BAILEY TO SPEAK AT WICHITA FALLS

HAS PROMISED JUDGE SCURRY
HE WILL DELIVER ADDRESS
IN THIS CITY.

SAYS WILL MEET BRYAN

Joint Debate Will be Held if Nebraskan Agrees—May Secure One Here.

In talking with a Times reporter yesterday afternoon, Judge Scurry said that he had had a telephone conversation with Senator Bailey and that Mr. Bailey had informed him that Mr. Bryan was going to reply to Mr. Bailey's Dallas speech at El Paso Monday, the 27th and that his (Mr. Bailey's) friends had telegraphed him asking him to come out and meet Mr. Bryan, and he had replied that he would do so, if Mr. Bryan would agree to a joint debate, and if they have a joint debate at El Paso he was going to invite Mr. Bryan to meet him in joint debate at other points in Texas. Mr. Bailey also said that he would call Judge Scurry on his return from El Paso and try and fix an early date for a speech at Wichita Falls.

It is to be hoped that one of the joint debates, if there is any, will be at Wichita Falls, but nothing was said as to that between Mr. Bailey and Mr. Scurry.

Gainesville, Tex., Sept. 25.—Senator Jos. W. Bailey announced to your correspondent today that he will postpone his trip to Washington and will remain in Texas in order to reply to W. J. Bryan's El Paso speech next Monday afternoon.

Bailey signified his willingness and desire to deliver his second reply in Fort Worth, and is agreeable to a debate. It is known that a challenge for a debate has been transmitted between the two leaders for a joint debate on the tariff and it is expected they will either divide time at El Paso or Fort Worth. The times and places in all likelihood will be decided this afternoon when Bailey can get in touch with Bryan.

Both Bailey and Bryan appear anxious for such a meeting, which will attract thousands. The debate will be a culmination of one of the biggest yet "Peaceable" fights the American Democracy has ever witnessed.

PIERCE CASE POSTPONED

Trial of Alleged Perjurer is Again
Delayed on Account of His
Sickness.

Austin, Sept. 25.—Following an all-day conference between the attorneys for the state and those representing the oil company, Judge Wilcox late yesterday afternoon entered an order for the sale, on December 7, of the Waters-Pierce properties in this state. The sale is to take place between 10 a. m. and 4 p. m., at the door of the court house, the same as any foreclosure sale, and Receiver Eichardt will act as auctioneer.

The conference between the opposing attorneys resulted in an agreement substantially as above and the order was entered with little opposition. The sale is to be advertised in the papers of New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Pittsburg, St. Louis, San Francisco, New Orleans, Atlanta, Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, San Antonio, Austin, Houston and Galveston.

The H. C. Pierce perjury trial, set for October 11th, was, by agreement, yesterday postponed until November 29th, the cause being the poor health of the defendant. This is the second postponement under the present indictment and the third since the case was first called.

OKLAHOMANS IN TRAGEDY.

Edward Hayes of Pawhuska, Shot and Killed His Partner.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 25.—Eugene Hayes, a cattleman of Elgin, Kansas, worth half a million dollars, was shot and killed by his partner, Edward Hayes of Pawhuska, Okla., late last night in the bar room of the Sexton Hotel. They had quarreled earlier in the day over their forty thousand-acre ranch in Osage County, Okla. Eugene Hayes received three bullets in his brain. Lee Russell, of Fort Worth, also a prominent cattleman, witnessed the shooting.

TILLMAN COUNTY FAIR.

VESSELS OF ALL NATIONS GATHERED

HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION OCCASION FOR GREAT NAVAL EXHIBIT.

SIXTY FIGHTING SHIPS

Some of World's Largest Men-of-War Are to Be Seen in New York.

By Associated Press.
New York, Sept. 25.—With more than three score of the picked fighting ships of eight nations, swinging at anchor in the Hudson River, awaiting the coming of the Clermont and the Half Moon, sightseers at the Hudson-Fulton celebration looked upon the most impressive assembly of foreign warships that has probably ever been seen in the American waters. Riding in the river between 44th street and Spuyton Duyvil, besides the fifty vessels of the United States Atlantic fleet under Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder, the foreign navies are represented by sixteen fighting craft in all. Great Britain has four, Germany has four also, France has two, Italy has two, Mexico has one, Argentine has one and Cuba has one.

Their massive hulls tugging lazily at their anchorages represent the highest development in construction from the great shipyards on the Clyde, and the best efforts of the German naval constructors. The trimmest ships of France, the pick of the fleet of Italy, are most impressive emissaries from the old world to the new.

Swift cruisers with triple expansion engines and long rakish lines like greyhounds of the ocean; massive battleships mounted from turrets to the fighting tops with batteries of the highest type, swift torpedo boats and torpedo boat destroyers, wonderful submarines, every type of fighting ships known to the United States and eight other navies, four of them world-powers, are in this impressive assembly.

The United States Atlantic Fleet under command of Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder, is represented by the battleships Connecticut (16,000 tons), flagship; Vermont (16,000), Kansas (16,000), Louisiana (16,000), Minnesota (16,000), New Hampshire (16,000), Mississippi (13,000), Idaho (13,000), Georgia (14,948), New Jersey (14,948), Nebraska (14,948), Rhode Island (14,948), Virginia (14,948), Missouri (12,300), and Ohio, (12,440); the armored cruisers North Carolina (14,500 tons, speed 22.48 knots), New York (8,200), Montana (14,500 tons, 22 knots), the scout cruisers Chester, Birmingham and Salem (3,750 tons, 25 knots); and a fleet of five submarines and 24 destroyers, torpedo boats and other auxiliaries.

Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder is outranked by both Admiral Von Koster of the German Imperial Navy and Admiral Sir Edward Seymour of the British Royal Navy. A movement to petition the President to place Admiral Dewey in command, was promptly halted by Admiral Dewey himself, who said that his health and age would not permit him to undertake eight days of full-dress duty and banqueting. The appointment of Admiral Seymour to these waters is regarded as another evidence of King Edward's tact. Admiral Seymour was in command of the British fleet in Manila Bay on the day when Commodore George Dewey annihilated the Spanish fleet, and the rejoicer of his captain, Sir Cliechester, to the German Commander who inquired before Dewey went into action and while the altitude of the German fleet, then at anchor in the same waters, was still a matter of anxiety, what action the English proposed to take, won him instant popularity in this country and passed into history, crystallized in the aphorisms of Mr. Dooley:

"That," said Sir Edward, with significant ambiguity, "is a matter known only to Admiral Dewey and myself." Admiral Seymour became still better and even more favorably known to

For example, the altitude of Burnett and Third St. on your property is 960 feet. On the corner of 12th and Scott, which is in a good residence section of town, the altitude is 951 ft; consequently, should the city ever be inundated, the water would be 9 ft. in depth at the corner of Scott and 12th before it would begin to cover your property at Burnett and Third.

Grand Admiral Von Koester is also well known to Americans. An intimate friend of the Kaiser, 50 years an officer, and one of the committee which drew up the plans resulting in the German-American Sonder-Klasse races at Kiel and Marblehead, he recently retired as Commander-in-Chief of the Imperial Navy to be succeeded by Prince Henry of Prussia. He consented, however, to accept the presidency of the German Navy League and his appointment to the Hudson-Fulton command is both a compliment to his own honorable career and to this country. His fleet consists of the cruisers Dresden (3,544 tons), Hertha (5,596), Victoria Luise (5,569), Bremen (3,200).

France sends three battleships under Admiral le Pord, the Verite (14,635 tons), the Justice (14,435) and Liberte (14,635). Italy sends two—the Etruria and Etna; the Argentine Republic, the Netherlands, Mexico and Cuba, one each.
