REACH JOURNEY'S END AT SHINGTON ON WEDNES-DAY NIGHT.

Meets and Greets Senator Tillman at Banquet in Columbia Last Evening.

Charleston, S. C., Nov. 6.—President Taft is now rapidly nearing the end of his long swing around the circle and as only four more days of travel.

He arrived here late yesterday evening and after the banquet last night, retired for a long night's rest. The nost interesting feature of the banquet was the presence of Senator Tillman, who greeted and talked with the chief executive.

The president spent the night at the home of Mayor Rhott. He left at 8 o'clock this morning for Columbia, where he will spend several hours this afternoon, thence to Augusta, Ga., at which place he will remain over Sun-

At the banquet last night the only speeches were the introduction of Taft by Mayor Rhott and the president's response. Senator Tillman and Governor-Ansel accompanied him to Columbia.

After today, the president will make but four stops, Augusta, Florence, Wilmington and Richmond, then home to Washington, where he will arrive late Wednesday evening.

FARM LANDS HERE

DALLAS SYNDICATE SAID TO BE PLANNING LARGE PURCHASE IN THIS COUNTY.

OUARTER OF A MILLION

That Sum, or More, to Be Spent in Purchase and Homeseekers Brought Here.

A quarter of a million dollars, or more, is to be invested in Wichita county lands if the plains of a Dallas syndicate of capitalists are carried out. It is learned that several capitalists of that city are contemplating such a move and it is believed to be more than likely that the investments will be made. The plan is necessarily still shrouded in secrecy and

the details are not available.

According to what can be learned here, the syndicate will spend between two and three thousand dollars in the purchase of desirable farm lands in Wichita and Wilbarger counties, holding them for settlement by homeseekers from other states. There is one Dallas syndicate already with large land holdings in West and Northwest Texas but it is not known whether these are the same parties that contemplate the investments in this county or not.

Some idea of the desirability of Wichita county lands may be obtained from the fact that much of the property to be acquired by this syndicate cannot be purchased for less than thirty or forty dollars per acre and will have to be sold for fifty dollars to bring a reasonable profit on the investment.
