SOME GOOD WINTER PASTURE CROPS

Practically every stock farmer, especially hog and dairy farmers in the southwest, is face to face with how to carry the breeding herds through the winter without a great cash outlay for concentrated feeds.

C. M. Evans, Superintendent Agricultural Extension Department, A and M. College of Texas, at College Station, says: "Probably the greatest help along this line can be gotten first from winter pasture crops and second from winter root crops. A small portion of the land on which corn has failed can be made to supply a sufficient amount of succulent feed for all live stock on the farm if it is prepared at once. Plow the land four inches deep and harrow it once. Continue harrowing at least every ten days during the summer to conserve the moisture. Then as early as a permanent season is in the ground sow or plant some of the following crops: Rutabagers, Stock Beets, Stock Carrots and hairy Vetch. If the crop is wanted for winter pasturage alone the best mixture is 1 1/2 bushel of barley to 2 1/4 bushel of oats per acre. Either winter turf oats or northern grown Swedish Select Oats are the best to make a large growth of blades.

Burr Clover can be sown broadcast in permanent pastures. It can be sown at any time now and will germinate as soon as the fall rains come. From five to ten pounds of seed may be used per acre. It is best to run a spike tooth or disk harrow over the land after sowing.

Harry Vetch may be sown in oats. Seed of this, however, are rather high priced and weak in vitality so that except on favorable conditions it does not pay to bother with it.

Stock Beets planted on rich soil in drills and well cultivated often yield from 20 to 40 tons per acre. These seed also are of low vitality and it is best to sow about 8 pounds to the acre and then thin the plants to 12 inches in the rows.

Rutabagers are another very satisfactory root crop for winter, yielding as high as 15 tons to the acre at times. They should be sown in drills using from 3 to 4 pounds of seed per acre. Thin into a stand and cultivate well.

Stock Carrots are another valuable root crop and will yield 10 to 15 tons on rich loose loamy soil. About the same treatment as given rutabagers should be given carrots. The White Belgian and Yellow Victoria varieties are recommended. The carrot will stand more cold weather than either the rutabager or stock beet.

The quickest maturing and probably the surest producer of root feeds are the turnips. It is advisable to plant an early maturing and a later maturing variety. The purple top strap leaf is a standard early variety while the Amber Glove is of satisfactory winter variety. Turnips may be sown either in drills or broadcast. If broadcast about 1 to 2 pounds per acre will be required. If the seed are to be sown by hand mix a quantity of sand and seed to aid in even distribution of the seed.

All root crops should be planted as soon as a good season is in the ground. While stock can be maintained on them, it is never advisable to feed them alone. For a common herd to milk it is a good supplement to straw or hay for maintenance. For fattening or milking herd animals may be given all the roots they will eat and then additional hay and concentrated feeds besides.

The supporters of Woodrow Wilson in Texas favor a Democratic primary election to decide the matter of how the Texas delegation to the Democratic National convention shall vote. This is an evidence that the Wilson supporters are not afraid of the result. There is not much likelihood, however, that a presidential primary election will be held in Texas, principally for the reason that the power necessary for the ordering of such an election is not in the hands of the supporters of Wilson. The friends and supporters of Governor Harmon seem to have charge of the Democratic machinery in Texas, and they are of the opinion that their favorite will stand a better chance of getting the vote of the Texas delegation to the National Democratic convention by holding precinct and county conventions instead of a presidential primary election. Senator Culberson recommends the presidential primary, and there is no question but that method is the fairest—not particularly because Culberson has recommended it, but because it puts every man who votes a Democratic ticket on an equal footing, and by its method it is impossible for a

minority of the party to force its choice of candidates over a majority. If presidential primary elections were ordered and held on the same day in every state in the Union now or within the next thirty days, there is every reason to believe that Woodrow Wilson would be the choice of the Democrats by a very large majority. The supporters of Gov. Harmon however, are busy, and they are not going to take any chances if they can help it.

Those who have spent the hot summer months elsewhere and who are now returning, say Wichita Falls "looks good" to them yet. They have had opportunity to witness the activities in commercial life and town building in other portions of the United States, and return home with the firm conviction that Wichita Falls does not suffer a whit in comparison with the live wide-awake centers of population they have visited, many of which are several times larger in size. Now that most all have got back home, big projects are on foot, and bigger ones are in planning. A feeling of cheerfulness, of optimism, of unshaken faith is again felt. The summer is waning, the election is over, the legislature has adjourned, and the track for the "big things" talked of has been cleared. The election for a road bond law to determine whether or not precinct No. 1 shall vote bonds to the amount of \$150,000 has been ordered for October 13th, and notwithstanding that it will require a two-thirds majority to carry, the people of Wichita Falls and of Precinct No. 1 favor good roads and will vote the bonds by even a greater majority than the law requires. It is this spirit of upbuilding that keeps aglow the fires of ambition and forges the links of faith. It is the "dope" upon which optimism feeds, and the food is always nutritious. Wichita Falls is today attractive as much or more attention than any city of the State of equal size. The reasons for this are that there is opportunity offered here for investment that are not easily found elsewhere.

ABOUT THE GLASS FACTORY FUND

Some misunderstanding seems to be uppermost in the minds of the citizens of this city concerning the fund of \$10,000 pledged by the Chamber of Commerce toward the location of the Chanute Window Glass Company.

Seven thousand three hundred dollars of the sum needed has been pledged but there yet remains a balance of \$2,700 to be raised. This amount must be raised immediately that the agreement made may be carried out and the pledge of Wichita Falls fulfilled.

No part of the \$10,000 can have strings attached to it. The Chanute Window Glass Company must be left untrammelled in their selection of a site. The question of a site is entirely separate from that of the fund guaranteed. An offer has been made public looking toward the subscription to the guaranteed fund of \$2,500 provided a certain site is selected which has led many to believe that the fund is now entirely taken care of and the \$10,000 fully pledged. This is not the case for the following reason, namely: Should the Chanute Window Glass Company for any good reason refuse to accept the site incorporated in the contingent subscription of \$2,500 there would still remain the obligation on the part of the citizenship of this city to complete the fund originally made. The selection of site rests entirely with the Window Glass Company and the matter of subscription to the guaranteed fund is entirely separate and has hitherto been so considered by the committee in charge as well as the Glass Company.

Mr. Bostick, the secretary and general manager of the company, arrived in this city at noon and is in conference with the manufacturing committee, working out the final details looking toward the moving of the plant to this city. It is expected that the citizens of Wichita Falls will at once take steps to complete the fund necessary to be raised in order to assure this industrial factor in the life of this city. 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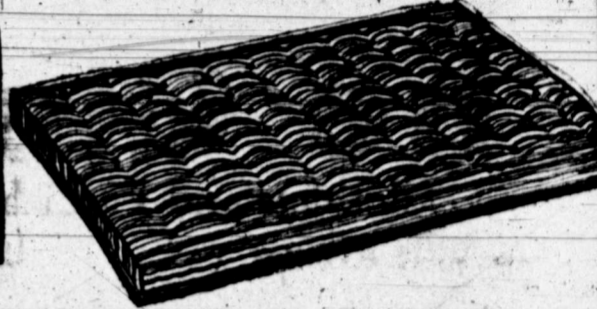

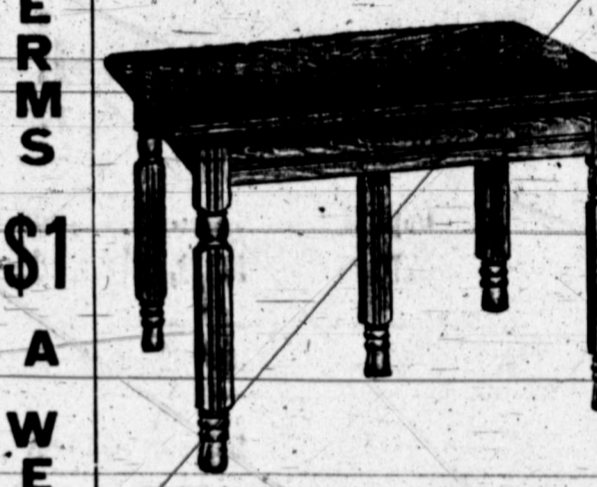
