## **GLIDDEN TOURISTS** THROUGH RINGGOLD

ONLY FOURTEEN OUT OF FORTY-FOUR CARS STILL REMAINED IN CONTEST

Number of Local Automobiles Have Little Endurance Run of Their Own

Fourteen dust-covered automobiles, all that have survived of the forty-four that left Detroit early last week, passd through Ringgold yesterday afternoon and crossed Red River north of and Iowa, with 500 midshipmen from that place en route to Lawton, where they spent last night. The rest of the cars have either become disabled or have so many points counted up against them that it was impossible for them to make a good showing.

The feature of the run from Dallas to Ringgold was the loss by the Chalmers car No. 5 of its perfect score. Up to yesterday not a point had been recorded against this machine, but near Bowie yesterday its engine was overheated and it was necessary to stop and take on water, which impaired the standing of the car.

The contestants crossed Red River on the Rock Island bridge. They understood that it was to be floored for forced to cross on the bare ties, which was accompanied with considerable labor and difficulty. Those who were questioned stated that yesterday's was not only the hottest run they had experienced, but the more laborious in every way. Treasury Ruling Provides' Payment of **Duties on Everything** 

Tourists and others traveling into the United States from Mexico must pay on everything bought in this republic and not in actual use by the person carrying the same. Not one cent's worth of any dutiable article

Hunter home in the heart of the city last December and were among the most brutal in the criminal annals of Savannah. It was at first suspected that the crimes had been committed by a negro and for a time there were fears of a bloody race riot. Within a few hours after the discovery of the negro districts of the city and more than 150 negroes were taken into custody on suspicion. Within a few days, however, the charge was fastened upon Hunter, the husband of one or the victims. Evidence was brought no light that he had quarreled with his wife and had separated from her on account of her alleged unfaithfulness. This, it is believed, furnished the motive for the crimes.

On the afternoon of December 10 the attention of a passing patrolman was attracted to the house by hearing moans from within. A ghastly spectacle met the officer's eyes when he forced an entrance to the house. Sprawling hideously about the hall and rooms of their home, Mrs. Eliza Gribble, aged 70 years, and her daughter, Mrs. Ohlander, were found dead, while nearby lay Mrs. Hunter, dying, with her skull beaten in. A bloody ax on the floor showed how the women had come to their deaths.

The murders were not brutal. Mrs. Gribble was killed as she sat in her easy chair reading. Her gray hair was blood-clotted where the ax crushed her skull. Beside her body on the floor were her newspaper and her spectacles One blow, or two at the most sufficed to end her life. Mrs. Chandler had been killed evidently while she was attempting to defend her mother, and Mrs. Hunter, whose body was found near the door, had probably been struck down as she at tempted to escape from the house.

BIRDS KNOW THE GAME

They Are Masters of Movement Aerial Warfare

The bird's art in mastering the air has become vitally important in creating that new element in international politics-air-power. Aerial battleships must not only be perfectly navigated to gain strategic positions to the wind. word of the enemy, but practice has shown that birds even point the way to aggressive tactics in aerial war-

A hawk, attacking a chicken, folds its wings while high above the ground, and drops like a bullet on its prey, for the same reason that tigers and lions, after stealing upon their victims, sounce on them in one irresistible leap. These tactics prevent flight or defense. Animals that are the natural quarry of birds of prey seem to have dread of any object hovering above them. Instinct evidently warns them that the suddenness of such an attack is almost overwhelming. Mr. Dienst bach suggests that the swoop will be the most effective feature of the tactics of aerial warfare.

The Wrights, Paulhan and Lathan have found that while descending from great beights their flying machines involuntarily swoop. One of Paulhan's passengers recently said that coming down was "awful-like shooting the chutes." The more conservative Wrights have tried to check this speed of descent. To avoid swooing, Orville Wright made a spiralized descent when nding his highest flights over Potsdam in the summer of 1909. But the high fliers, Paulhan and Latham, make apractice of swooping from great altitudes. Paulhan, who is less of the dare-devil than the far-seeing aviator, found that the very force of the plunge sends the aeroplane up again when the rudders are manipulated near the ground, lifting the machine's front

An eagle swoops so suddenly on a cat that the prey fails to locate the point from which to expect the attack. For the same reason, men upon whom an air craft might swoop with the eagle's speed, would fail to fire efficiently. This situation would be similar to a cavalry charge, the nature of the surprise preventing the directing and concentrating of the fire of the aerfal foe. Under the most favorable conditions, cavalry requires more than a minute to deliver a charge. In comparison, the air craft would swoop like a falling stone.

Such an attack might be made with miles an hour. From a steady airguns would be fired with more exact ness than from a destroyer running thirty-two knots an hour. Thus the swoop seems destined to become vastly superior to any similar attack in tand or sea fighting, whether a charge by cavalry or by a torpedo boat. When surprised, an enemy's discomfiture should become intolerable, because of the leaden hall beginning with the inception of the swoop, and increasing furiously during the entire advance. Aiming back might then become highly improbable. In a few seconds one machine gun could concentrate a tre mendous fire which suggests that this weapon is an ideal one for the swoop -Century Magazine



Then there came half a dozen lasses from some workshop in the metropolis, their mourning wear running to no more than a black ribbon around the necks and tied in a bow under their chins, yet all sufficient for the sad needs of the hour, for their faces, too, were as quiet as those of their country cousins.

Here were smart, soldierly men, who held His Majesty's commission. Mingling with them were young civil serv ants from the adjacent government offices. 


