## EMER COMPLIES WITH STATE LAW

### AT WORK ERECTING SHEDS FOR ITS TRACKS IN LOCAL YARDS.

## PROTECT WORKMEN

### Legislature Passed Law Making Construction of These Sheds Compulsory.

Compliance with a law passed at last session of the state legislature at Fort Worth and Denver is now being made over some of its tracks in this city for the protection of workmen.

The law was passed with an object of stopping the exposure of carmen and other workmen on the tracks to the weather.

Sheds are very simple in construction, being of wooden roof and iron posts. They will serve, as well as a very adequate protection from the weather and will make the work of those employed by the road more agreeable. Work was started on the sheds the latter part of last week and they will be completed very soon.

About two hundred feet of these sheds will be constructed in this city. Denver is complying with the new law at its other division points and is making the first road in the state that the provisions are carried out.

## INDICTMENTS RETURNED.

## FINISH EXTENSION TOMORROW EVENING

### NORTHWESTERN WILL ARRIVE AT MANGUM BEFORE ANOTHER DAY HAS PASSED.

## ONLY SHORT GAP LEFT

### Construction Gang But a Few Miles Distant Today and Rapidly Closing Up.

Tomorrow afternoon will witness the completion of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern into Mangum, if there are no unforeseen delays. The road is today within less than two miles of Mangum and this short gap will have been closed before another day has ended.

It is planned to run the first train over the line to Mangum on Wednesday and if the arrangements can be completed in time, Mangum will send an excursion crowd down on that date to witness "The Great Divide" at the opera house. Regular traffic will have been installed by the end of this week. The completion of the Mangum extension gives the Northwestern a total mileage of about one hundred miles, and gives the road an additional connection with the lines of the Frisco-Rock Island system.

## WANT RATES REDUCED.

### Jobbers Claim That Roads are Charging Too Much for Bananas.

Texas News Service Special. Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 1.—A reduction of ten cents per hundred pounds in freight rates on bananas from gulf ports is sought by the Jobbers of Texas and Oklahoma in a hearing being conducted here today by Francis M. Cockrell, a member of the interstate commerce commission.

Freight agents representing the Cotton Belt, Southern Pacific, Texas and Pacific, International and Great Northern and the Katy railroads are present. The jobbers want the rate reduced from seventy-two to sixty-two cents.

### That is Text of Message Received by Governor Regarding Affairs in Breathitt.

By Associated Press. Jackson, Ky., Nov. 1.—"Hell has broken loose in Breathitt County." The above startling and laconic message was received by the governor this morning from the authorities in Breathitt county and Governor Wilson is hurrying to this city from New Orleans.

## PRESIDENT IS IN MISSISSIPPI TODAY

### WELCOMED BY GOVERNOR NOEL AT JACKSON AND VISITS STATE FAIR.

## TRIBUTE TO THE STATE

### Introduced to Assemblage by Chief Executive of State and Makes Happy Address.

By Associated Press. Jackson, Miss., Nov. 1.—President Taft and his party arrived here at 8:45 this morning. When the train stopped the reception committee took the president to the Edwards hotel, where the general reception committee was awaiting him.

R. H. Henry introduced the president with a brief address and at 10 o'clock the street parade was formed, the president leading the procession in an automobile with Governor Noel. The parade proceeded to the agricultural building at the state fair. At the race track a large gathering was present to greet the chief executive and he was cheered heartily, flags waving and the band playing patriotic airs.

The president in his address paid a tribute to Mississippi and her people and expressed his thanks for the hearty greeting accorded him. "He was introduced by Gov. Noel, who said:

"Last year in view of his life work, and their belief that he most nearly embodied their cherished ideals, the people of the United States said unto him, 'Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things.' As to the great essentials of good government, good people nearly all agree, demanding of those who seek the highest stations, unblemished honesty, skilled intelligence and proved patriotism. The questions of political disagreement are points of less vital importance. Those of us who were against you last year, Mr. President, in last year's political conflict, enjoy the satisfaction of knowing, as we were defeated, it was by the best and greatest man that could be found in the ranks of our political opponents; and our failure and your success proves that and your politics most clearly reflected prevailing public sentiment; and that you are entitled to our loyal support in your discharge of the great powers with which you are invested; and we are entitled, and I am sure, will receive, all the benefits that flow from a just administration of the executive department of the federal government.

"In conclusion and on behalf of the state of Mississippi, it affords me great pleasure to welcome, thrice welcome, its president, who is now presented to this assembly of its people.

#### Higher Rates for Mail Registration.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—The new order of the post office department of the United States, by which the fee for the registration of mail is increased from eight to ten cents, while at the same time the liability of the government for indemnity in case of loss, theft or destruction of a registered article in transit is increased from \$25 to \$50, went into effect today.

The increase of the registration fee was ordered by Postmaster General Hitchcock upon the recommendation of the committee which has made an investigation of the registration service and has found that this division has been conducted at a considerable loss to the government. It is expected that other important modifications of the registry system that should lessen considerably the cost of its operation, will be made in the near future.

#### McCormick Seminary Celebration.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 1.—At the McCormick Theological Seminary, one of the most prominent Presbyterian theological institutions in the west, a two-days' triple celebration began today, to commemorate the eightieth year of the founding of the seminary, the fiftieth year of its location in Chicago and the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Cyrus McCormick, after whom the institution is named. In honor of the celebration Mrs. McCormick recently added to the endowment an annual income of \$15,000 for the next ten years. An elaborate and highly interesting program has been prepared for the two days of the celebration and several hundred distinguished educators and churchmen from all parts of the country are in attendance.

#### State Fair at Columbia, S. C.

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 1.—The annual South Carolina State Fair opened here today with the most encouraging success. The lists of entries is unusually large and the exhibits in the various departments are better and more attractive than ever before. Prizes amounting to a total of \$15,000 will be distributed to exhibitors and the winners of the various racing events. The horse show will continue through the entire week of the fair. Saturday, when President Taft will visit the grounds and will deliver an address, promises to be the banner day of the week, and thousands of visitors are expected on that occasion from all parts of the state.

#### Gary's First City Election.

Gary, Ind., Nov. 1.—Gary, having grown inside two years from a village of 200 population to a town of more than 25,000 inhabitants, is to have its first city election tomorrow. The primaries and other steps leading up to the election were marked by riots and bloodshed, in which the thousands of foreigners employed in the steel mills, took a prominent part. The campaign has been extremely bitter, and as a consequence the liveliest apprehension exists over the outcome of the struggle at the polls tomorrow.

## PROSPERITY IN WICHITA COUNTY.

It is now almost certain that the gins in Wichita county will turn out more cotton this year than they did last. The two gins in this city will fall short of 1908's output by about 1000 bales, but the shortage here will be more than made up by the increase at the gins at Iowa Park, Burk Burnett and Electra, and, according to the estimates of a well-posted gin man, who has an interest in and is operating two gins in the county, the increase over last year will be in the neighborhood of 100 bales. If he is correct, it will show that Wichita county has, or will produce, for the year 1909 at least 7000 bales of cotton, which, counting the seed, will be sold at an average price of \$80 per bale, or a total of \$560,000 for the entire 1909 cotton crop.

When it is remembered that it is only for the past four or five years that Wichita county farmers have been producing cotton to any great extent, a 7000 bale crop in an unfavorable crop year is considered a most excellent showing.

In addition to the cotton crop a very good corn crop has been produced and it is estimated that at least 250,000 bushels of corn have been shipped out of the county at an average price of 55 cents per bushel.

An abundance of other crops have been raised, and it is the opinion of nearly everybody that there is more money among the farmers, and the county is more prosperous this year than at the same time last year.

## THE SAME YESTERDAY AND TODAY.

Few persons doubt Mr. Hearst is the same today that he was yesterday, yet it is interesting to note the changed attitude of certain eastern men relative to the millionaire editor at this time with a remembrance of how they reviled him only a short time ago.

President Roosevelt denounced him in the roughest terms in a published statement as practically an anarchist, and held his publications as responsible for the death of President McKinley at the hands of an assassin.

That was when Mr. Hearst was working in the harness for the success of the democratic party. Later the New York editor was summoned to a conference with President Roosevelt at Washington. And when Hearst organized his Independence League to engage in a guerilla warfare against Mr. Bryan in the last presidential campaign, he became politically sanctified in the sight of the party of protection of the rich and robbery of the poor.

One New York newspaper, the staid and grandmotherly Evening Post while somewhat softened in its attitude toward Mr. Hearst, is yet a bit dubious and remarks: "The more a man like Hearst changes the more he remains the same thing."

The west became interested in Mr.

Hearst a few years ago and thought much of him, but it was not long in discovering that he was as unstable as a weather vane. Politically he would not remain hitched. In the hour of need he could not be found. The west has since learned that William Randolph Hearst is for Hearst alone in all places and at all times.

In the present campaign in the city of New York the editor of the American is a majority candidate, ostensibly in behalf of the people and good government, but in reality to split up the good government vote so that it will be impossible for a genuine reform candidate to be elected.—Oklahoman.

Down at Henrietta the saloon keepers have filed a protest against the enforcement of the prohibition law, which was recently voted by a good majority. The contest was not filed until after prohibition went into effect, hence the law will remain operative during the pendency of the contest. Of course, many pretenses of irregularities are mentioned in the protest, but in nearly all instances the contestants state that they do not know the names of the persons concerned in the alleged irregularities, hence their contention can amount to very little. There seems to be no doubt in the minds of unbiased persons that there was a clear legal majority of prohibition votes cast in the election and we have no doubt of its ultimate success. The pros have employed competent counsel and will stoutly defend their rights in the matter. The Post is proud of the fact that Childress people have a way of submitting to election results, whether they suit the individual fancy or not. Be it said to the credit of both pros and antis, Childress has never yet had a contested prohibition election. No higher compliment could be paid any people than that they always submit to the expressed will of the majority in all public affairs.—Childress Post.

That is certainly very complimentary of the good people of Childress, both pros and antis. The man who will not submit to the will of the majority and gives aid and encouragement to the overriding of the expressed will of the people, is a bad citizen. Yes, he is worse, in that he is nothing less than an outlaw and should be dealt with accordingly.

**FERRER AND WASHINGTON.**  
Americans are prone to have a great deal of respect for European governments. Their display of strength through organization, their pomp, and especially their strong standing armies, lead Americans to think they are very militant forces. But every now and then something happens in Europe which shows how really insecure their gilded fabrics are. It may happen in France, in Italy, in England, in Spain. This side of the world hears little of the great battles of the common people of Europe for greater freedom and opportunity. It does not realize that those remaining in Europe are fighting the same battle for a chance in life that those who come to America maintain.

Americans to understand the political situation in Europe, should know that those who live on eight and nine cents a day or hitch their wives to the plow would not do that if they could help it. They have become more or less accustomed to it, no doubt, and precedent excuses it in all European eyes. But women are not used as plow animals in this country, and many of its citizens are descendants of the Europeans who, though they might have not been guilty of that particular act, have known the direst of poverty.

The execution of Ferrer in Spain called to the public mind very forcibly a problem with which Spain is now dealing. It is like many other European problems of government, something that the United States settled long ago. Happenings more or less similar to the Ferrer execution have occurred during recent years in other European countries. In each case the officials of the government and the conservative press have pleaded with the populace for the very life of the government. Such utterances almost strike terror into the hearts of Americans. Not since the Civil War has there been a problem of government in this country which threatened the life of the republic, and a very small percentage of the people who now make up this country were alive when these problems were settled on the battlefield.

To the European government is the King or the Premier, or more probably he sees the government exemplified in the tax collector. To the American the government is the material expression of one of the loftiest ideals that the minds of learned men and honest men ever conceived. Love for the government of the United States is love for the very best principles of human brotherhood. It is love for high ideals. Therefore, it is very difficult for any question of the hour to cause Americans to do anything which might weaken or endanger their government. Some day the rulers of Europe who are so certain of the strength of their armies and interna-

tional alliances will quit doubting whether the American government can live much longer and learn that it will live as long as a majority of the people of the country struggle toward the ideal of perfection which the American government holds up to inspire its citizens. They ought to find that out early for their own good, because their citizens, or rather their subjects, have already learned something about the American government. It took them a long time, but the results of their knowledge have been shown little by little every year since 1776.

George Washington and the patriots of his time struck a greater blow for human freedom than even they probably realized.—San Antonio Express

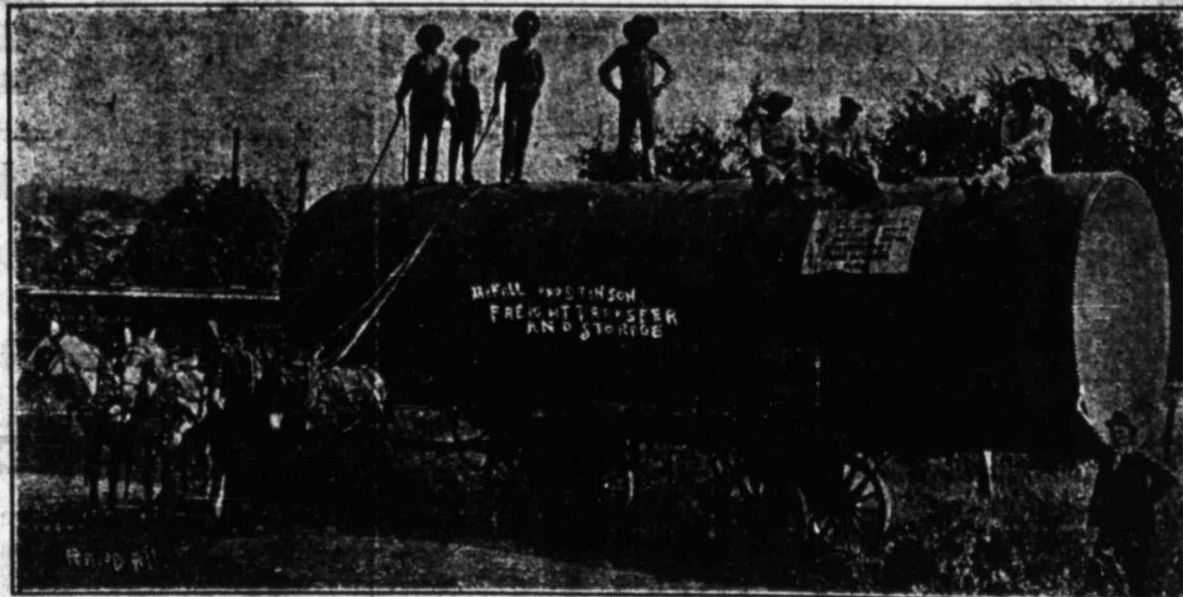

### RHEUMATISM.

One Course of Treatment For the Cure of the Disease.

To cure rheumatism it is necessary to rid the system of the excess of uric acid, and to do this a proper diet is even more important than the use of drugs, though in very severe cases the latter are not to be despised in conjunction with the dieting that is absolutely essential.

The Massachusetts General hospital of Boston allows the following diet for its rheumatic patients: Graham or brown bread, white bread (limited to one-half slice daily), corn, rice, milk, eggs, flour, puddings, crackers, beans, peas, all kinds of vegetables, except potatoes, tomatoes and asparagus, rhubarb, fresh fish, butter, cheese, buttermilk, cream, alkaline waters and toast. Avoid red meats, starch or potatoes, white bread and sugars.

The sensible use of water both internally and externally plays a large part in the prevention or cure of rheumatism. One or two glasses, either hot or cold, taken before breakfast every morning is excellent to start the organs of digestion for the day, and at least one glass should be taken between meals. Often the plain water will be enough to move a slightly constipated person, but if not a mild medicated water may be taken instead. It is very essential to keep the bowels open in cases of rheumatism.

Uric acid in the system is a poison, and it must not be forgotten that poisonous waste matter is also eliminated through the skin. The pores of the skin must be kept freely open and not allowed to become clogged if we hope to obtain the best results with rheumatic cases. A hot bath at bedtime is often very helpful.—Delineator.

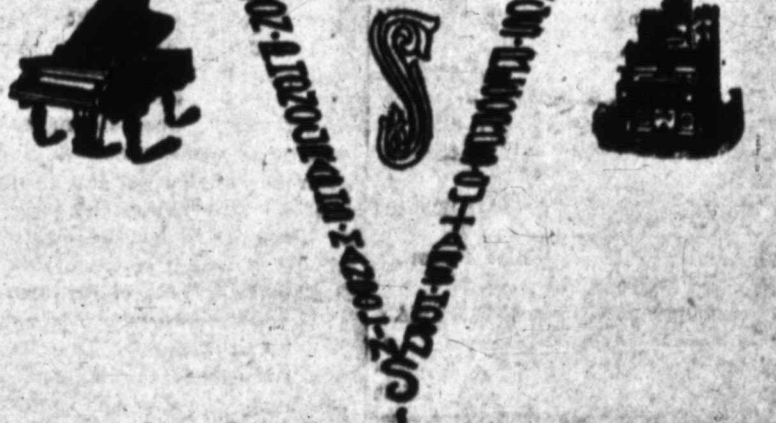

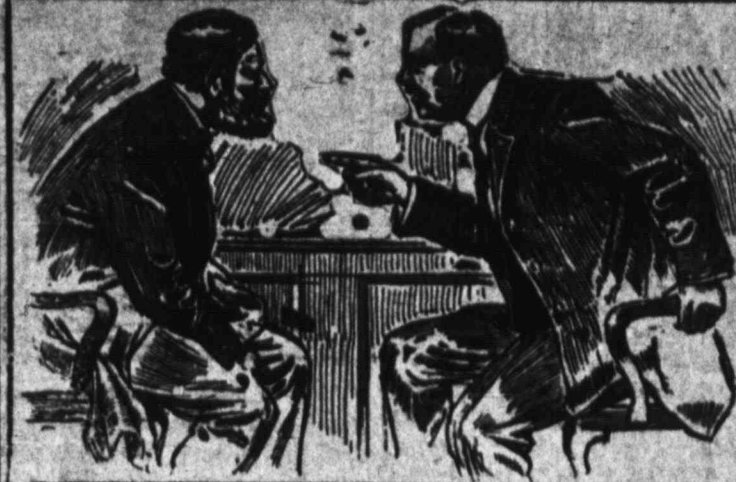
