# HAVE GAS ENGINE

CHINERY WILL BE INSTALLED THERE THIS SPRING.

#### WILL PLACE ORDER

New Engine Will Probably Have Twelve Hundred Horse Power. Second One Here.

Within about four months, possibly oner, the Wichita Falls Water and Light plant will occupy a distinctive position among the plants of the state, in that it will be the only one using a gas engine for its motive power. The order for this engine will be placed this week and will probably be filled inside of ninety days.

Representatives of the various concerns manufacturing this class of mathis week conferring with the officials of the company regarding the purchase of the engine and there is keen competition between them.

This variety of engine is not, as is popularly supposed, merely a steam engine with gas as fuel, but is in reality a gas engine, the motive power being furnished by the explosion of gas several months ago and proved so eminently successful in its operation

It has not been decided what size will be purchased, but it will have at least nine hundred horse power and possibly twelve hundred. The latter size is preferred, as it allows more for the growth of the city and the location of additional industries here. A representative of one of the engine companles here today said that Wichita Palls was by far the smallest city in the United States to adopt this kind of engine in its power plant and he considered that a strong testimonial of the progress the city was making. It is probable that the new engine will be in operation by June 1, at the latest. The cost is estimated at close to \$50,00.

An interesting description of the magnificence of a bedstead ordered for Kemble, Dallas; S. J. Watetsky, Dal-Queen Elizabeth's use is found in a "wardrobe warrant" dated 1581 and R. T. Malone, Dallas; Joe M. Smith, quoted in "Gleanings After Time." It Clovis, N. M., J. H King, Brownwood; was of walnut tree, richly carved, painted and gilded. The rejure, tester and valance were of cloth of silver, figured with velvet, lined with changeable taffeta and deeply fringed with Venice gold, silver and silk.

The curtains were of costly tapestry curiously and elaborately worked, every seam and every border laid with gold and silver lace, caught up with long loops and buttons of bullion,

The headpiece was of crimson satin of Bruges, edged with a passaymayne of crimson silk and decorated with six ample plumes containing seven dozen debtedness due said company. ostrich feathers of various colors profusely decorated with gold spangles.

The counterpoint was of orange colored satin quilted with cutwork of cloths of gold and silver and of satins of every imaginable tint embroidered with Venice gold, silver spangles and beautifully colored silks fringed to correspond and lined with orange surce-

The index number on December 1, 1909, was almost identical with that touched on March 1, 1907. In fact, frices went from their highest to their lowest of recent years in a year and a quarter and railied again to their highest in a year and a half. The level of prices on December 1st, this year, was 11 per cent above that of the same date in 1908; was, as above shown, even with the high record of March 1st, 1907; was nearly 20 per cent above the low level of July 1st, 1904, and 12 per cent above the high level of December 1st, 1902, before the panic of 1903. Much is made, of course, of the fact that the rise from the lowest level of recent years-that of July 1st, 1896is 56 per cent; but it should not be forgotten that this leval was an abnormal result of a combination of depressing causes, and the comparison marks a contrast of extreme conditions. If, however, we compare the averages of the entire year 1909 with that for 1908, it will be found that the advance is 6.3 per cent, while it is only 4.3 per cent below that of 1907. If the additional comparison is made with 1892 to 1908, we find the present year's level si values to be 14 per cent higher, and if the seventeen years' average level is compared with that of December 1st, 1909, we find a rise of 22.3
