TCGA to discuss farm policy Tuesday

"Farm Policy of '85," featuring US Rep. Larry Combest and State Senator Bill Sarpalius, is the theme for the twelfth annual Texas Corn Growers Association meeting Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. at the Expo Building in Dimmitt.

Combest was named last week to the House Agriculture Committee, while Sarpalius remains chairman of the Texas Senate Agriculture Subcom-

'Farm policy of '85' is going to be a hot topic, according to TCGA President Carl King, as Washington lawmakers will soon begin wrangling over a new farm bill. Combest's gaining a seat on the ag committee, while not a total surprise, came after "a lot of politicking to get

the seat," said a Combest aide. "He had to fight for it," the spokesperson said.

"We were glad to recommend Combest for the ag committee post," King said. "We talked with Kika de la Garza (committee chairman), and I

know Kika is looking forward to having another Texan on the committee, regardless of party

affiliation. "Combest is much more familiar with agriculture than I originally gave him credit for," King continued. "Of course, he used to work with the ASCS, but he's very familiar with our needs in West Texas. He also supports a supply/management program, as TCGA has recommended. He has told me he would represent his constituency, and would do so irregardless of what others, including party leaders, may do or say. He's done alright so

With his newly-gained seat on the ag committee, Combest will have a great deal to do with what finally becomes the 1985 farm bill.


"We're advocating a supply/management concept, one that will save the federal government some money,' King said. "We haven't been able to make any headway, though, through President Reagan, (ag secretary John) Block, and (budget director David) Stockman. If we pass what we propose, and the President turns around and vetoes it, well, we don't know what we'll end up with. We may end up with the 1947 farm program-but that'll be okay. Prices were higher in 1947."

Sarpalius will be joined by his former employer, former Speaker of the Texas House, Bill Clayton, discussing energy legislation.

Clayton is currently lobbying for a bill to be submitted by Sarpalius, hopefully offsetting the current energy-price squeeze Texas farmers are fac-

King will open Tuesday's meeting with his president's report. Texas Corn Producers Board chairman Weldon Davis will summarize 1984 activities and discuss possible food grain corn contracts, including activities with Frito-Lay, Venezuela, and other possible markets.

Economist Larry Smith and area entomologist Pat Morrison of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will also address the morning session, followed by Clayton.

B. M. Nelson was honored by his fellow professionals across the state Friday when he was presented 50-Year a Publisher's Award by the Texas Press Association.

The award was presented at the TPA's annual mid-winter meeting and trade show, held in the Americana Hotel in Fort Worth.

Nelson, 78, retired last July after 50 years as a selfemployed publisher, 41 of them with the Castro County News.

In presenting the award TPA President Frank Baker of Fort Stockton said Nelson "exemplifies what community journalism is all about.'

Describing Nelson as "one of the deans of Texas newspaper editor-publishers," Baker noted that Nelson started his newpaper career in his hometown in 1925, as an apprentice on the Rogers News.

"In 1934 he established his first newspaper, the Roaring Springs Reporter," Baker explained. "He later owned and operated the Amherst Reporter and the Olton Enterprise before buying the Castro County News in 1943.

Schools to build DHS lab, classroom

Two months of speculation ended Friday when the Dimmitt school board chose to forge ahead with plans to construct a new science lab and classroom at Dimmitt High

Austin, the State Board of Education, and the vagaries of

the local economy. The school district is expected to spend around \$110,000 for the new, fullyequipped lab and classroom to be constructed on the west end of the patio-courtyard area in the center of DHS. Figures indicate 17 sections of science will be taught each day at DHS next fall, according to SBOE guidelines. The two existing labs at DHS are in use this year throughout the school day, with 13 sections being taught in the labs.

struction," said Supt. Robert Ryan. The bonds for the construction of Helen Richardson Elementary, the original North Elementary, and Dimmitt High Schools will be paid off in the next three years, after which the district will be free of bonded indebtedness.

The Maui Farm Bureau wives fed them lunch at the Kula Community Center. They toured a local nursery and made a quick stop at a macadamia nut farm. Most Hawaiian farmers have small acreages — it only takes 40 acres to support a family. Because of the weather being so constant, they can harvest four crops a year of vegetables. The Maui Farm Bureau members hosted a barbecue for the Texas Farm Bureau. It was Hawaiian style, of course. They served beef teriyaki with rice, poi, avocado, and pineapple. They presented each with a Maui Farm Bureau cap.

The town near where they stayed is the old whaling capital. Several whales were spotted off shore. This is the time of year they come in to have their young. Maui has miles of beautiful beaches.

Their last stop was Hilo, Hawaii. The Big Island volcano is the one that has been active recently. You could see steam rising from several different places. Every island has a wet side and a dry side. They saw everything from a desert to a tropical rain forest. They drove through the Parker Ranch — the largest privately owned ranch in the U.S. It looked similar to many parts of West Texas. You also saw many beautiful waterfalls. You could see where the lava flows had gone. Beautiful flowers would be growing out of the lava rock.

While on Hawaii they visited a coffee mill, the old painted church, the site where Capt. Cook first landed on the islands and a black sand beach. The Big Island is where they have the Bill fishing Championship.

Tourism is their biggest industry and everyone works very hard to make sure that you have a good time. It is very relaxed atmosphere for enjoy-







(Continued from Page 1) isting labs into an additional lab, and converting the existing library into three separate classrooms.

"We need to look optimistically at the future, and I think this is the best plan for us," said board vice-president Fred Bruegel, the sole opponent of the plan adopted by the board.

The board also considered plans to build four classrooms in the courtyard area, with the subsequent conversion of two classrooms into a lab; a plan that would convert the power mechanics shop, located in the vocational building at DHS, into two labs, with an additional lab built at the rear of the existing power mechanics shop, and converting the existing labs into four classrooms.

Those plans were dismissed as being too cost-ineffective by the board, however.

The board also agreed to consult with a landscaping specialist on the best area to relocate several trees planted as memorials.

Four oak trees, donated to DHS by the Class of 1973 in memory of classmates Janie Boothe, Johnny Raper, Jeff Glenn and Robert Caddell, and three evergreens, planted in memory of John Collins, will have to be moved because of the construction.

The concrete patio area, on the east end of the center courtyard, could be in jeopardy in the future, as the board discussed posssible future needs, including more classrooms and a library

"That is probably going to be the best place for us to build in the future," said board president Charles Wales. "We'll have two to three existing walls, making it much less expensive for any future construction at DHS.

Dutton takes Tall City debate crown

Danny Dutton, Dimmitt High School senior and the son of Don and Linda Dutton, won top honors in the annual Tall City Invitational speech tournament held Saturday in Midland.

After seven rounds of competition, Dutton was awarded the first place in Lincoln-Douglas debate with a score of 279 speaker points out of a possible 330, and was awarded a plaque for an almost perfect record of competition.

He has now qualified to compete in the Texas Forensics Association state competition in San Antonio March 2.

Lincoln-Douglas debate is man-on-man debate named after the famous Abraham Lincoln-Stephan Douglas campaign debates of 1858-1860. There were 59 others entered in the Lincoln-Douglas division from schools across the state.

Judging is based on seven points: analysis, reasoning, evidence, organization, refutation, delivery and the major issues of the debate.

The topic for the tournament was "Resolved: that religious activism in the US political process is undesirable." Participants had to be prepared to argue either side of the issue.

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





PHEW! Bobcats pull it out over Mules, 58-56

That's what Coach Kenneth Cleveland told his Bobcats Tuesday night, after Nelson broke a 56-all tie with two seconds left to give the Bobcats a 58-56 win at Muleshoe.

The win gave Dimmitt a four-game sweep Tuesay evening, as the Bobbies took their tenth win of the season, 55-48; the JV Bobbies won 42-31; and the JV Bobcats pounded the JV Mules, 70-26.

Admission to the other games, though, should have been free: the \$2 you paid to get in was just for the boys varsity contest.

The game was worth much more than that, though, as neither team led by more than six points in the contest. That was at 13-7, after the Bobcats had been behind 7-4 in the first three minutes of the game. Muleshoe came back to close the gap to 13-11 before reserve guard Blake Brown hit a jumper at the end of the period to give the Bobcats a 15-11 advantage.

Muleshoe kept charging in the second quarter - a little too hard for the Bobcat coaches, who were assessed with a technical foul with 6:53 left in the first half. But, just like last Tuesday at Littlefield, when the Dimmitt bench was saddled with two technicals, the Bobcats were incited by the

Pat McDonald led the charge with 12 points in the period. McDonald, though, had just eight points in the second half, after being called for this fourth personal foul with 3:40 left in the third quarter.

The Bobcats went scoreless for 3:30 of the third quarter, but Muleshoe actually lost ground in the period as the Bobcats outscored the Mules,

The game changed at the onset of the fourth quarter from the slow-down, deliberate ball of the third period to a fast breaking game, with both teams going coast-to-coast for the first 2:48. Muleshoe cut the Bobcats lead to a point, 49-48, with 5:12 left, but the Bobcats slowed the tempo. A Bobcat turnover, though, gave the Mules their first lead since the first quarter with 3:54 left at 50-49. That was the last time the Mules were in front,

Trio elected to water board

Social Security in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS

Up to half of the Social Security benefits received by people in 1984 may be subject to Federal income tax, but mainly only for those who had substantial income in addition to their benefits.

In fact, it is expected that only one person in ten will actually pay any tax on any part of his or her Social Security benefits.

Every person who received or repaid any Social Security benefits in 1984 will receive Form SSA-1099, Social Security Benefit Statement, before the end of January. The form will show the net amount of Social Security benefits received in 1984 and this is the figure a person should use to figure if any of his or her benefits are subject to tax.

IRS Notice 703 will be included with Form SSA-1099 and this work sheet can be used to see if any benefits are tax-

Up to half of a person's benefits may be subject to tax if his or her combined income

- taxable income plus nontaxable interest plus one half the Social Security benefits exceed a base amount. The base amount is:

- \$25,000 if a person files as a single taxpayer;

- \$32,000 for a married couple filing jointly; or

- \$0 for a married person filing a separate return if he or she lived with his or her spouse any part of 1984.

The amount of benefits subject to tax if combined income exceeds the base amount is the smaller of:

 One-half of the amount over the base amount, or

- One-half of the Social Security benefits. If combined income does not

exceed the base amount, no Social Security benefits are subject to tax.

People can get the answers to questions about entries on Form SSA-1099 by calling the toll-free 900 telephone number shown on the form. Questions about figuring taxable income or figuring taxes should be directed to the nearest Internal Revenue Service office. The telephone number of the nearest IRS office is shown on the back of Notice 703.

A free publication — Publication 915 - explains the entries on Form SSA-1099 and how to figure if benefits are taxable. Free copies can be obtained at any Social Security office or IRS office.



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




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

Each year at Christmas, we are reminded of the various "cottage industries" that operate in our community.

Many cottage industries are based on individual hobby interests such as painting, wood working, sewing, or quilting. Still others find profit in selling certain goods or services from their homes.

Because most cottage industries have limited income, it is often economically impossible for the business to become a full-time commercial enterprise. Rent for a commercial building, insurance, utility costs and other financial factors are often unmanageable for the cottage industry entrepreneur. These start-up problems for beginning firms have led to the creation of "incubator" programs in some cities. The incubator concept allows several small businesses to share commercial building rent, utilities, and other common expenses. In some cases, the small business firms share secretarial help, bookkeeping or computer costs.

By sharing expenses, the small, beginning firm is often able to move from part-time to full-time operation. The "at home" hobby can become a profitable business. The cottage industry grows into a

PIK-effected businesses may apply for SBA loans

Small, agriculture-related businesses in 51 Texas counties, including Castro County, are eligible to apply for disaster loans for economic injury caused by the 1983 Payment-in-Kind (PIK) Program, according to the US Small Business Administra-

Eligible small firms may apply for up to \$500,000 at 8% interest, the agency said. The loans may only be used to meet financial obligations the business would have met had the PIK program not been us-

full fledged commercial enterprise.

The incubator approach allows cottage industries to enter the commercial business world with limited start-up expenses and minimum risk.

Today in Dimmitt, we have an unusual opportunity to experiment with the incubator approach to small business. If you have a cottage industry or a part-time small business that deserves a commercial opportunity, you may contact the Castro County Economic Development Commission for full details. Visit our office at 115 West Bedford or telephone 647-2524. We may have an idea that is right for you.

To qualify for a loan, a business must be small by SBA's standards, be unable to obtain credit elsewhere, provide a reasonable assurance of repayment ability, be located in one of the designated counties, and prove that the substantial economic injury was a direct result of the PIK Program, said Philip J. O'Jibway, Lubbock District Office

Director. "These loans are meant to provide working capital for businesses and not to replace lost profits or lost sales," said O'Jibway.

O'Jibway said that the counties designated were requested by Gov. Mark White using a list of qualified counties supplied by the Dept. of Agriculture.

"Congress has appropriated a total of \$100 million for the PIK and currency fluctuation disaster loan programs, and loan applications will be funded on a first-come, first-served basis," O'Jibway said. He cautioned that not every business will be able to qualify for a loan. "These loans are not intended to be the end-all to the problems in the farming communities," he said.

Business owners interested

in applying for the economic injury disaster loans should contact the SBA Disaster Area 3 Office in Grand Prairie by using the toll-free telephone lines or the commercial lines if the toll-free numbers are busy.

The toll free number is (800) 442-7206. The commercial number is (214) 263-9924.

O'Jibway said designated counties which are covered by the Lubbock District Office include: Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Hale, Lamb, Parmer, Potter, Randall, and Swisher.

Exports can't solve farm crisis, Harp says

Exports are essential to a healthy US agriculture but they are not the answer to the present farm problem, according to Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

In a Jan. 15 letter to members of the 99th Congress, Harp said, "Grain Sorghum Producers Association is a staunch supporter of export market development, but to expect exports, alone, to avert the collapse of US agriculture and agribusiness is false and misleading.

'Last year, the US held 71% of the world export trade of corn," Harp said. "If the US had a total monopoly on the world's corn export trade in 1981, '82 and '84, we would still have produced a surplus of corn. The only exception in recent years was 1983, when the US crop was drastically reduced by PIK and drought.'

A similar situation exists with other commodoties, Harp said. He claimed world carryover stocks of wheat and sorghum would more than fill the world export needs for one

"Export expansion has been GSPA's first priority for almost 30 years," Harp said, explaining that the association was the first to have a foreign market development program

for US production. Until that goal can be reached, GSPA recommends a workable supply-management program.



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

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

Bell is 'Texas Most Wanted'

Edward Harold Bell has been running from the law for the past five years.

Bell, now 45 years old, is wanted for Failure to Appear in Court on Charges of Murder and four counts of Indecency with a Child.

This week, Bell has been selected as the first fugitive to be featured as Texas Most Wanted. A \$1,000 reward is being offered by the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council for information leading to Bell's capture.

A former diesel mechanic, construction worker and pharmaceutical salesman, Bell was originally apprehended August 24, 1978, just a short time after he allegedly, shot and killed Larry Dean Dickens, 26, of Pasadena.

Police reports indicated Dickens was at his mother's house and saw a man exposing himself to children in the neighborhood. Dickens, who was the father of a young daughter, went outside and grabbed the keys to the suspect's truck in an effort to detain him for police.

It was a brave act that cost him his life.

The suspect pulled out a pistol and began shooting at Dickens, who staggered into the garage of his mother's home and collapsed on the floor with his wounds. Witnesses say the offender then pulled a rifle out of his truck, walked into the garage and - ignoring pleas from Dickens' mother that his life be spared - shot the young man in the head at close range.

A short time later, police apprehended Edward Harold

he failed to appear in court on Jan. 8, 1979, to stand trial.

Anyone with information about Bell's whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a weekly cooperative effort between Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the support of citizens in determining the location of dangerous fugitives.

Cash rewards are also offered on a regular basis for information leading to the capture of other wanted felons.
