#### PHILADELPHIA IS AFTER MORE FRAUDS

Buit Brought Against Contractor and City Officials of That City.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 30.-A suit brought by taxpayers against Coutractor Edwin H. Vare and city officials, in connection with the award and execution of the 1910 contract for street cleaning in Philadelphia, was called for trial today. It is expected the trial will last a week or more. Vare was awarded the street cleaning contract on his bid to do the work for \$1,299,000. Conspiracy and fraud to the extent of \$75,000 is alleged in the complaint, and it is the petition of the plaintiffs that the contract be de clared void, and that Vare be compelled to surrender to the city treasury upwards of half a million dollars already received on his contract in addition to surrendering claim to the remainder.

#### FAILS IN FLIGHT ACROSS THE SEA FROM KEY WEST TO HAVANA, CUBA.

#### OIL SUPPLY GAVE OUT

Motors Ran Hot When Within Ten Miles of Cuban Coast-Life Buoy Keeps Him Afloat.

Key West, Fla., Jan. 30.-Because his supply of lubricating oil gave out J. A. McCurdy, one of the most dar ing aviators in the world, was com pelled to alight before completing his flight from Key West to Havana this marning. He lif with his machine ten miles from the Cuban shore unburt the pontoons carried with his craft and a life huny keeping him afloat un til he was rescued by a cruiser which

patrolled the coast for that purpose. McCurdy started his perilous flight before a crowd of ten thousand spec ators and was apparently more uncon cerned than any of the spectators. Calmly knocking the ashes from his pipe and mounting his machine he was off like a shot and in a few seconds was disappearing across the open sea at a speed of sixty miles an hour,

The air craft speedily oustripped four Government torpedo boat destroy ers and a revenue cut and a tug boat which started to follow him.

McCurdy had about 112 miles to fly about 90 of which were over water. He was within less than 20 miles of alight on account of his motors and propellors running hot.





## SEEKING RECALL OF

Battle on Part of Reformers.

Sa Francisco, Cal., Jan. 30.-This city today became the scene of the legal skirmishing in connection with the fight that is being waged by the Seattle reformers to bring about the recall of Mayor Hiram C. Gill of that city. In the United States Circuit Court of Appeals the case of Frank H. Scobey and others against City Comptroller W. J. Bothwell of Seattle, to enjoin the payment of warrants issued to defray the expenses of the special election called for Feb. 7 to vote on the Mayor's recall, came up for argument. The sult was brought to test the legality of the special election. The outcome of the fight is awaited with keen interest, owing largely to the fact that the contest is the only one of its kind in the history of American municipalities, with the exception of that rounds at Tacoma, which resulted in the recall of the Mayor of Los Angeles several years! ago. HENRI ROCHEFORT REACHES POUR-SCORE

Editor and Publicist of France Celebrates His Eightieth Birthday.

Paris, Ja. 30.-Henri Rochefort, for many years the foremost editor and publicist of France, celebrated his eightieth birthday anniversary today. The career of M. Rochefort has been a tumultuous one from his youth. In 1865 he began the publication of a. paper through whose columns he made violent attacks upon the imperial fam-The paper was suppressed and M. Rochefort escaped prison by fleeing to Belgium. When permitted to return to France a few years later he resumed his editorial onslaughts against the Government and was again committed to prison. On the proclamation of the Republic a year later he was released by the mob. The climax of his career came in 1871 when he was tried by court martial for his attacks on the government and sentenced to imprisonment for life. He was transported to New Caledonia. but effected his escape in 1874. The general amnesty of 1880 permitted him to return to Paris, where he has since spent his time chiefly in attacking all




