## PRIVATE FUNERAL ON NEXT SUNDAY

STOCK MARKET SEEMED BRACED FOR SHOCK—TALK OF PROBABLE SUCCESSOR.

## CANCER CAUSE OF DEATH

Such is Specialist's Opinion—Plans For Funeral Rather Out of the Ordinary.

New York, Sept. 10.—Harriman's funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at Arden, strictly private. The family decided not to hold an autopsy. The exact cause of death will probably never be known. It is said to be cancer, but it is known that the financier had a malady of the digestive organs.

The general opinion in financial circles this morning, was that the business world was prepared for the shock of the death and no apprehension is felt for the security of Harriman's interests.

Cablegrams from London and Berlin indicate that the stock markets are not affected by the news. American securities are remaining firm.

Vienna, Sept. 10.—Prof. Adolf Strempell, the great specialist, who was consulted recently by Harriman, says he diagnosed the complaint as cancer.

Arden, N. Y., Sept. 10.—Rev. J. Holmes McGuinness will conduct Harriman's funeral from St. John's Episcopal church. The pall bearers will be six men in charge of the various departments of the estate.

The body will rest in a grave blasted from the solid rock on the hillside.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 10.—There is much speculation as to the probable successor of E. H. Harriman. It is believed it will either be R. S. Lovett, General Counsel of the Southern and Union Pacific; Julius Kruttschnitt, in charge of property and operation, or J. C. Stubbs, in charge of traffic affairs.

## NEW UNION STATION.

Thirty Million Dollar Structure for Kansas City Assured.

Kansas City, Sept. 10.—An affirmative vote yesterday on the franchise ordinance demanding a new union station, means that thirty million dollars in improvements jointly by the railroads entering the city will be expended.

The new station will be the most costly one in the country, owing to the disadvantageous location with elevated entrances. The Pennsylvania station in Washington City, though more elaborate, cost only twenty eight million dollars.

## JOHNSON HAMMERED KAUFMAN.

## OFFICIALLY NOTIFIED OF HARRIMAN'S DEATH

T. Van Brunt, general manager of the Wichita Traction Company, was formally notified yesterday afternoon of the death of E. H. Harriman, at Arden, New York. Mr. Van Brunt was for over twenty years intimately connected with a severe shock to him. He sent his interests and stood very close to the financier. News of the death comes as a severe shock to him. He sent his condolences to the bereaved family.

## RATE WAR ENDS.

Mallory Line Advances Tariffs to Equal Those of Morgan.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 10.—The Mallory Steamship Company has ended the coastwise steamship war.

J. B. Denison, general agent for the Mallory Company, today confirms the report and an increase in coastwise rates is effective on September 15th which places the rate advantages on a level with the Morgan Company. Denison says the action was caused by the flood of business at low rates.

## BURNING OIL CAUSES ALARM.

Fire Department Responds to Call Near Water and Light Plant.

An alarm was turned in from the water and light plant at 7:45 this afternoon, some burning oil on the railroad switch near there being the cause. The fire department responded and the fire was placed under control with little difficulty.

## NO TRACE FOUND.

Detroit, Sept. 10.—The authorities are still searching for evidence on the murder of Maybelle Millman. There seems to be no doubt that the girl met death on a surgeon's table.

## MALAKOFF BANK ROBBED SUM OF \$2500 SECURED

Corvallis, Ore., Sept. 10.—The Farmers' and Merchants' Bank at Malakoff, twenty miles east of here, on the Cotton Belt railroad, was entered by robbers at 3 o'clock this morning. They dynamited the safe, obtained two thousand, five hundred dollars and made good their escape.

The officers have requested bloodhounds to trace the cracksmen, but the dogs are being used elsewhere. There is absolutely no clue left. The authorities are puzzled.

## THREE BURNED TO DEATH.

Fatal Results of Residence Fire Near St. Paul.

St. Paul, Sept. 10.—Three children were burned to death and two others and the father, Robert A. Walsh seriously burned early today when fire destroyed the summer cottage of the Walsh family near White Bear Lake.

Robert Osborne, the son of one of the leading families at Thornbury, died yesterday from lung trouble. The funeral takes place this afternoon.

## RUMORS ABOUT VALLEY LACKING CONFIRMATION

Confirmation of the rumor which found lodgment in the Times recently, that Wichita Falls is to lose the Valley offices, is lacking and it is by no means a settled fact that they will be removed from this city, despite the persistent report to that effect. It now seems to be very doubtful whether it will take place. It is possible that the superintendent's office will be removed to Stamford, but not so far as is known, the management of the road has never seriously contemplated moving the general offices as a whole.

It is safe to say that if the offices are removed, it will not be until Wichita Falls has made a strenuous effort to retain them. This city is not in the habit of giving up things without making a noise about it.

## PEARY WILL BEAT COOK TO AMERICA

WILL HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO SUBMIT HIS PROOFS BEFORE OTHER'S ARRIVAL.

## HE IS EXPECTED SHORTLY

Newspaper Men and Other Set Out to Meet Him—Receptions are Planned.

New York, Sept. 10.—It is now believed that Peary will reach New York a week in advance of Cook, who sails tomorrow from Copenhagen, thus giving Peary the advantage of being the first to submit his proofs of reaching the pole in America. The Steamer Roosevelt is expected to reach Sydney tomorrow.

The explorer will come directly to New York.

A ship carrying officials and newspaper men left Sydney today in search of Peary.

Cook's expedition to bring back the Eskimos leaves next spring for Greenland, and it may be a year before he can submit his proofs. A big reception is planned for his arrival here on September 21st.

Copenhagen, Sept. 10.—Cook left here today for Christiansand, where he will board the Steamer Oscar II, for New York. A large crowd bade him farewell.

## MYSTERY STILL UNSOLVED.

Death of Scott Sprague is Still Unexplained.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 10.—Mystery still surrounds the death of Scott Sprague, who was shot and killed in his room early yesterday morning in the presence of his wife. Sprague told the lawyers several days ago that he feared death at any time. He had a mortgage drawn in favor of his mother. His wife is still unable to explain the shooting.

## STATE MAKES CHANGE.

## Life Story of E. H. Harriman

Edward Henry Harriman, who will go down in history as one of the most spectacular financial geniuses, most daring stock speculators and greatest railroad magnates of his time, was born at Hempstead, Long Island, February 25, 1848; the son of the Rev. Orlando Harriman, Jr., rector of an Episcopal church in that town, founded in 1702. The early life of the future man of millions was one of great poverty. His father was a cultured but poor man, his mother came from an old and aristocratic, but equally impetuous family of New Brunswick, N. J. The Rev. Orlando Harriman, Jr., had a large family, consisting of four boys and two girls and his income was altogether inadequate to feed, clothe, and educate his children. In 1855, when Edward Henry Harri-

## AUTO FIRE ENGINE IS AGITATED AGAIN

DECISION WILL PROBABLY BE REACHED WITHIN NEXT FEW DAYS.

## WILL COST ABOUT \$7,500

Half of Expense To Be Borne By City and Half By Property Owners. Many Favor It.

Within the next few days, probably tomorrow, the question of an auto fire engine in Wichita Falls will be settled, and the deal consummated or the matter dropped for good. A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce directors will be held tomorrow morning to decide whether or not it is advisable to make the purchase at this time, as half of the purchase money is to be subscribed by property owners.

A representative of one of the leading auto engine companies is now in the city and offers to furnish an auto engine of the kind desired by the department for \$7,500. It is proposed that the property owners raise half of this amount and that the remainder be appropriated by the city council. An engine similar to the one desired for this city, is now in use at Big Springs, and a local committee will probably see it at work before any final decision is reached for Wichita Falls. It is believed that the purchase of such modern equipment would not only render the department more efficient, but would result in an eventual saving to the city's finances that would be very material. The Webb Motor Fire Appliance Company has a representative here now, but other companies are in the local field.

There seems to be considerable sentiment here in favor of the purchase and there is every reason to believe that the decision will be in favor of buying the equipment, as the need for better fire-fighting apparatus has been emphasized of late.

## BOMB IS PUZZLING.

When it was exploded by the officials in the country, the explosion sent out burning grease for thirty feet around the bomb.

## THREE HELD FOR KILLING.

Sherman, Tex., Sept. 10.—Albert Collins, who was found in a cabin at Preston Bend last Tuesday, with his skull fractured, died last night in the sanitarium here. The grand jury is in session, investigating charges against Jeff and Jack Daniels and Duke Stanley. They were held on suspicion until today, when they were formally charged with the killing.

## FORT WORTH HERE TOMORROW.

Last Game of Season Will Be The Best Ones.

Wichita fans will be enabled to see three of the best games of the season on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, when the Texas League team from Fort Worth will be here for a series. That the leaguers will outplay the locals is admitted, but the latter hope to show that they can stack up well against the professionals.

## Excellent Chance for Recovery.

Jack Chandler, who was kicked in the head by a horse last Tuesday and who has been very near death as a result, now has an even break for recovery, according to Dr. DuVal. He believes that the boy will survive the injury.

## FARMER AND HIS BOY SHOT BY RANGERS

Grovetown, Tex., Sept. 10.—State Rangers White and Averitt were released here today on bonds of twenty-five hundred dollars each following the killing of W. E. Collins here yesterday and the wounding of his seventeen-year-old son, Samuel, who will recover. Captain Rogers of the State Ranger force arrived today. There is no talk of violence, although the affair is deplored by the citizens.

The shooting occurred early yesterday morning and was committed through an error. A posse, including the two rangers, were looking for Ed Chandler, who broke out of the Woodville jail several days ago. The searching party had separated into two sections, one consisting of Deputy Evans and the rangers. This party ran across Collins and his boy who were armed, having been out hunting some animal that had been in their hen roost. The officers' command to throw away their guns was not complied with and the shooting followed. The hasty action of the officers, in shooting before they had ascertained the identity of their targets, is the subject of much adverse comment.

## BRYAN BRAVES FLOODS IN BROWNSVILLE PARTS

Corpus Christ, Tex., Sept. 10.—W. J. Bryan, en route to his ranch at Mission, refused to be stopped by the Texas floods, and today is rushing wildly to the ranch in a powerful automobile. Friends endeavored to induce him to spend the day here fishing, but he refused, preferring to face the flood situation.

General Manager Rogers of the St. Louis and Brownsville Railroad, in a special carried the Nebraskan a short distance until stopped by the water. The automobile was then used.

Bryan and Taft are both invited to attend the waterways congress here on October 22nd and 23rd. Bryan has accepted. Even though Taft declines, both men will be in South Texas as Taft visits his ranch in October.

## REFUSE TO ABROGATE.

Federal Live Stock Inspector Insists On Six Months' Rule.

Leslie Allen of Oklahoma City, federal live stock inspector, at a meeting of the West Texas Cattlemen and the State Sanitary Board here today, refused to modify or abrogate the 'six months rule,' which the cattlemen declare is hurting their business. The cattlemen will carry the dispute to the secretary of agriculture's department.

## WORK IS STARTED ON GLOVE FACTORY

NEW ENTERPRISE WILL SHORTLY BE IN OPERATION IN WICHITA FALLS.

## BUILDING IS UNDER WAY

Industry Will Begin With About Twenty-Five Hands. To Make Staple Goods.

Work was started yesterday on the building for the glove factory which is shortly to be added to Wichita Falls' list of industries. The building is on Ohio avenue near the city hall and work on the foundations is already under way. Will Skeen and M. Kell are the moving spirits in the new enterprise.

The building will be twenty-five by forty feet in dimensions, one story to begin with. It will be so constructed, however, that a second story can be added without endangering the lower story, and it is proposed to add the second story as soon as the business justifies it.

The factory will employ twenty-five or thirty hands to begin with and the monthly payroll will amount to about two thousand dollars a month. The working force will be gradually increased and the building is constructed to furnish employment for sixty or seventy hands, though so large a force will not be employed at first. The output of the plant will be mostly work gloves, of a staple variety, and there is a large demand for this class of goods which presages success for the new enterprise. The factory will be in operation by the first of next year.

## TO NAME SUCCESSOR.

Meeting of Union Pacific Executive Committee Next Tuesday.

New York, Sept. 10.—The Executive Committee of the Union Pacific will meet next Tuesday to arrange a temporary successor to the position held by Harriman. It is believed that the powers of Traffic Director Kruttschnitt and Traffic Director Stubbs will be greatly increased. Kuhne Loeb, of the National City Bank, is expected to continue as financial agent for the Harriman interests. The following statement was issued at the Union Pacific offices today:

The report published today that Harriman died at 1:30 p. m. is absolutely untrue. He died at 3:25, as announced at Arden and at 120 Broadway immediately. Mrs. Simons did not arrive until after his death. They authorized me to deny that she intended to make a statement fixing the time. W. G. LYLE.

## FAVOR BETTER SCHOOLS.

## LIFESTORY OF E. H. HARRIMAN

(Continued from Page 1.)

and supplemented it by a two years' course in a boys' school under church auspices, where the sons of clergymen paid practically nothing for their education. Edwards' oldest brother, John Nelson and his youngest brother, William McCurdy, died some years ago. His second brother, Orlando, became a real estate dealer in Brooklyn. Lilly, one of the sisters, became the wife of Charles D. Simmons of Brown Brothers & Co., of New York and Annie, the other sister, married a Van Rensselaer, of the old and aristocratic family of that name in New York. The father died in April, 1881, at Jacksonville, surrounded by all the comforts that wealth could procure. He was but 68 years old at the time of his death and had suffered much for nearly twenty years.

Edward Henry Harriman began his career as clerk in a broker office on Wall street. He showed no unusual ability and for many years gave no promise of his latter brilliant development. Socially he was well liked and those who knew him at that time described him as a sociable young man, always full of fun. He was noted, however, for a mind of his own. What he wanted he generally obtained, but his desires and ambitions were at that time at least neither very sweeping nor particularly important.

How he obtained his start and the funds which enabled him to buy a seat on the New York Stock Exchange, has never been clearly explained. The most widely accepted explanation, however, was to the effect that during the famous "gold corner" engineered by Gould, Fisk, Nimber and others, Edward H. Harriman plunged with all his own money and some borrowed from his brother Orlando and cleared enough to buy for himself in August, 1870 a seat on the New York Stock Exchange.

Young Harriman married in early life and married very well. His wife was Miss Mary Averell of Rochester, N. Y., whose father was a capitalist and a successful railroad man. He was said to have made a large amount of money in the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad. This marriage considerably strengthened the hands of young Harriman for the battle of life. It was in every way a very fortunate and happy alliance.

For a number of years the broker firm of E. H. Harriman & Co. did a thriving business on Wall street, speculating with its own funds and executing commissions for the Vanderbilts and other wealthy clients. It was not until 1883 that E. H. Harriman came actively into the railroad field. At that time he had become known as a capitalist, one of the few who had gathered together a great fortune in ten troubled years between 1870 and 1880. He was credited with having in his strong box a fair list of stocks he had picked up at extremely low prices during the various panics. Along in 1883 he was elected a director of the Illinois Central Railroad. He was at that time working in close friendship with Stuyvesant Fish, who was elected second vice president in the same year. Mr. Fish had also been a member of the Stock Exchange from 1876 to 1879, and the two young men went into the Illinois Central to work along together. In 1887 Mr. Harriman became vice president and Mr. Fish was elected president. Mr. Harriman was then about forty years old. Whether Mr. Harriman entered the railroad field in accordance with an already matured plan of his or whether his accidental acquaintance with railroad matters suggested to him the enormous possibilities of acquiring the control of large railroad systems, is not definitely known. At all events, Mr. Harriman's entry into the directorate of the Illinois Central Railroad marked the beginning of his career as a manipulator of railroad stocks and reorganizer of railroad systems which, in the course of ten or fifteen years made him one of the greatest railroad kings ever known in the United States and placed him in control of more than 54,000 miles of water transportation lines and of railroad lines of an estimated length of nearly 27,000 miles.

During the panic preceding the election of President McKinley a number of large western railroads had gone to smash, among them the Northern Pacific and the Union Pacific. The wreck of the latter was particularly bad and seemed perfectly hopeless. A Morgan syndicate made an attempt to rescue the road, but gave up the plan in sheer disgust. But Harriman never lost his confidence. He formed a mixed syndicate, backed by Kuhn, Loeb & Co., of New York and including two members of the Vanderbilt faction, two of Goulds, and two of the Boston crowd that had sunk millions in the old Union Pacific and several independent capitalists, among them Harriman. The road was merely a line from Omaha to Ogden, about 1800 miles long. The syndicate paid the government \$58,000,000 in cash and \$27,000,000 to settle with the holders of the old first mortgage bonds. The road was turned

over to the syndicate at midnight on the last day of January 1898.

The same syndicate purchased for \$3,000,000 a block of coal company bonds and other railroad bonds and in the following month a group of branch lines, called the Kansas Pacific, for \$6,303,000. That was the last dollar ever subscribed by the syndicate for the creation of the great Harriman system. The members of the syndicate received back every cent they had invested within three years and all the subsequent purchases of railroads were made on the credit of the Union Pacific and the few other lines under its control.

Harriman soon became the controlling spirit of the Union Pacific and by stringent economy, cutting off all waste and improving the main line, transformed the road into valuable property paying steadily increasing dividends. He cleverly used the credit of this road for acquiring, without spending a single dollar the control of one railroad after the other. The first railroad thus absorbed was the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, whose stockholders were induced to exchange their stocks for Union Pacific stock.

In the summer of 1899 Mr. Harriman temporarily dropped his financial schemes and took a scientific exploring expedition to Alaska, which he had fitted out at his own expense. The following year he bought the Kansas City & Alton which he had acquired in the early spring of 1899. Next came the Southern Pacific, which became part of the Harriman system on February 1, 1901. The credit of the Union Pacific was used to accomplish the absorption. The Union Pacific executed a mortgage for \$100,000,000 and sold \$40,000,000 of bonds at par, thus paying for the stock of the Southern Pacific.

When Harriman tried to obtain control of the Burlington railroad and the Morgan interests snapped it away from him, buying it for the Northern Pacific. Harriman became determined to obtain control of the Northern Pacific. This led to a bitter fight between the Harriman and the Morgan-Hill interests and caused the panic of May 9, 1901. This was one of the few cases in which Harriman did not succeed in carrying out his plans. He fought hard and went to law to force the Northern Security Company, declared illegal by the Supreme Court, to return to him the Union Pacific stock he had turned over to the Morgan-Hill clique for the Northern Security stock, but in the end he had to take what Mr. Hill was willing to give him.

In the following years Harriman continued the extension of his system toward the East and South. He acquired control of the Illinois Central railroad, ousting his former friend Stuyvesant Fish from the presidency, obtained a strong hold over the St. Joseph and Grand Island by using the credit of the Union Pacific and through the Oregon Shortline he obtained interests in the Chicago and Northwestern, the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe, the Baltimore and Ohio, the Milwaukee and St. Paul, the New York Life Assurance Society and other insurance companies placed him in control of property valued at more than \$1,000,000,000 and one of the most dangerous rivals of John D. Rockefeller, J. P. Morgan and James J. Hill, as well as a political power, particularly in the West.

## REAL RANCH LIFE TO BE PORTRAYED BY MILLERS

Announcement was made today of the appearance in this city on Sept. 24, of the 101 Ranch Wild West Show, which is probably the most remarkable traveling tented amusement organization of the country. Every member of it is a resident of the 100,000 acres of prairie the Miller's own and operate at Bliss, Okla. One of the advance representatives characterizes it as the 101 Ranch transported in miniature for a day to this city.

The Millers are undoubtedly the most famous cattlemen of the great southwest. There are three of them and they started with a homestead allotment of 160 acres when the Cherokee strip was opened to settlement. Cattle and horses roam the fertile acres in thousands, and the Millers buy and sell by the train load. The small farmer may till his quarter-section in Oklahoma, but the 102 Ranch remains unencroached upon. Here remain the wild buffalo, the cowboy and the cowgirl in their pristine glory, and here the Indian still smokes, undisturbed in tepee, but or possibly rough lodges of skins.

The show which is coming to this city is an amplified version of the one which broke all records in patronage and popularity last year. Joseph C. Miller, senior of the three brothers is in personal active charge. He promises that patrons will witness a tournament that departs absolutely from the familiar, tedious routine of the so-called "Wild West" exhibitions. Its home and its origin are the Oklahoma prairies. Every person and feature is real, vital and characteristic. The performers are not professionals, but men, women and children on a "lark" from the 101 Ranch. Every name is known on the ranches of the southwest for skill or daring in avocations of the range. Buffaloes, steers, bucking saddle horses and cowponies belong on the 101 Ranch, and every champion of the lariat, sharpshooter, cowgirl, cowboy, trick rider and other participants is permanently on the payroll of the 101 Ranch. A herd of gaunt, long horned western steers is a fantastic feature. There are more than one hundred Indians, many of them fresh from the wigwams of the tribes who have their homes on the 101 Ranch land. Renowned chieftains and warriors, squaws, papooses and Indian belles and beauties are among them. They are making their first acquaintance with paleface civilization.

Performances will be given here afternoon and evening and the enterprise will introduce itself in the forenoon with a street parade which is unique in the annals of outdoor pageants. It stretches more than a mile in length and the romance and adventure and fanciful spirit of the actual west pervail throughout.

NEW FREIGHT RATES.

Railroad Commission Authorizes Changes On Wichita Valley. The following order recently issued by the Railroad Commission at Austin will be of interest to shippers in this section:

In the application of freight rates adopted or approved by this commission all classes and commodities transported between points on the Wichita Valley railway west of Stamford (Stamford and Northwestern railway), on the one end, and points on other portions of the Wichita Valley lines or on the Fort Worth and Denver City railway on the other, shall be subject to rates prescribed or approved for joint line application.

The commission also made the following rates as amendments to the cotton tariff:

Wichita Valley railway.—Cotton in bales from stations west of Stamford shall be as follows:

To Houston.—From Aspermont, Gowry and Alluvia, 54 cents; from Jayton, Girard, Sterley and Spur, 59 cents per 100 pounds. To Galveston.—From Aspermont, Gowry, and Alluvia, 60 cents; from Jayton, Girard, Sterley and Spur, 65 cents per 100 pounds.

The Wichita Valley line west of Stamford, known as the Stamford and Northwestern was added to the list of differential lines in the grain tariff by the commission.

Nature Sometimes Makes Mummies. Natural mummification, the changing of the human body into a dried condition without artificial treatment, is an extremely rare phenomenon. In a case reported by Hon. S. Wolfsohn of British Honduras, a middle aged cooly who disappeared between January and March, 1907, was found more than a year afterward, on May 6, 1908, in a corrugated iron hut as a perfectly preserved mummy. The hut, in a somewhat isolated spot at Sibun, was raised on blocks four or five feet above the ground and had a door and three shutters, one shutter being open, while one had fallen out. The body was clothed in a cotton-undershirt, dark jersey and duck trousers, two pieces of rope around the neck proving self strangulation. The desiccation seemed to have been favored by a combination of conditions, the season having been extraordinarily dry and the small iron house excessively hot, though well ventilated, while the body was thin and attenuated as a result of mental disorder.
