate  
 celebration of the event had been pro-  
 posed, but at the special request of the  
 Archbishop the plan was abandoned  
 and the only observance was a low  
 mass of thanksgiving, which was cele-  
 brated this morning in the Cathedral of  
 St. Peter and St. Paul.  
 Archbishop Ryan, who, during his  
 twenty-five years residence in Phila-  
 delphia has endeared himself to many  
 thousands of Protestants, as well as to  
 the Roman Catholics of the city, came  
 here from St. Louis in 1884. He was  
 born in 1831, near Thurles, Tipperary  
 county, Ireland, and attended a  
 private school at Dublin until 16 years  
 old. He then entered Carlow College,  
 where he received his ecclesiastical  
 training and was ordained sub-deacon.  
 In 1852 he left Ireland for the United  
 States and became connected with the  
 archdiocese of St. Louis, where he re-  
 mained until his appointment in 1884  
 as the successor of the late Archbishop  
 Wood of Philadelphia.

Since he came to Philadelphia, Arch-  
 bishop Ryan's church labors and public  
 addresses and acts have brought him  
 wide renown. He was the preacher at  
 the dedication of the Cathedral in New  
 York; also when the pallium was bestow-  
 ed upon Archbishop Corrigan. When  
 Cardinal Gibbons received the red hat  
 it was Archbishop Ryan who delivered  
 the oration. He also delivered  
 the address to Pope Leo XIII, when a  
 copy of the constitution of the United  
 States was given to him by President  
 Cleveland.

Few persons outside of clerical circles  
 are aware that the Archbishop is  
 nearing his eightieth year, as he is  
 hale and hearty and has scarcely a  
 gray hair in his head. He attributes  
 his good health to his regular habits of  
 living and to his daily walks. No mat-  
 ter what the weather he seldom fails  
 to take a walk of several miles each  
 afternoon.

### INDIANA CELEBRATES.

Jubilee of Indiana Labor Federation is  
 Observed.  
 South Bend, Ind., Aug. 20.—The first  
 silver jubilee of a State labor organiza-  
 tion will be held in this city next  
 month, when the Indiana Federation of  
 Labor will meet to celebrate its twenty-  
 fifth anniversary. The Indiana fed-  
 eration is the oldest in the United  
 States. The celebration will be held in  
 conjunction with the federation's an-  
 nual convention and will extend over  
 a period of three days.

 the meeting, but due attention will be  
 given to the pleasure of the visitors.  
 One of the features of the program  
 will be a banquet, the speakers to in-  
 clude officers of many national and in-  
 ternational labor bodies, as well as  
 prominent members of the State or-

 visitors will be welcomed by Mayor E.  
 J. Fogarty and F. A. Miller, president  
 of the South Bend Chamber of Com-  
 merce.

#### IOWA PARK'S OFFER.

Citizen Writes Letter to Keep the Record Straight.

To the Wichita Times:—  
 The fact that many of our citizens, both in your city and over the county, do understand just what Iowa Park did offer for the Normal college, I send you herewith the clause in our bid which covers the financial side of the proposition.

We regret having lost out, but trust your good city will yet win the prize and it will be 'our'n' still.

'As further evidence of the fitness of our people to have such a school in their midst, they are offering about \$65 per capita, which, perhaps, is the largest offer in the State in proportion to population. As a further consideration, we offer to build the president's home, furnish the steam heating plant for the college, build sidewalks and make such other improvements as may be needed, not to exceed in total cost to us Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars.

'Further, we offer forty acres of land, and should the board decide that twenty acres of land would be sufficient for all college purposes, we obligate ourselves to buy the remaining twenty acres, and pay for same the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars in cash, thus making in fact a donation valued as follows:

Forty acres of land.....\$40,000  
 Improvements in cash..... 25,000

#### 'This is My 49th Birthday.'

Otto H. Tittmann, the famous geodesist, who is the United States representative on the international commission to resurvey the boundary line between the United States and Canada, was born in Belleville, Illinois, August 20, 1859, and received his education in the public schools of St. Louis. In 1867 he joined the United States coast and geodetic survey. In 1874 he was assistant astronomer to the Transit of Venus expedition to Japan and since that time he has engaged in numerous surveying expeditions on both the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts of the United States. He was sent to Paris in 1890 to bring to the United States the national standard metre and to inspect the weights and measures offices in London, Paris and other capitals of Europe. Prof. Tittmann also represented the United States at the International Geodetic Conference held in Berlin in 1895, and four years later he represented the United States in the demarkation of the boundary between Alaska and Canada. In 1900 he was appointed superintendent of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey office.
