

## Lions Club Hears Jennings Flathers

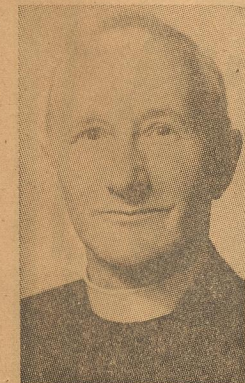
Lions Club heard Jennings Flathers, field representative of National Education Association at their regular Tuesday noon meeting.

All interested businessmen are invited to attend the Dutch luncheon and business session.

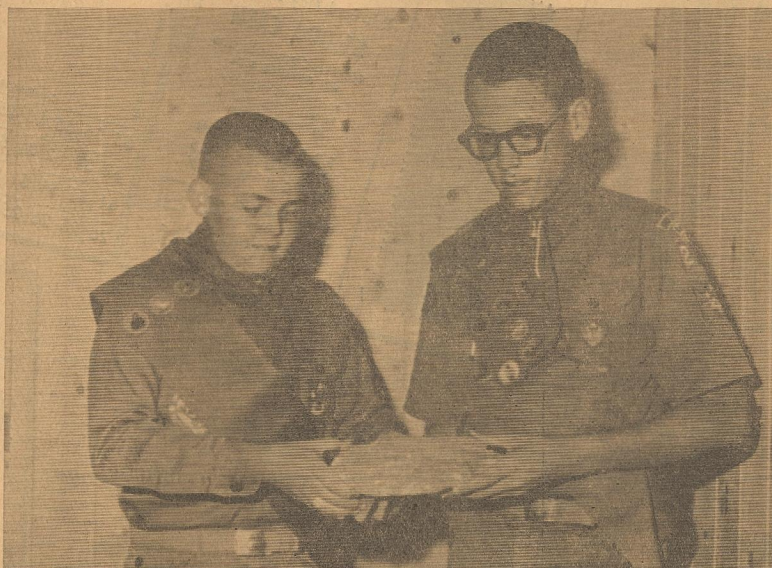
## Dimmitt FFA Starts Annual Magazine Sale

## Bobcats Pull Big Upset Friday In Stopping Floydada Whirlwinds 8-2

Dimmitt Bobcats traveled to Floydada Friday night and brought back a prized victory over the Whirlwinds. Playing one of their best games of the season the Bobcats out fought Floydada on both defense and offense for one of the big upsets in high school football.

The only Floydada threat came on the last play of the ball game when the Whirlwinds carried the ball from their own 17 yard line to Dimmitt's 4. before being pulled down by Steve Hutton.

The Bobcats received the opening kickoff and on the first play from scrimmage Clint Summers got off the longest play of the game when he broke into the open and ran 64 yards before he was pulled down from behind. The Bobcats couldn't move the ball on in for a touchdown and had to turn it over to Floydada on downs at the 12 yard line.

Bobcats trailed at the half 2-0. Floydada's score was set up when Wilson of Floydada broke through on a fourth down play and blocked Jacky Nichols punt and it went into the end zone giving the winds a safety and two points.

Dimmitt came back the second half and played an outstanding game of ball control. Gary Calhoun's kick-off was short to start the second half and Dennis Cleaver covered it to start Dimmitt on their drive. Dimmitt drove down to the four yard line where a penalty and Floydada's defense stopped them from scoring.

Floydada took the ball for the first and only time they had it during the third quarter. The Whirlwinds fumbled and Gary Calhoun recovered it. The 'Cats came out determined to take it across on this try and they succeeded. They drove down to the three yardline on short power drives into the line. Then on a fourth down try Steve Hutton faked the ball to Jacky Nichols and kept it on a run around the end for a touchdown Landol Frazier threw a key block to break Steve loose on the touchdown play. J. Nichols drove into the line for the extra points and Dimmitt was ahead 8-2.

This was all the scoring but with all the fourth quarter remaining there was still plenty of excitement left in the ballgame. Dimmitt kicked off to Floydada and the Whirlwinds started a drive back up field that was stopped short when Tommy Nichols partially blocked a pass and Landol Frazier picked it off and returned it to the Floydada 14 yard line. Dimmitt was stopped three inches short of another touchdown when fourth down play failed to carry across.

Floydada took the ball and drove out to their 46 yard line where they were held on downs. Dimmitt started another drive and was stopped but Jacky Nichols got off a punt which was killed on the Whirlwinds' two yard line and with 98 yards in front of them and time running out the Whirlwinds could not overcome the Bobcats' defense.

Dennis Cleaver, Dan Petty, Eugene Oldham, Clayton Neal, Gary Calhoun, Dickie Dyer and Tommy Nichols played an outstanding game on offense and defense. They opened holes consistently in the Floydada line and held them on defense to less than 100 yards rushing.

The Bobcats open district play this week against Olton. The game will start at 7:30 p.m. This will be a big test for the Bobcats because Olton was picked as one of the favorites to win the District race.

They have a big strong line, fast backs and one of the best passing attacks the Bobcats will have to face this year.

Approximately \$900 damages were recorded for the Plymouth. The Chevy II was totaled.

## Local Schools Observe Second National School Lunch Week

The school children of Dimmitt are among 2.5 million students who will enjoy a well-balanced lunch in some 1468 schools during National School Lunch Week, October 13-19, 1963.

This program means improved health and better accomplishment in school, says Mrs. Sarah Blackwell, local school lunch director. Nationwide, the school lunch program is a one and a quarter billion dollar business, reaching more than 16 million school children daily in the United States.

Mrs. Blackwell reports that this food market a year is \$37,491.16. The total pounds of food donations from the Federal Government included better than 30,000 of ground beef, of turkey and a variety of canned fruits and vegetables. Each of the 151,955 lunches in Dimmitt included at least one half-pint of milk purchased from local dairymen. This makes the school lunch program an important part of the local economy.

The Dimmitt 17 employees report to their school lunch kitchens early each school morning and hustle about the business of preparing meals planned according to Government specifications to supply one third of each child's daily food needs.

Lunches are available for 30 cents in elementary schools and 35 cents in secondary schools.

These prices are made possible by the help of Federal cash reimbursement of .05 cents a meal and Federally donated foods amounting to about .03 per meal.

At these prices the tasty, attractive school lunches are the best value for the money and far superior—nutritionally—to the average home-packed lunch, Mrs. Blackwell says.

President Kennedy recently proclaimed October 13-19 as the second annual national commemoration of the school lunch role in keeping the Nation healthy and strong. This year's celebration theme is "School Lunch Serves the Nation through Food for Learning".

## Curtis Cryer Died Tuesday

Curtis A. Cryer, former Dimmitt resident, died Tuesday afternoon while on a deer hunt in Colorado.

The well-known educator's most recent appearance in Dimmitt was at the Old Settler's Reunion held here in August where he was principal speaker in recalling old memories.

Mr. Cryer served as superintendent of schools in Dimmitt for five years before moving to Gruver. He was a charter member of the Dimmitt Lions Club, formed in April, 1930.

Cryer, 69, was the first president of Frank Phillips College at Borger. He has been in active retirement since he resigned as president and superintendent of the Borger Public Schools in 1955.

His residence was at 1616 Lawson in Amarillo. He was born March 22, 1894 in Floresville, and took his first teaching job with the Northfield school system after graduating from Clarendon College. He became superintendent of schools during his two years at Northfield, and entered World War II with the 31st Infantry Division. He served over 11 months in France.

After the war he became superintendent, teacher and coach at Kirkland public schools and later was dean of men at Clarendon College, his alma mater.

He received his BA and MA degrees from the University of Oklahoma in 1927 and then came to Dimmitt.

After one year as superintendent at Gruver, he spent nine years as head of McLean schools, leaving there to become head of Borger system.

In Borger he was simultaneously head of the schools and first president of Frank Phillips College.

After becoming charter member of Dimmitt Lions Club, Cryer later belonged to Lions clubs in McLean and Borger. He remained affiliated with the Borger club until his retirement, when he joined the San Jacinto Lions in Amarillo.

Later in 1955 he became a charter member of the Amarillo Evening Lions, eventually serving the club in all offices, including a term as district governor in 1949-50. In all, he recorded 33 years of service with various Lions clubs.

Survivors include his wife Ethe Stoner Cryer of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Jane Alice Logan of Portales, N.M.; two sisters, Mrs. Harry Rothwell of Mt. Vernon, Mo., and Mrs. Altha Stair of Faxon, Okla., and three brothers, Marvin of Bloomington, Ill., John of Mt. Vernon and Dale of Corpus Christi. Also surviving is his stepmother, and two grandsons.

Arrangements for funeral services will be announced by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors, Amarillo.

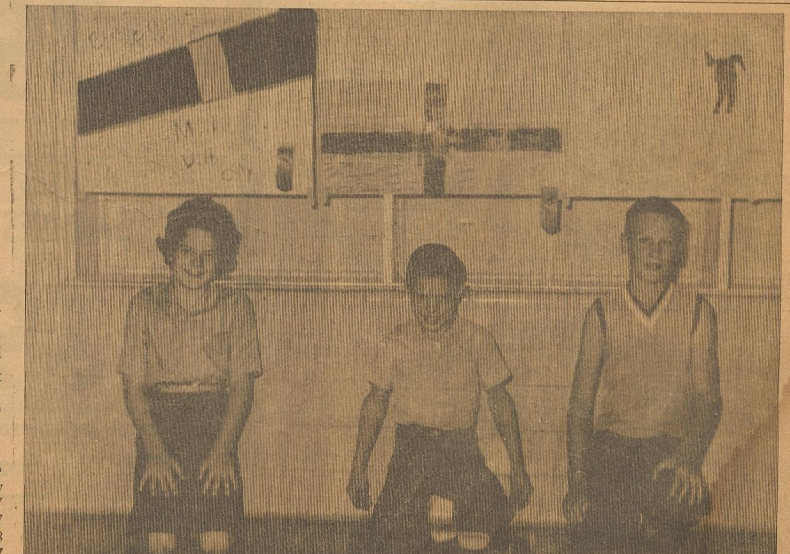

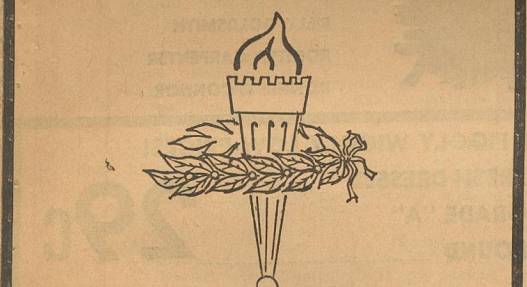

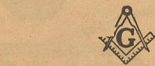

### Time To Control Peach Tree Borers

If you have noticed wax or gum oozing from the trunk of your peach trees they are probably infested with peach tree borers and now is the time to control these pests, says H. A. Turney, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The insects damage the trees from about a foot above the ground to three or four inches below it, Turney says.

Leave the mounds until spring, then level them back to the original ground line.

Two to three year old trees require about 1/2-ounce of P D B crystals per tree, and four to five year old trees need about 3/4 ounce per tree. A mature tree requires 1 ounce of crystals per tree, according to the entomologist.

When the crystals are placed around the trees the soil should be dry, the soil temperature should be above 55 degrees F., he said.

For more information on control of the peach tree borer, Turney suggests a visit with your local county agricultural agent.

Spray or dust all hogs and their sleeping quarters for lice before winter sets in.

The only protection against fall-out is to keep it away from you by remaining in shelter, and keeping out of food, feed and water.

#### A \$1.5 BILLION APPROPRIATION CUT

The House sliced another substantial amount—\$1.5 billion—from the latest appropriation bill coming before us. The measure which reached the house floor Thursday, provided funds for activities in this fiscal year of the 26 Federal agencies, bureaus, boards, commissions, corporations and offices grouped according to government parlance as the "independent offices." The bill provided \$13.1 billion, \$1.5 billion less than had been submitted in budget requests. To accomplish the recommended reduction, the Appropriations Committee had done its work well. It had heard 450 witnesses and compiled 4,000 pages of testimony in subcommittee hearings

stretching over four months. The committee cuts sustained by the full House amounted to an overall reduction of 10.6 percent in the budget requests. This is in line with the kind of substantial reductions Congress must make if we are to attain the goal I've long pursued of balanced budgets and a reduced public debt.

The \$5.1 billion budget approved for space activities (the budget for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration) had been cut by \$600 million in committee and that cut was sustained by the House. Also approved by a House majority was an amendment to forbid the use of any funds in this year's space budget on any joint venture with the Soviet Union in an effort to send a man to the moon. Other amendments adopted to the bill bar the use of any funds to pay salaries of a study group for creation of a domestic peace corps or national service corps (a legislative proposal that appears to be dead, at least for this Session of Congress), and to reduce by \$100,000 funds requested for salaries and expenses by the Federal Power Commission.

Three other regular appropriations bills remain to be reported to the House before this Session can end. They are the military construction bill, the foreign aid bill, and the public works bill. Action on the disposition of the authorization bills which provide for the programs.

So far this year the House has cut \$4.7 billion from budget requests considered in the nine regular appropriations bills for the fiscal year which began July 1. Four regular bills have been cleared by both the House and Senate and sent to the President, those providing money for the Interior, Treasury, Post office, Labor, Health-Education-and-Welfare, and Defense departments. The defense appropriation at \$47.2 billion, is the largest of all appropriations and represents well over half of all Federal money to be expended.

The chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Honorable Clarence Cannon of Missouri, estimates that an earlier outlook remains valid for final congressional budget reductions of approximately \$5.4 billion. In my newsletter of August 10, I predicted that the budget will have been cut by \$5 or \$6 billion when all appropriations matters have been disposed of.

A reduction of at least another \$1 billion may be expected in the foreign aid appropriation, a cut that added to past actions would bring reductions approved by the House to \$5.7 billion. I will continue my efforts to eliminate the foreign aid program entirely. If this could be accomplished, and the bipartisan support for the foreign aid program indicates that the odds are against it, the resulting \$4.4 billion reduction in the budget coupled with cuts previously made

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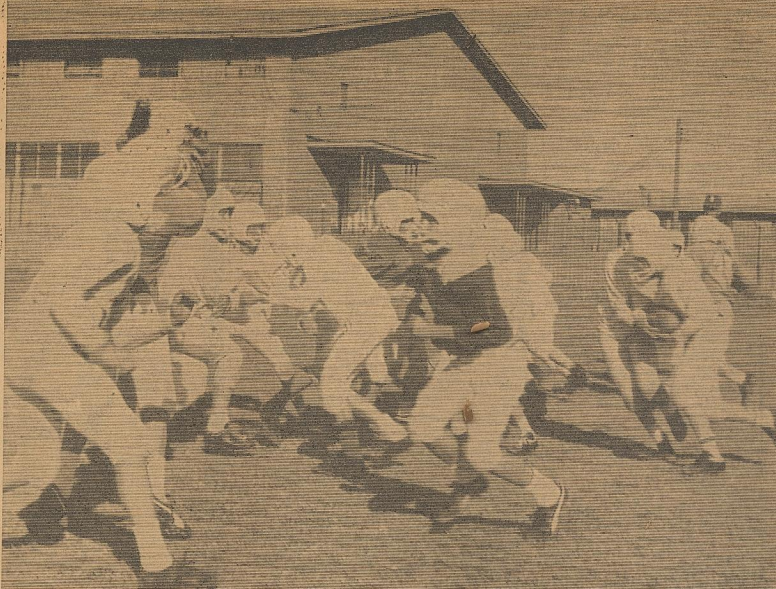

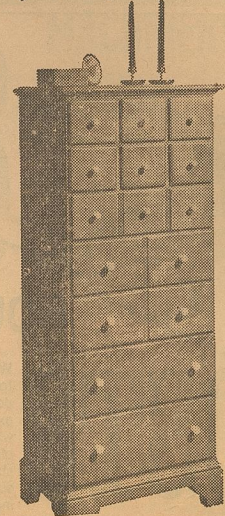

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

A brand new State agency dedicated to bringing more free-spending tourists to Texas now is in operation.

Texas Tourist Development Agency held its first meeting, discussed policy guidelines and set a timetable for selection of an agency to handle its \$200,000 advertising account. Advisory board members will meet on January 16-17 to pick the firm which will prepare and place its tourist-luring ads.

Sworn in as advisory board members were James M. Gaines, radio-television executive of San Antonio, chairman; Bill Berger, publisher of the Hondo Anvil-Herald; John McCarty, advertising executive of Frito-Lay, Inc., Dallas; G. A. (Pop) Mabry, public relations executive for Humble Oil and Refining Company, Houston; John Powell, hotel executive of Austin; and Chris Fox, El Paso banker. Said Gov. John Connally: "I hope this is the beginning of a tremendous program. Your work is important to the economic future of Texas."

He commented that the 1964-65 advertising budget is so small that the state will have to "ride piggy-back" on privately financed national advertising for a few years.

He noted that Texas is sixth in the nation in population—and some statisticians believe it soon will be third. But it's below the top 10 in tourist attraction.

In 1957, 10,400,000 tourists came to this state and spent \$531,000,000. In 1962, only 9,600,000 tourists visited Texas. They spent an estimated \$471,000,000.

"See Texas First" campaign to get Texans to spend their vacations in Texas is being planned. The Agency is stepping up its administrative activity, and will add to its staff.

**POLITICS BOOMING—** First formal affair of the coming political campaign season will be held on October 19 in Austin for Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Texas' senior Senator, certain to run for another six-year term in 1964, will gather a political war chest through the dinner.

Bringing more campaign fodder to Texas will be Pres. John F. Kennedy. He will make a two-stop

trip to the Lone Star State in November.

Texas Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell, head of the Draft-Goldwater movement nationally, hopes to set up a dinner in January at which the Arizona Senator will announce his candidacy for president.

Both party's headquarters in Austin are increasing their staffs, as they get ready for what now appears to be a humdrum of a political year in 1964. Both democrats and republicans expect the GOP to muster more strength in 1964 than they did in 1962. Republicans are so hopeful about their chances that there is real competition for the party nomination for some of the major statewide offices.

Democrats, with first-term men in the State's three top offices, may have strong competition in at least two of them. Don Yarborough of Houston says he will decide by December 1 whether or not he'll run against Governor Connally in next May's primary.

Close friends of Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth predict he will be a candidate for the U. S. Senate.

State Rep. Horace Houston of Dallas announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor at a GOP leadership conference here.

State Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio is visiting newspapers and otherwise sounding out his chances in a race for the same office—as a Democrat.

Some 300 San Antonio attorneys have signed a petition urging Associate Justice Jack Pope if the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals to run for the State Supreme Court.

Smith County District Attorney Bill Coats says that reports indicating House Speaker Byron Tunnell will have trouble getting re-elected in his home district (Smith and Gregg counties) are incorrect. Says the D. A.: "The only time I hear that... is when I come to Austin. Tunnell is in good shape at home."

Four candidates for congress are thundering along 10th District campaign trails. A special election is set for November 9. Candidates from Austin are Jake Pickle and Jack Ritter Jr., Democrats, and Jim Dobbs, Republican. The fourth, Frank B. McGehee, came all the way from Dallas to enter the Central Texas race. McGehee claims no party connections.

**MOHAIR MARKET SOUGHT—** Angora goat raisers brought their problem to the Texas Industrial Commission. They have asked Director Harry W. Clark for all the help his state agency can offer.

Goat raisers want to lure to Texas some mohair scouring, sorting, grading and combing industries. This so their product can be turned out in finished form. But they don't know how to go about it. As far back as they can recall, they have sold raw, ungraded, sacked mohair to buyers from four eastern firms who ship it east for finishing.

D. W. (Speedy) Hicks of Bandera said the goat raisers don't know manufacturers requirements.

Clark said the commission is ready to lend a helping hand, through research and promotion. But he added, "I foresee real obstacles in trying to sell manufacturers before style centers are established here." James L. Powell of Fort McKavett, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association; L. M. Stephens of Lometa; Howard G. Hya of Bandera; Houston Smith of Texas A & M; and Armer Earwood of Sonora will work as a committee with the Industrial Commission's staff.

**APPOINTMENTS MADE—** Governor Connally, whose October calendar is so crowded with out-of-town speaking engagements that he told an aide he would be home only two nights this month, managed to squeeze in time to pick five appointees to the Good Neighbor Commission.

Jack Drake of Weslaco, Robert J. Galvan of El Paso and Charles L. Nunn of Sweetwater were appointed to six-year terms. Mrs. Bob Long of Austin and Ramiro B. Martinez of McAllen were chosen to fill vacancies on the commission.

Drake is executive vice president of the Lower Rio Grande Valley Chamber of Commerce. Galvan, Nunn and Martinez are attorneys.

Connally reappointed Walter Buckner of San Marcos as employer representative on the Industrial Accident Board. Buckner of co-owner of the San Marcos Record.

**COUNTY OFFICIALS ELECT—** Texas' County Judges and Commissioners meeting here elected Elmer Zahn of Fallurrias president. Sam Brazier of Emory was named Secretary-treasurer, and Harold Green of Water Valley, vice president. In a resolution, the county leaders said the State should get out of the property tax field and turn over the property tax to hard-pressed local governments.

**PROPERTY TAX INCOME HIGH—** Despite the Homestead Exemption Act of 1933, property taxes in Texas provide about five times as

much revenue as the sales tax. So says the Texas Research League, which has just completed a study of the tax.

**BANKS SEEK CHARTERS—** Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner has an application for a charter from the proposed Security Bank and Trust Company of Canyon.

He scheduled a State Banking Board hearing this week on the charter application of Forest State Bank, Dallas. Proposed Texas Bank and Trust Company of Midland also has applied.

Department will check into the case of a proposed Howe State Bank in Howe, Texas on October 28.

State Savings and Loan Commissioner delayed decision on a proposed Beacon savings and Loan Association in Plainview, at the request of the applicants.

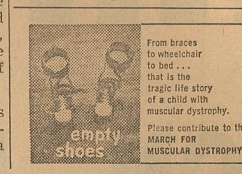

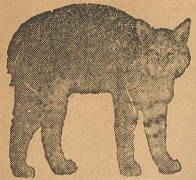

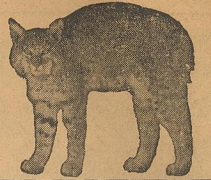

## U.S. Investigates Situation In Viet Nam

 Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara has gone to South Viet Nam to investigate the military situation there, to see how well the war is going against the Viet Cong guerrillas, and to see if the Vietnamese government's suppression of Buddhists is affecting the war. At present, the United States plans to have the guerrillas defeated in 1965.

The investigation was called because the Vietnamese government has suppressed the Buddhists. The Buddhist began demonstrations earlier this year against alleged discrimination against the Buddhists by the Roman Catholic government of President Ngo Dinh Diem. At the city of Hue, on the northeastern coast, Vietnamese policemen shot down nine Buddhist demonstrators. This only increased the size and number of the demonstration, and the first Buddhist nun burned herself to death with gasoline last July. Since then, other Buddhists have committed suicide. The government has tried to stop these suicides whenever possible, and has raided Buddhist pagodas and arrested priests and nuns. The government has also made mass student arrests of students who speak out against the government. President Diem's sister-in-law, Mademoiselle Ngo Dinh Nhu, is now making a tour of the United States. She has attacked the United States because of its interference in the suppression of the Buddhist demonstrations. She says that they are being caused by the Communists.

The United States is in favor of continuing aid to the Diem government because they feel that the Viet Cong must be defeated, no matter what the cause. One official stated: "Changing from the Diem regime to another government is like changing barrels while one is going over Niagara Falls." However, the United States is considering cutting non-military aid until the Diem government makes some changes in its policy toward the Buddhists.

So far, the investigating committee has not found any evidence of the suppression of Buddhists weakening the front against the Viet Cong.

We want to say congratulations to these six outstanding people of Dimmitt High School and wish you a happy and memorable reign.

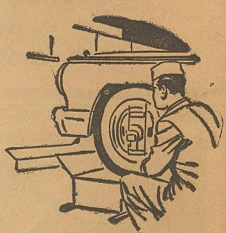
## The Shadow

Sunday night Ricki turned down a show invitation to study for a unit test in Civics. That's what I (See THE SHADOW—Page 12)

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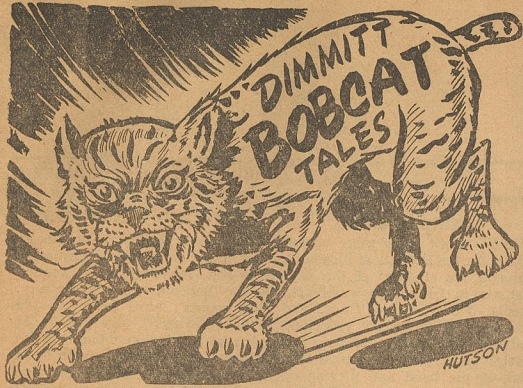

Friday night, Ricki felt a little better and she finally reassured herself that she would make it to school the next Monday.

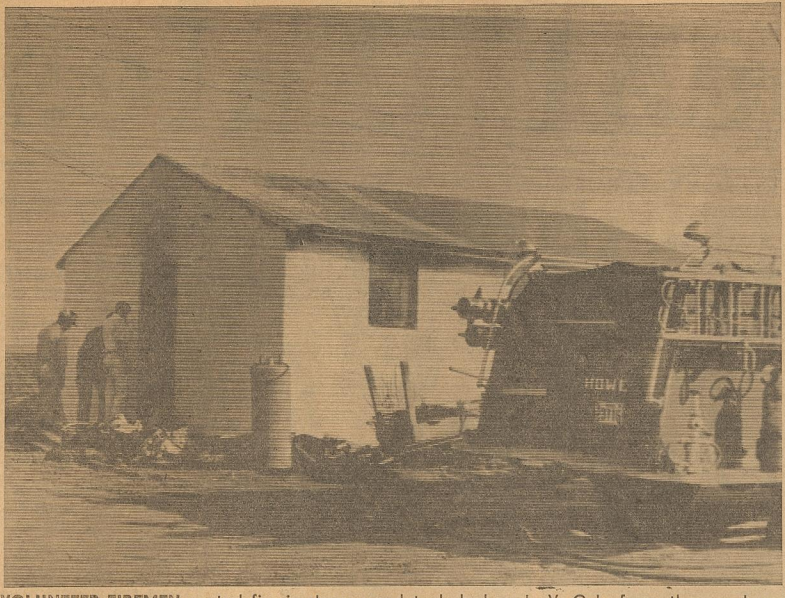
