STRENGTHEN BONDS BETWEEN NATIONS

SUCH IS THE PURPOSE OF THE PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS TO BE HELD AT BUENOS AYRES.

FOR WESTERN REPUBLICS

Every Country in Western Hemisphere Will Be Represented At the Meeting.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—The fourth of a series of great conferences that are steadily increasing the bonds between the two republics of the western hemisphere is to be held at Buenos Ayres, Argentine Republic, between the 15th and 20th of next July, and already the Argentine government, which it to be the host in this case, has been doing much to prepare for the meeting. The date originally fixed for the fourth international conference of American states was May 20th, 1910, but the fact that a great exposition was to be held in the same capital in that month, which might overshadow the importance of the international conference, led to the postponement of the latter. Moreover, the month of July, being in the middle of the Argentine winter, is certain to make the visit to Buenos Ayres more agreeable to the delegates from the north.

The governing board of the bureau of American republics already has dispatched to every south and central American capital a tentative program of the subjects to be considered by the conference and the various foreign offices have been at work upon this with the purpose of submitting objections or suggesting amendments. Much progress has been made and it is hoped that it soon will be possible to promulgate the final program, which, according to present indications, will not vary considerably from that prepared by the board of governors.

The three preceding conferences have moved along the lines of least resistance; that is to say, the delegates have adopted as basic principles such propositions as have secured the easy adhesion of the great majority, but no effort was made to coerce the minority of the states into acceptance of rules which, at first presentation, were obnoxious to them. Instead, when these were of real importance, they were thoroughly debated and then remanded for further consideration at the next conference. In this way the conferences have been made educational, and experience has shown that a sound proposition is almost certain to secure adhesion. So it happens that the tentative program includes some subjects that already have figured in the debates of the preceding conferences. Thus, for instance, will again come up the subject of compulsory arbitration. While the Hague Conference accepted this in principle, it declined to recommend a general treaty of arbitration, though strongly urging to the state represented the making of special treaties among themselves to carry out the idea. The United States already has done this with eleven of the other American republics, and the subject will come before the fourth conference and receive further encouragement at the beginning of the proceedings, when each delegate will be required to report what action has been taken by their respective governments to carry out the wish of the third conference.

Another project broached at a preceding meeting which will be again threshed out will be the establishment of steam navigation lines connecting the principal ports of the American countries, on the basis of a uniform system of contract.

The Bureau of American Republics is to be strengthened and continued for another ten-year term of life at the least, and it is hoped that the commission of international jurists will be able to report something in the nature of a code of international law that will be adopted for the government of the American republics in their diplomatic relations. If this report is satisfactory the fourth conference will embody in a treaty this basic code, which is expected to have the happiest results in the settlement of any disturbing questions that may arise in the future between the republics.

The Pan-American Railway, postal rates and parcel posts, a uniform system of collection of census and commercial statistics and consular methods, supervision of food supply, the protection of the public health and the regulation of rates of international exchange and other matters left by preceding conferences for the consideration of that which is to meet at Buenos Ayres.

New and up-to-date subjects are wireless telegraphy and aerial navigation, for it has begun to be realized by the governing board that there will be need of regulations for the government of these new methods of communication and travel. An effort also

One cloud that threatened was the breach of relations between Argentine and Bolivia. But it is believed that even if the efforts now making to re-establish these relations should prove abortive, yet as the host, Argentine on this occasion would regard herself as the representative of all the American republics and waiving all personal considerations, gracefully extend to Bolivia the invitation which would secure the attendance of her delegates at the conference.

THAT HOOK WORM FUND.

John D. Rockefeller's gift of a million dollars to a commission to be used in eradicating the hook worm disease in the southern states does not differ in its essential aspects from several other large gifts he has made. Nevertheless, one cannot contemplate it without a fresh feeling of admiration for the originality and intelligence with which he acts in his benevolences.

Dr. Charles W. Stiles of the federal health service, who first identified the hook worm disease and discovered the American species of the worm, is the primary benefactor of the hundreds of thousands of men, women and children now its victims. In the ordinary course of events a slow fight of decades, if not of generations, would be made as the result of his work. Much would be accomplished, but little compared with what can now be accomplished. Mr. Rockefeller sees the possibilities of an organized fight, he investigates until he is thoroughly satisfied of what is needed, then he places the funds for the fight in the hands which will use them best. One cannot calculate the immense benefit that will accrue to the people who will be restored thereby to a wholesome, effective, happy life.

Mr. Rockefeller in his organized benevolences is indeed a pioneer. His personal reputation in after generations will be raised high because of it. We can think, indeed, of only one way in which he could still more enhance his merit as a leader in new spheres of benevolence. That would be if he could find some way to use his money so as to hasten the disappearance of those social conditions by which he so greatly profited in accumulating it, and by which thousands and tens of thousands of men were crushed under evils greater than those caused by the hook worm itself.—Chicago Record-Herald.

It has been a long time since the Times has inflicted upon its readers editorial boosts for itself, but really this has not been necessary, and is not now. The Times has been too busy boosting Wichita Falls, and, naturally enough, while engaged in this work it has enjoyed all the patronage it could well accommodate. This would not be the case were the Times not fulfilling to the letter its mission to pull for Wichita Falls and her commercial interests, as well as moral upbuilding. There are more than one hundred exchanges that come to the Times' exchange table daily, many of which are printed in cities larger than Wichita Falls by far, and yet a comparison with the daily editions of the Times will show that this paper pays out more for labor and more for telegraph news service than do many of these papers published in the larger towns. A comparison will also show that the Times carries more advertising than most papers, and this is but natural. As to the circulation of the Times, it has been doubled during the past eighteen months, while the advertising rate remains practically the same as when the paper first started. This, some newspaper men will say, is bad business judgment on the part of the Times, and it may be, but the Times wants to be as reasonable in its charges as it possibly can, and that its rates are reasonable, it is only necessary to point to the fact that they are, in many cases, but little more than half that charged by other papers of no greater circulation. The Times is well satisfied with the patronage it is drawing and is fully aware of the fact that this patronage which is bestowed upon it is not all due to the popularity of the manager, (please excuse our vanity), but mainly to the fact that the business people of Wichita Falls feel that it has, and is now, doing as much, if not more, than any one concern for the upbuilding of the city. That there are a few who will not concede this point, the Times is cognizant, and it would be useless to try to convince them, so long as these fellows have an axe to grind and have fallen out with the Times because it would not turn the crank for them. But they will get over that. Such little difficulties will adjust themselves if only given time.

The Times is one of those kind of newspapers that solicits patronage on its merit, and as it has never wanted for a goodly amount of patronage, it naturally concludes that, as a rule, it is coming up to the standard.

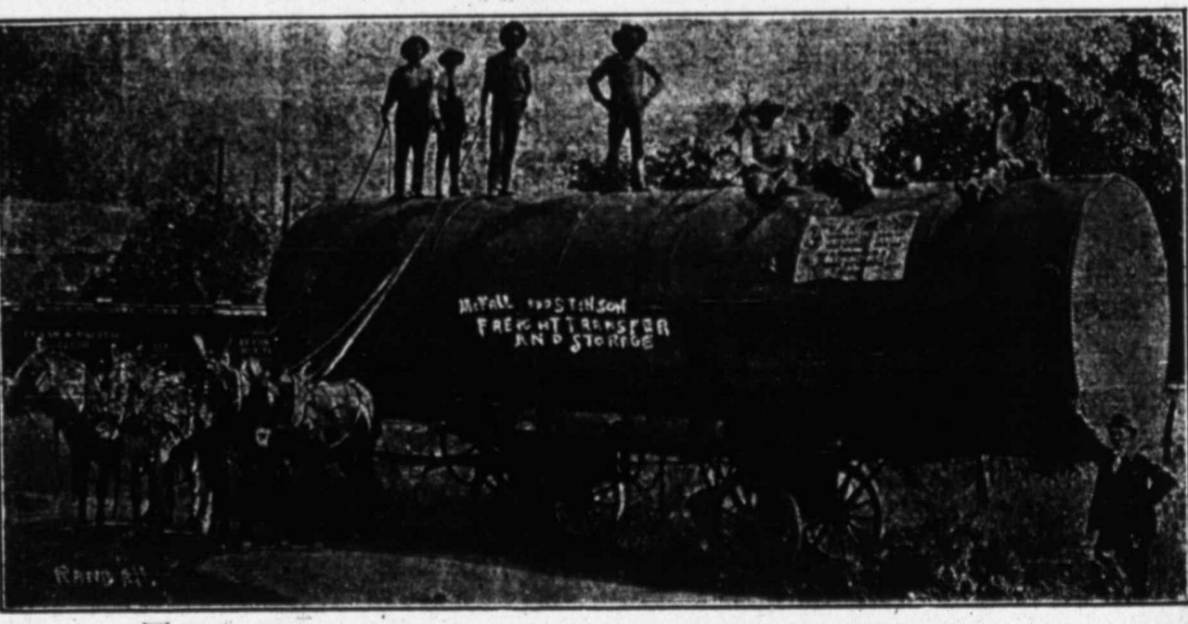

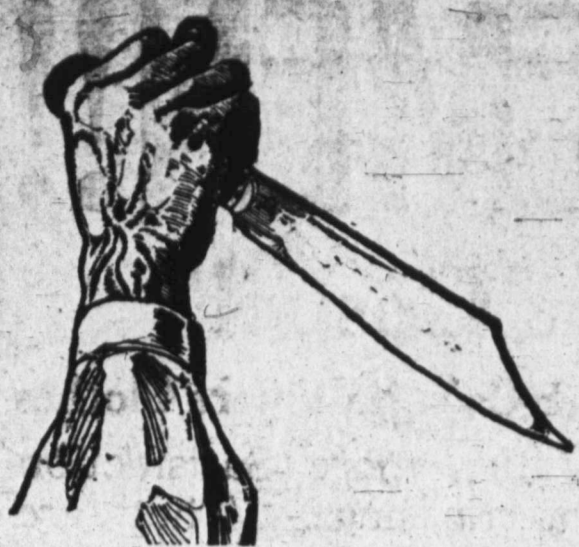

STRENGTHEN BONDS BETWEEN NATIONS

SUCH IS THE PURPOSE OF THE PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS TO BE HELD AT BUENOS AYRES.

FOR WESTERN REPUBLICS

Every Country in Western Hemisphere Will Be Represented At the Meeting.

By Associated Press.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—The fourth of a series of great conferences that are steadily increasing the bonds between the two republics of the western hemisphere is to be held at Buenos Ayres, Argentine Republic, between the 15th and 20th of next July, and already the Argentine government, which it to be the host in this case, has been doing much to prepare for the meeting. The date originally fixed for the fourth international conference of American states was May 20th, 1910, but the fact that a great exposition was to be held in the same capital in that month, which might overshadow the importance of the international conference, led to the postponement of the latter. Moreover, the month of July, being in the middle of the Argentine winter, is certain to make the visit to Buenos Ayres more agreeable to the delegates from the north.

The governing board of the bureau of American republics already has dispatched to every south and central American capital a tentative program of the subjects to be considered by the conference and the various foreign offices have been at work upon this with the purpose of submitting objections or suggesting amendments. Much progress has been made and it is hoped that it soon will be possible to promulgate the final program, which, according to present indications, will not vary considerably from that prepared by the board of governors.

The three preceding conferences have moved along the lines of least resistance; that is to say, the delegates have adopted as basic principles such propositions as have secured the easy adhesion of the great majority, but no effort was made to coerce the minority of the states into acceptance of rules which, at first presentation, were obnoxious to them. Instead, when these were of real importance, they were thoroughly debated and then remanded for further consideration at the next conference. In this way the conferences have been made educational, and experience has shown that a sound proposition is almost certain to secure adhesion. So it happens that the tentative program includes some subjects that already have figured in the debates of the preceding conferences. Thus, for instance, will again come up the subject of compulsory arbitration. While the Hague Conference accepted this in principle, it declined to recommend a general treaty of arbitration, though strongly urging to the state, represented the making of special treaties among themselves to carry out the idea. The United States already has done this with eleven of the other American republics, and the subject will come before the fourth conference and receive further encouragement at the beginning of the proceedings, when each delegate will be required to report what action has been taken by their respective governments to carry out the wish of the third conference.

Another project broached at a preceding meeting which will be again threshed out will be the establishment of steam navigation lines connecting the principal ports of the American countries, on the basis of a uniform system of contract.

The Bureau of American Republics is to be strengthened and continued for another ten-year term of life at the least, and it is hoped that the commission of international jurists will be able to report something in the nature of a code of international law that will be adopted for the government of the American republics in their diplomatic relations. If this report is satisfactory the fourth conference will embody in a treaty this basic code, which is expected to have the happiest results in the settlement of any disturbing questions that may arise in the future between the republics.

The Pan-American Railway, postal rates and parcel posts, a uniform system of collection of census and commercial statistics and consular methods, supervision of food supply, the protection of the public health and the regulation of rates of international exchange and other matters left by preceding conferences for the consideration of that which is to meet at Buenos Ayres.

New and up-to-date subjects are wireless telegraphy and aerial navigation, for it has begun to be realized by the governing board that there will be need of regulations for the government of these new methods of communication and travel. An effort also



The prospects for a successful conference are bright, in the opinion of the officials of the Bureau of American Republics. One cloud that threatened was the breach of relations between Argentine and Bolivia. But it is believed that even if the efforts now making to re-establish these relations should prove abortive, yet as the host, Argentine on this occasion would regard herself as the representative of all the American republics and waiving all personal considerations, gracefully extend to Bolivia the invitation which would secure the attendance of her delegates at the conference.

THAT HOOK WORM FUND.

John D. Rockefeller's gift of a million dollars to a commission to be used in eradicating the hook worm disease in the southern states does not differ in its essential aspects from several other large gifts he has made. Nevertheless, one cannot contemplate it without a fresh feeling of admiration for the originality and intelligence with which he acts in his benevolences.

Dr. Charles W. Stiles of the federal health service, who first identified the hook worm disease and discovered the American species of the worm, is the primary benefactor of the hundreds of thousands of men, women and children now its victims. In the ordinary course of events a slow fight of decades, if not of generations, would be made as the result of his work. Much would be accomplished, but little compared with what can now be accomplished. Mr. Rockefeller sees the possibilities of an organized fight, he investigates until he is thoroughly satisfied of what is needed, then he places the funds for the fight in the hands which will use them best. One cannot calculate the immense benefit that will accrue to the people who will be restored thereby to a wholesome, effective, happy life.

Mr. Rockefeller in his organized benevolences is indeed a pioneer. His personal reputation in after generations will be raised high because of it. We can think, indeed, of only one way in which he could still more enhance his merit as a leader in new spheres of benevolence. That would be if he could find some way to use his money so as to hasten the disappearance of those social conditions by which he so greatly profited in accumulating it, and by which thousands and tens of thousands of men were crushed under evils greater than those caused by the hook worm itself.—Chicago Record-Herald.

It has been a long time since the Times has inflicted upon its readers editorial boosts for itself, but really this has not been necessary, and is not now. The Times has been too busy boosting Wichita Falls, and, naturally enough, while engaged in this work it has enjoyed all the patronage it could well accommodate. This would not be the case were the Times not fulfilling to the letter its mission to pull for Wichita Falls and her commercial interests, as well as moral upbuilding. There are more than one hundred exchanges that come to the Times' exchange table daily, many of which are printed in cities larger than Wichita Falls by far, and yet a comparison with the daily editions of the Times will show that this paper pays out more for labor and more for telegraph news service than do many of these papers published in the larger towns. A comparison will also show that the Times carries more advertising than most papers, and this is but natural. As to the circulation of the Times, it has been doubled during the past eighteen months, while the advertising rate remains practically the same as when the paper first started. This, some newspaper men will say, is bad business judgment on the part of the Times, and it may be, but the Times wants to be as reasonable in its charges as it possibly can, and that its rates are reasonable, it is only necessary to point to the fact that they are, in many cases, but little more than half that charged by other papers of no greater circulation. The Times is well satisfied with the patronage it is drawing and is fully aware of the fact that this patronage which is bestowed upon it is not all due to the popularity of the manager, (please excuse our vanity), but mainly to the fact that the business people of Wichita Falls feel that it has, and is now, doing as much, if not more, than any one concern for the upbuilding of the city. That there are a few who will not concede this point, the Times is cognizant, and it would be useless to try to convince them, so long as these fellows have an axe to grind and have fallen out with the Times because it would not turn the crank for them. But they will get over that. Such little difficulties will adjust themselves if only given time.

The Times is one of those kind of newspapers that solicits patronage on its merit, and as it has never wanted for a goodly amount of patronage, it naturally concludes that, as a rule, it is coming up to the standard.

The selection of Prof. R. B. Cousins as president of the new normal is a wise one; it will take an able man to start the institution successfully on its career and there is no doubt that Prof. Cousins can fill the bill in every particular.

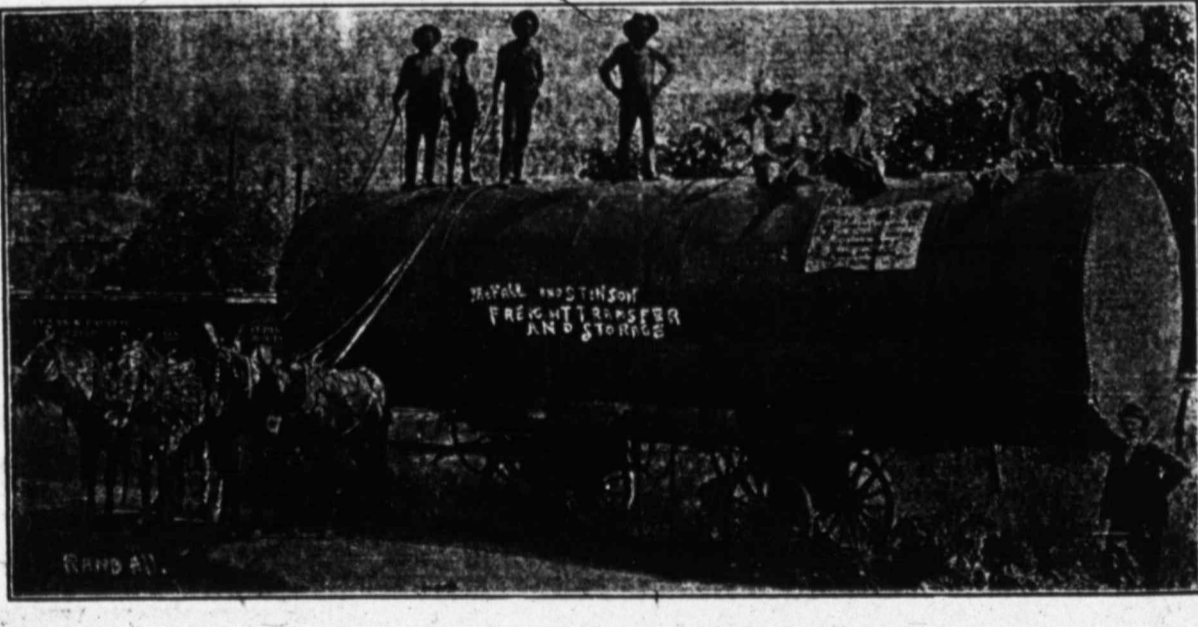

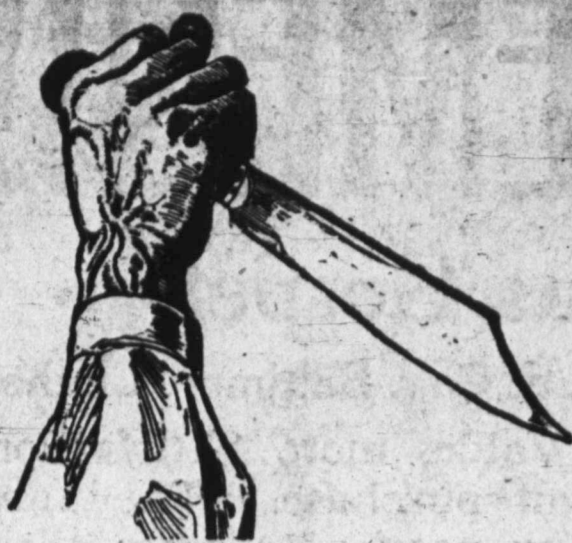

His tours in the part of the 'Wrong Mr. Wright,' 'The Woman Hater' and other popular comedies have long since stamped Mr. Beresford not only as a clever actor, but a born natural comedian with a great future in front of him.

The Richmond, (Va.), News-Leader says: 'The wide and high auditorium of the old Academy of Music housed nearly three hours last evening a veritable cyclone of laughter, the current of which was interrupted momentarily at times by sudden lulls that marked impressively the subduing power of the element of pathos which broke the continuity of the storm.'

'Harry Beresford and 'Who's Your Friend?' were the two factors in the situation. Beresford is still classed among the younger stars of the comedy stage, but he has demonstrated by his performances in the last two or three seasons that he has few, if any, equals in America as a character comedian. Then, too, the depth of feeling with which Beresford's Daniel appeals to the heart in the emotional scenes of the play, are wonderfully effective reminders.

The supporting company is made up of a coterie of artists, each one of whom may be commended for general excellence.

Joe Morris and his merry-making company will be the attraction at the Wichita Theatre on Thursday, Nov. 18th, in a new musical farce, 'Too Many Wives,' by Charles Horwitz and Frederick V. Bowers. Catchy music prevails throughout the entertainment and complications are caused by Jack Simon's endeavor to obtain a temporary wife to introduce to his wealth uncle, 'Isadore Meyer,' from Kansas City, from whom he has been obtaining large sums of money for supposed household expenses. Joe Morris, as the Kansas City merchant, is a better than most comedians of his class and his original parodies are rendered in a way that concusses the audience. A scene with 'Miss Dough,' a splinter of ancient vintage, is one of the funniest burlesque love scenes ever attempted in musical comedy. Mr. Morris is supported by an excellent company and the chorus of vivacious and agile show girls introduces some new and spirited dances.

'A Knight For a Day.' During the long run of 'A Knight for a Day,' in Chicago—a solid year—the young women of the chorus came to be known as the American Beauty Chorus, because of the unusual personal charms of its members. It is seldom that the management of a compelling attraction lays special stress upon the hard working girls who form the animated background of a musical play, but those having in charge the publicity work of 'A Knight for a Day' evidently wish it to be known that the young ladies of the organization which comes to the Wichita Theatre Friday, Nov. 19th, are uncommonly good to look upon. Edward Hume and Grace De Mar have the principal character comedy parts with the company, which numbers some sixty people.
