PLANTING POSTS.

and Profitable Crop in Kansas This Year.

Wichita, Kan. Oct. 27.-This year promises to witness unprecedented ac-tivity in Southwest Kansas and Northwest Oklahoma in planting speciosa catalpa trees. These trees are being grown in large numbers for fence posts and railroad ties and various purposes for which forest trees are used. One nursery in Cowley county has sold this fall, over one million catalpa sprouts and other nurseries are doing as well. The nurserymen all say that the supply of the sprouts will not equal the

The forest tree industry is one of the new projects in the country mentioned. It is beyond the experimental stage, however, and is proving successful. The sprouts are set six feet apart each way, and cultivated like corn. In three years the trunk of the tree is large enough for post timber.

After it is cut sprouts spring from the stump, but only one of these is allowed to grow. In two years it is large enough to cut. Sprouts will spring from the roots for an indefinite number of years.

The yield of posts is from 1890 to 2000 per acre, and the posts sell at from 10c to 15 cents each.

Many farmers who do not care to give up fine land which will produce alfalfa are planting catalpa trees on the outside and division fence lines. They nall wire to the trees, and thus maintain a good fence and at the same time the trees are growing without occupying land on which other profitable crops can be porduced. The wire is no nailed to the tree trunks, but to a board which is wired to the tree.

The bank guaranty law of Nebraska has been declared unconstituional by the Federal Court. The opinion handed down by the judge strikes at the very heart of the guaranty idea and if it is concurred in by the Supreme Court the guaranty laws of the several states will likely share the same fate. The Governor of Nebraska says he will not call the legislature in spcial session to enact another law, as the opinion leaves absolutely no ground for a compulsory laws Hon. Tom Love, bank commissioner of Texas, has been interviewed and says the Texas bank guaranty statute will not be affected by the Nebraska decision. According to Mr. Love the Nebraska law is compulsory and gives bankers no alternative. They must give the guaranty or go out of business. The Texas law on the other hand gives bankers the option of coming into the general guaranty fund or of giving individual bonds to the extent of their capital stock. If Mr. Love is correct the senators who contended so strenuously for the bond feature of the law, and were so soundly abused for so doing, saved the guaranty law from destruction at the hands of the courts.-Honey Grove Signal.

COTTON'S MULTIPLIED USES.

Cotton is no longer dependent for onsumption alone upon the weaver of garments and the user of cheap grades of bed and table material.

The numerous uses to which the to the subject.

Millions upon millions of yards of cotton duck, cotton yarns, cotton bag- fleecy staple. ging and other forms of the manufactured product are employed in the industries and industrial arts, and every few days some new practical use is discovered, which adds materially to the consumption.

Some interesting information upon this subject was recently distributed in circular form by Dick Bros. & Co., of New York, showing that within the last five years, not in response to the demand of increased population, but to the new uses to which cotton is put, there has been an expansion of approximately 29 per cent in the spindles of the world.

Today there are few industries into which cotton does not enter as an essential element. The railroads constitute one of the chief conusmers; it is the basis of air-brake hose. of the plush and 'leather' seats in day coaches and sleeping cars, as well as of their enameled ceilings. It is estimated that the railroads and trolley lines of the country thus consume annually a quarter of a million

Now the automobile has come and the greater part of which is in the cotton duck basis for tires, while the balance goes into 'leather' seats, tops and storm curtains.

The navies of the world, it is said, use more totton today than when canvas sails were their motive power; it goes into khaki for uniforms, duck for awnings, hammocks and bags for various things. Similarly the world's armies consume millions of yards of khaki annually in the manufacture of army, a comparitively small one, rekhaki cloth each year.

Some 50,000,000 yards of cotton duck, weighing two or three pounds to the yard, are used annually in the manufacture of harvesting machinery and other agricultural implements. Millions of miles of copper wire are insulated with cotton tapes or yarns; at times the electrical industry of New York alone takes 400,000 pounds of

eotton yarns weekly. The new method of shade cultivation of tobacco brings cotton cloth to its service; tobacco itself is put up and sold in cotton bags. Sugar has recently been added to the list of other commodities, such as flour and salt, which are put up and sold in cotton bags.

LONG AUTO TRIP.

pokane Man Rode Eighteen Thousand Miles In Motor Car.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 27,-Herbere A. Hover has just returned to Spokane rom and 18,000 mile tour through the United States and Europe, which he and his wife, now visiting reatives Leavenworth, Kan., accomplished in 18 months with a 30-horse power, fourcylinder car. They had numerous exciting experiences while abroad and were snow-bound for eight days in the Alps, where they were also all but plunged over a sheer precipice of 1,000 feet by a heavy car bearing down upon them which turned a curve.

After completing 10,000 miles in the Juited States, starting in southern Calfornia on the Mexican border and ouching Canadian territory, they sailed from New York on the ill-fated steamship Republic and were exposed to the elements on deck and open boats for 24 hours before being taken ashore, Mrs. Hover sustained a nervous shock and contracted a cold from which she has not yet recovered.

"Europe is a veritable paradise for reckless drivers and the so-called 'jeyriders.' ' Hover said in speaking of his trip abroad. 'The roads are unusually good and such a thing as a speed limit is not known; and, as a result, there are frequent head-on collisions, which invariably end fatally, in addition to destroying hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of property annually. From four to five collisions a week on the road between Nice and Monte Carlo is not out of

Interment Will be Made Beside Body of Father, Jefferson Davis.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Oct. 25 .-The ashes of the late Mrs. J. Addison Hayes the lated "Daughter of the Confederacy, rare today en route to Richmond for interment beside the body of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States, and his wifefather and mother of Mrs. Hayes.

On that occasion the early settlement of the state was discussed. Mr. Severns, having been there so many years before any other white man, was accepted as authority on all such subjects. In the "Ploneer History of Indiana" Colonel W. M. Cockrum gives one of Mr. Severns' stories as repeated by Mr. Johnson.

Mr. Severus said that in the fall of 1793 be was with half a dozen of his ladian neighbors, hunting, and that be stayed all night at an Indian village. During the night two white prisoners were brought in, and preparations were made for their trial and death.

First two lines were formed facing each other, and the two men were sompelled to run the gantlet between the lines. A point some bundred yards beyond the lines of the gantlet was designated as the place that was to be reached to save their lives.

One of the men was of middle age, but frail; the other was a strong, athletic young fellow. The lines were made up of more than 100 Indians, mostly squaws and boys, with enough active men to keep the prisoners from getting away. The young man was the first to make the race. He got through the lane and to the life station without being much burt.

The older man before be started held up his hands and offered a prayer to God for aid, then commenced the race, which was not more than half completed before he was knocked down by a heavy club in the hands of a squaw and was set upon by the borde of squaws and boys and beaten to death.

As soon as he was knocked down the young man, who was several hundred feet away, ran like a deer and jumped into the throng of Indians and tried to save his friend's life, but was soon overpowered and dragged away.

For this brave act the chief of the village adopted the young man to take the place of a son whom he had

Mr. Severns, on being asked why he did not intercede for the prisoners, said that if he had attempted to interfere it would have cost him his life.

THE JOY OF EATING.

It is Courted to the Fullest Extent in

The Germans in a good many ways get more happiness out of life as they go along than we do. Eating is an innocent pleasure, and they eat oftener and more. No one is required to get up to breakfast. There is never any formal family breakfast. Coffee and rells are sent to your room, or you can go into the dining room and get them when you choose. Not having had breakfast enough, a German spends all the rest of the day in making up for it. At 10:30 or 11 everybody takes lunch. The laborers along the streets all stop to eat. And in places and at all hours it is good form and a matter of course to draw out a substantial sandwich of rye bread and raw ham and go to munching. Women do it at the opera. Students do it at the university between classes. Dinner comes at 2 o'clock. About 5 the maid brings to your room coffee and rolls and perhaps cake. At 8 p. m. is supper. Those who are going out to any entertainment may have supper at 6 or 7. But there is always a long enough intermission at the opera or theater for those who are disposed to take lunch, and most persons are disposed.

There are innumerable restaurants all about the city, and tens of thousands of people eat there, sitting at little tables in the open air right by the sidewalk. After the day with all its cares and meals is over it is a favorite custom to go to a restaurant and sit there for half the night eating and drinking and listening to music. No city in the world hears so much good music so cheaply as Berlin. And everybody who is anybody knows enough about music to talk with some intelligence.—Berlin Letter to Springfield (Mass.) Republican.


