## County leads region in benefit programs

Castro County is among the Panhandle-Plains leaders in the allotment of Food Stamp and Aid to Families with Dependent Children programs, according to published reports and figures supplied by the Texas Dept. of Human Resources.

In 1984, 1,732 persons received food stamps in the county, or 16.4% of the population. The total monthly cost for food stamps was \$72,246, and the cost for the year was \$822,679, resulting in an average benefit of \$200 monthly to each household receiving food stamps.

According to the April, 1985 figures, 1,612 persons in 356 households are receiving food stamps, or 15.27% of the county's residents. The dollar amount was not available from TDHR for April figures, but TDHR officials told the News they expected the number to pick back up in the summer months to the 1984 average, which has remained stable for the last three years.

341 persons, or 103 households, are receiving AFDC benefits, or 3.23% of the county. Dollar figures were not available on a county-by-county basis from TDHR, but averages for the region show an average benefit of \$173.86 goes

monthly to each family receiving AFDC benefits.

In Deaf Smith County, 13.9% of the county residents receive about \$41.50 per month, or \$181.21 per household per month, from food stamps.

April figures show 2,662 Deaf Smith County residents, or 12.58% of the population is receiving food stamps, with 3.11% receiving AFDC benefits.

In Swisher County, 999 residents, or 10.27% of the population, received \$38,748 per month last year. Currently, 9.62% of the population in Swisher county, or 935 persons, receive an average of \$41.44 per month, or \$153.76 per household receiving food stamp benefits.

249 Swisher County residents receive AFDC benefits, according to the March figures.

The Castro County figure was exceeded in this region only by Floyd County, with 17.5% of the population receiving food stamp benefits, but was left in the dust by counties in the Rio Grande Valley, where 49% of Starr County received over \$7 million in benefits to the 13,272 residents, and Zavala County, where 37.7% of the population received \$6.2 million in food stamps last year.

## City eyes landfill equipment, problem

The Dimmitt City Board of Aldermen tabled, until its June 17 meeting, proposals for a new landfill machine at the city's landfill site northeast of Dimmitt.

Aldermen are looking at proposals ranging from \$66,565 to \$163,348 for a new machine to compact Dimmitt's garbage and possibly dig new pits at the landfill, and are leaning toward the high end of the scale, but did not make a commitment Monday night at their regular meeting.

The machine the aldermen seem to be looking at hardest is a Bomag sanitary landfill compactor that could also be used in digging trenches at the landfill. The city would have to pay \$124,637 to buy the machine outright, or could buy the compactor on a lease-purchase arrangement for \$152,347.

Many of the aldermen saw

the machine in action last Wednesday at the landfill and seemed to be impressed with the machine.

According to Glenn Phillips of Plains Machinery in Lubbock, the compactor could add six months or more to the current eight-month life of the pits at the landfill.

City officials are worried about rumored regulations on the degree of compaction that must be obtained in landfills, but City Manager Paul Catoe said he doesn't believe the state or federal government could possibly enforce the regulations in cities the size of Dimmitt and smaller.

Aldermen are also worried about the cost and manhours involved in digging pits at the landfill. City Public Works Director James Killough said the work, which is usually contracted at least in part, costs

the city about 69¢ a cubic yard, and the next pit at the landfill, which is to be 1,200 feet long, will cost about \$12,000.

Alderman David Hays said the city would have to invest about 240 manhours and tie up a machine for five to six weeks in digging the pit, and made the motion to table consideration of the purchase of any machine until the next session. Hays also asked that a workshop session be called for the aldermen to further consider the landfill situation.

Aldermen also expressed concern over a possible move by the county to close a landfill site near Nazareth, but are planning no action concerning that possibility at this time.

The aldermen agreed to accept the bid of \$4,700 for a new shredder from Bob Towler Equipment Co., provided the

## Wheat harvest slowed by rain

A few test cuttings and "getting at the corners" started the 1985 wheat harvest in the county over the weekend before rains Monday afternoon and Tuesday brought the reaping to a standstill until at least the weekend.

Monday's light showers gave way to moderate to heavy rain throughout the county Tuesday.

Over six inches of rain fell to the east-southeast of Hart Tuesday, while Farmers Grain in Hart reported 5.25 inches of rain for Monday and Tuesday.

The State Highway Dept. closed FM 145 Wednesday morning east of Hart, with water reportedly four to five feet over the roadbed. Officials said they would try to pump some of the water off of the highway, but "the lake is full and it may be some time" before the road is cleared enough for travel.

## Ogallala depletion slows dramatically

Net depletion of the Ogallala Aquifer has slowed dramatically in the past five years, with 1984 figures showing a huge decline in the amount of water being taken from the area's primary water source, according to figures released this week by the High Plains Underground Water District.

The decrease in water consumption over the last year, and a decrease over the last 10 years, comes in spite of increased plantings of water-intensive crops, especially corn, throughout the HPUWD area.

During 1984, only 601,509 acre feet of water was taken from the aquifer, according to HPUWD figures. This compares to a 25-year average of 1.3 million acre feet per year, and shows continued improvement in conservation practices and declining irrigation over the past five years.

During the 1975-1980 period, average annual depletion was 1.25 million acre feet, with the average dipping to 777,336 acre feet per year during 1980-1985. The 1984 depletion rate represents only 59% of the ten-year net depletion rate average for 1975-1984.

"There are numerous reasons for the decrease in consumption," said Kathy Redeker of HPUWD in Lubbock. "The most notable is the relatively stable or declining farm prices compared to ever-increasing production costs. One example is the 400% or more increase in energy prices to pump the

water. "Interest costs have tremendously affected the irrigator, too, but there have been tremendous improvements by irrigators in water use efficiency."

But what if the ag economy turns around, and it becomes profitable to produce water for irrigation? Wayne Wyatt, HPUWD manager, believes producers have learned their water lessons.

"Once the new technology is in place and improved conservation habits are developed by

# Guyer cycling to 49 states

"I've been in six states in the last month, and this is the first real rain I've seen."

Sean Guyer had the misfortune of bicycling into the Texas Panhandle Monday and Tuesday, and spent most of Tuesday in Dimmitt before resuming his third-annual cross-country bicycle trip.

By mid-September, Guyer will have been in 49 of the 50 states in the last three years—everywhere but Alaska. He lived in Hawaii for a short time, and rode his bike there.

Guyer, who lives near Cocoa Beach, Fla. while not riding, started his first east-west trip in Santa Barbara, Calif. on May 8, and pedaled through California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah and New Mexico before entering Texas near Bovina Monday.

He spent Monday night in his tent, which he pitched in a field near Tam Anne, and biked into Dimmitt Tuesday morning when the rain which pelted the region forced him to spend the day here.

Guyer visited the museum and spent a few hours at

inches this week, including 1.35 Tuesday, while reports to the west and north of Dimmitt showed about two inches for the week.

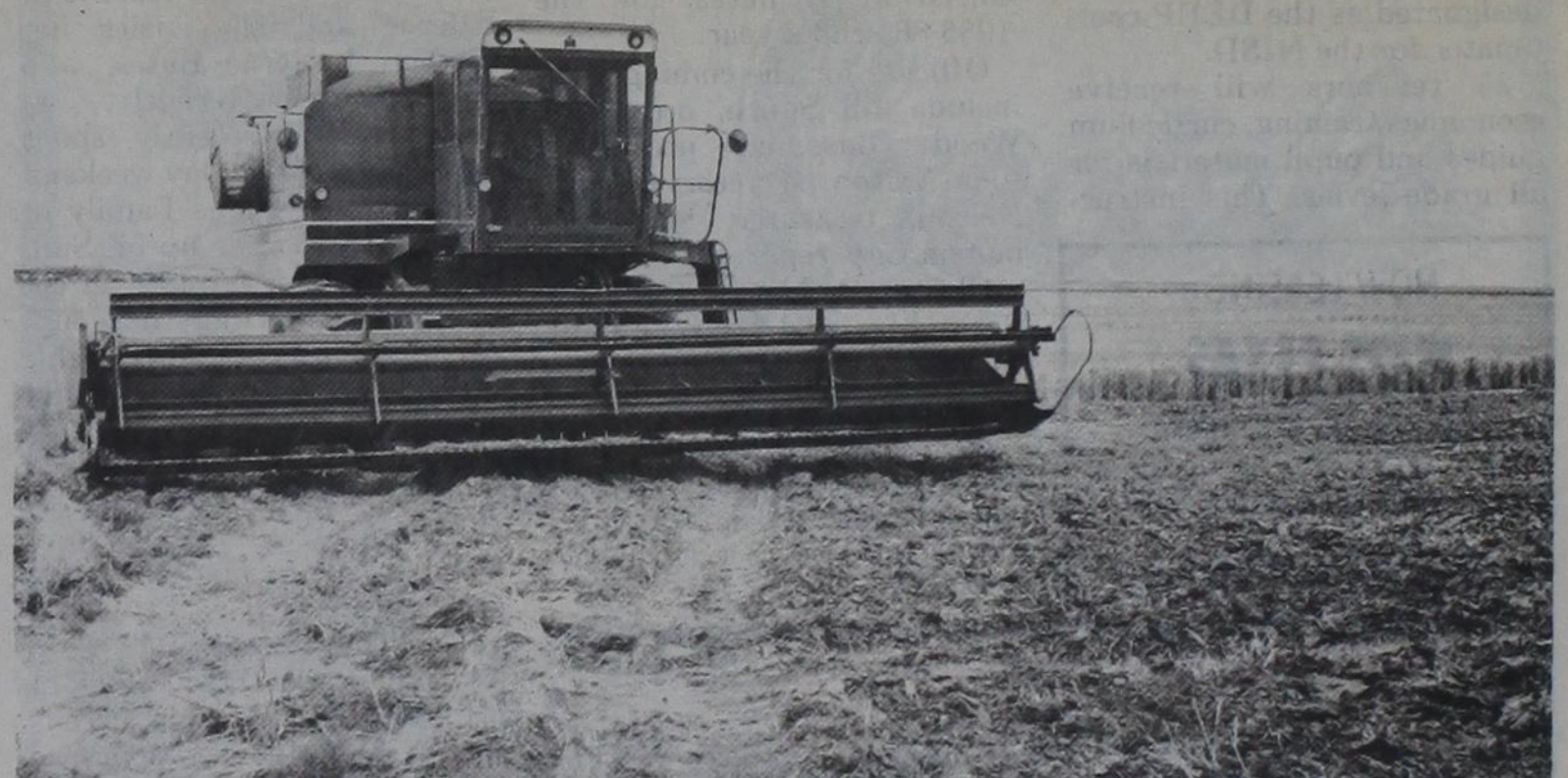
The first load of wheat in the county was cut by Ricky Mit-

chell Monday morning to Farmers Grain of Hart. The wheat tested at 58 bushels per acre.

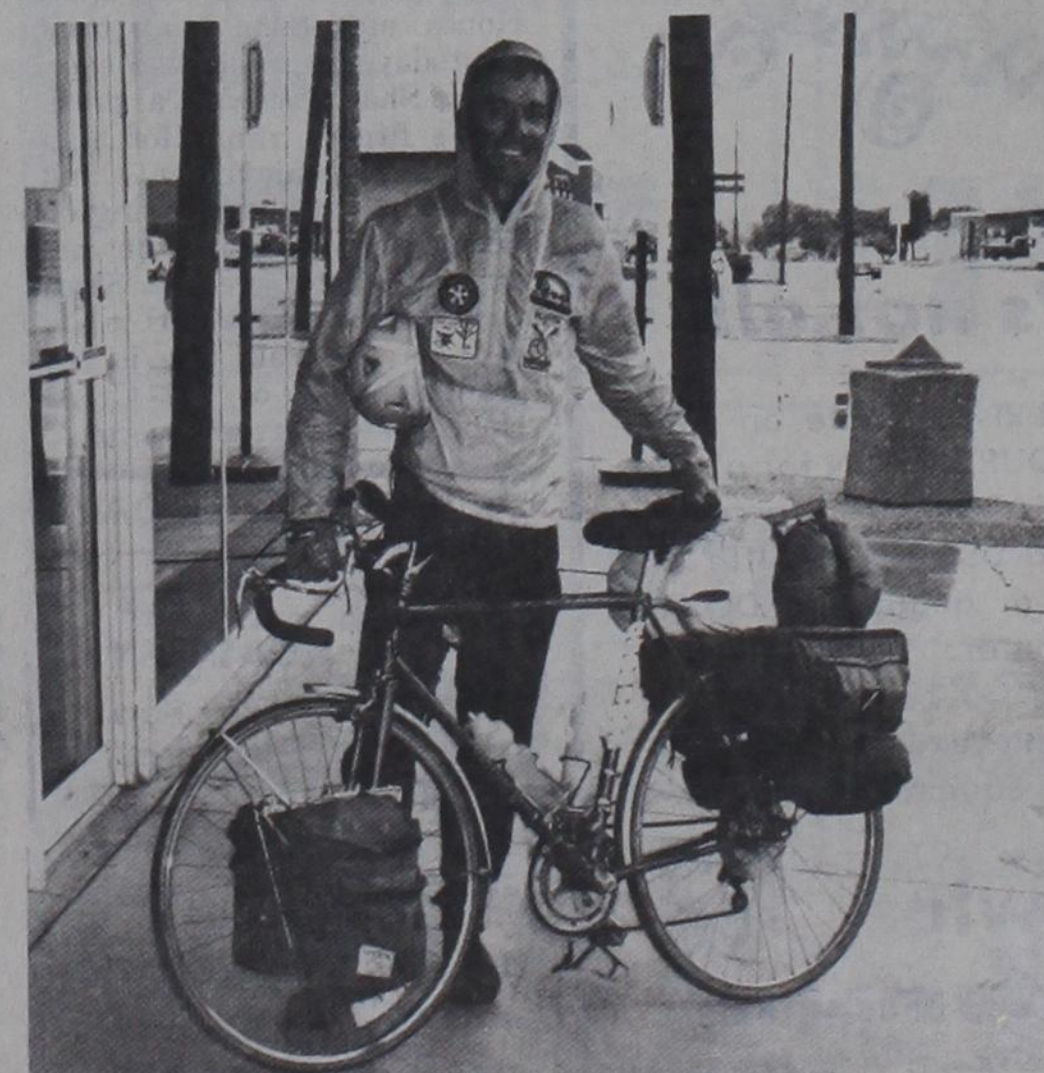
"That wheat was dryland, and looked pretty good, as does most of the wheat around

Guyer hopes to go to Burk-burnett by week's end before going into Oklahoma.

"I'm going to try to visit all of the states, except Alaska, that I haven't been through before," Guyer said. "I'll be making an 'S' through Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, and the Dakotas. I should be through sometime in September."

Two years ago, Guyer biked through the eastern seaboard, and last year traveled over the far west.

"Everything is big in Texas, including this rain," Guyer said. "I had seen nothing but a trace of rain in New Mexico before I got into Texas Monday."

Guyer came across the border near Grady and biked to Bovina Monday night. He keeps a diary daily, and Monday night wrote:

"It is as peaceful as yesterday ... Agriculture is kir-

Elected to head the Golf Scramble and refreshment committees were Kerry Lewis and Todd Durham.

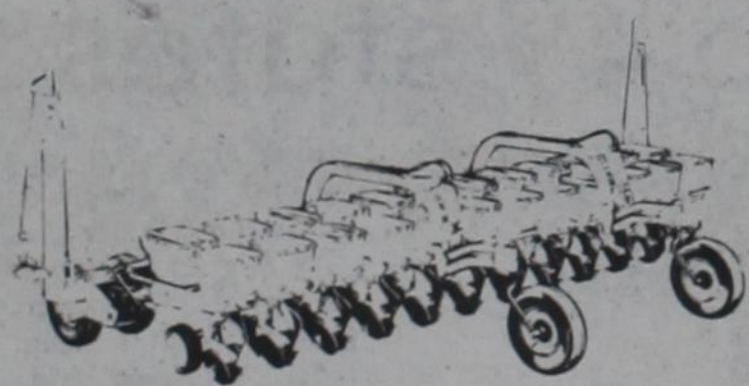

### VETERAN'S SERVICES

NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q—Will the VA furnish a headstone or marker when a veteran's remains are donated to science?

A—Yes. A memorial headstone or marker will be furnished when requested, at the expense of the United States, to commemorate any veteran whose remains were donated to science; were cremated and the ashes scattered without interment of any portion of the ashes; whose remains have not been recovered or identified; or whose remains were buried at sea, whether by the veteran's choice or otherwise. Placement of the memorial marker must be in a National Cemetery, in a state veteran's cemetery or, by the applicant, in any local or private cemetery.

Q—I would like to know who is the beneficiary on my father's NSLI insurance policy. Who may I write to for this information?

A—The VA Regional Office and Insurance Center with jurisdiction of the policy (either Philadelphia, Penn. 19102 or St. Paul, Minn. 55111) can provide this information, normally only to the policyholder.

Q—I receive service-connected disability compensation and have a rating of 30%. I just got married. Can I receive additional funds for my wife?

A—Yes. Veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated at 30% or more are entitled to additional allowances for dependents.

# Babbling Brooks

About the last 20 years and the former Real Thing...

20 years ago, something hit this town that has turned it upside down, improved it, made life ideal here...

What else can I say about the time I've lived here? It's all been good.

How can I remember the date? It's easy. It's the same day the tornado ripped through Hale Center.

Our car, pickup and U-Haul pulled into Dimmitt the same time the tornado ripped through Hale Center. The next day, my stepfather took us all to Lubbock, and, natch, we went through Hale Center. Right down Fifth Street, where the destruction was the worst.

It made me VERY homesick for the desert of Arizona, where these, ... these THINGS just didn't happen. I sure didn't want one to happen to me.

Of course, Dimmitt hasn't been hit by a tornado, while my hometown, Coolidge, has had two.

Other things have changed.

20 years ago, there were very few houses on Maple, and Oak was just starting. There was a BIG vacant area just east of Dimmitt Wheat Growers. The only baseball park in town was south of the county fair barns. The library was in the courthouse basement.

There was just one bank, and one savings and loan. If you played golf, you went to Hereford. If you swam, you did it at the city pool or Colonial Inn. The boys basketball team hadn't been to the state tournament in 12 years, and was coming off a 13-12 season.

There were many things that were different, smaller, not as good back then. I'd like to take credit here and now for all of the good things that have happened in the last 20 years. I know I don't deserve all of the credit, but I can't think of a better reason.

Another thing that is different than it was 20 years ago, different than it was 20 weeks ago, is Coke. We talked about it earlier, and we've decided Coke did not sell out to Pepsi... it tastes just like an RC.

Thanks to the Dallas Morning News, we have something you might try if you're in the mood for:

THE REAL THING 3/4 oz. of fluid extract of coca and cola; 2 oz. citric acid; 4 oz. citrate of caffeine; 30 lbs. sugar; 2 pints lime juice; 1 oz. vanilla; 2 1/2 gals. water.

I don't know if you cook it or anything, but this is supposed to be IT.

I'm neither for nor against apathy.

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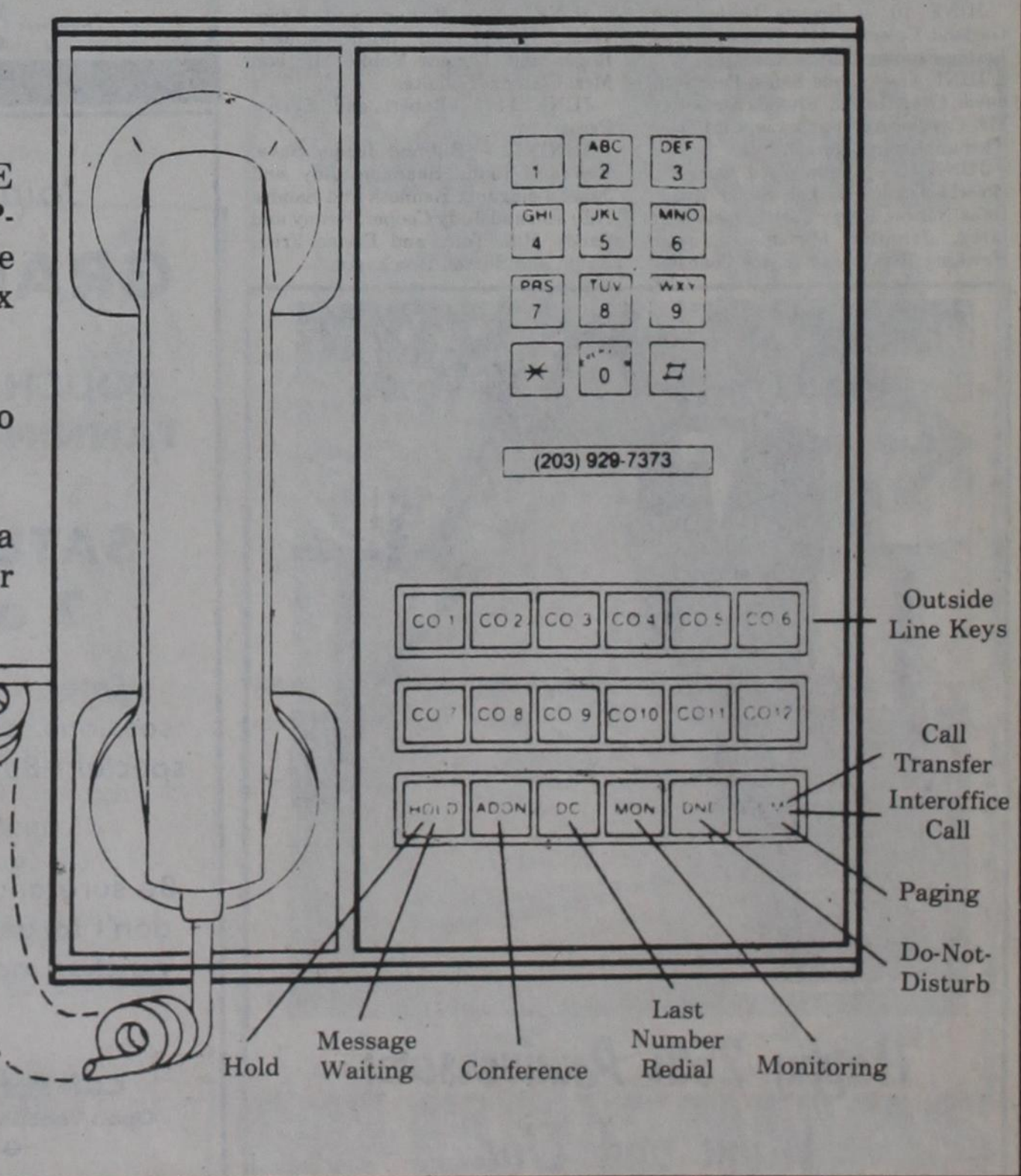

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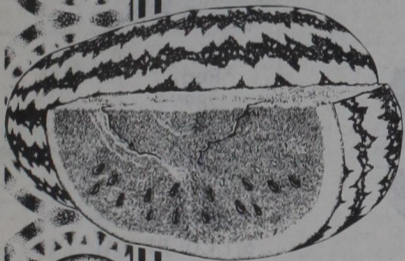

sitional generation in history — one that went from covered wagon to the Jet Age in a lifetime.

He worked with Dad on the Amherst Reporter in the late 1930s and on this newspaper in the late '40s and early '50s. He owned newspapers at Kerens and Paint Rock (using hand-set type), at Miles and Rowena (using Linotype machines), and finished out his career with the Victoria Advocate, where he saw the Linotype give way to the computer.

He was 40 when he and Bernice married in Amherst, and well into his 50s when it came time to do his Boy Scouting with Tommy. I remember him telling me about the adventures of wilderness camp. He had been through it all before — for real, on the wagon trail, when he was 12 — and he confessed with a guilty grin that he had smuggled matches into camp.

He was a nice guy, and we'll miss him.

A trip from the Panhandle to the Gulf Coast this time of year reminds one of just how big this state of ours is.

Our corn is only a foot high, but in South Texas it's already full-grown, and they're picking roasting ears. I don't know what it will mean at harvest time here, but we saw more corn in central and southern Texas than we've ever seen.

In the cotton and peanut country from the Rolling Plains south, they've had so much rain that many farmers haven't been able to plant yet.

Coming home Friday, we read in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that Thursday's 103-degree reading had broken a record set there in 1928. And at Sweetwater, they told us it had gone to 107. When we got home late Friday afternoon, the temperature was about 15 degrees more civilized.

The Supreme Court's Monday ruling that struck down an Alabama law allowing public-school students to start their class day with a minute of "silent meditation" has upset a lot of people.

Surveys show that most Americans favor prayer in public schools.

But it may surprise you to know that some of those most opposed to it are ministers.

After the Supreme Court made its original ruling that banned a state-prescribed prayer in New York public schools, I polled a group of ministers for their reactions, and was surprised to find that most of them agreed with the court.

"Many of the democratic principles adopted by our founding fathers were taken from the structure of the early Presbyterian church," a Presbyterian minister said. "That included a strict separation of church and state. Religious intolerance was what brought a lot of people to this country, and complete religious freedom was important to them. What right does the government have to authorize or prescribe a prayer for children of all religions and

denominations? Religious training is the duty of the home and church, not the state. If a person wants to pray, he or she can pray anytime, anywhere, privately."

Under the Supreme Court decisions, no state law can direct prayer in public schools. But also, no state law will ever stop prayer.

As one woman in the US Senate commented, "As long as there's math, there'll be prayer in the schools."

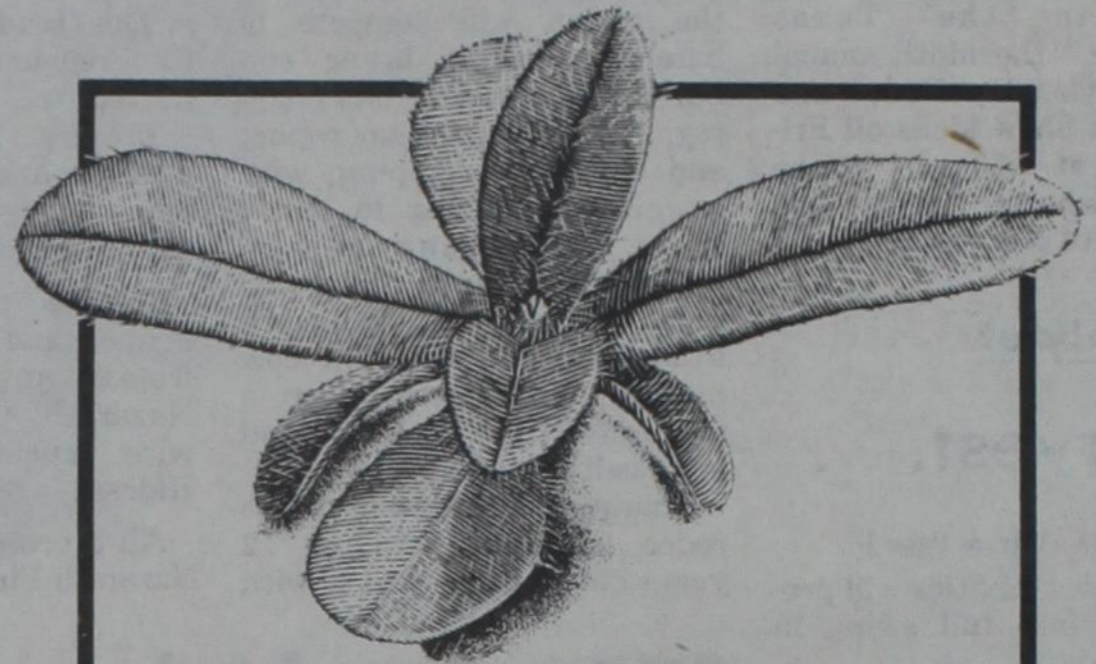

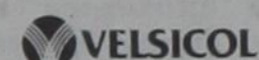

A few other short loads of wheat had been brought in to scattered elevators in the county before Monday's light showers brought an end to any cutting plans the first day of the week and Tuesday's showers stopped harvesting operations.

A few loads of barley were also brought in over the weekend, but most of the crop in the county, which amounts to less than 500 acres, won't be ready for harvest for at least another week.

### Turkey restocking used in Panhandle

The Texas Wild Turkey Federation Inc. has donated \$820 to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept.'s upland game program for purchase of two nets for capturing wild turkeys.

Don Wilson, turkey program leader, said the nets will be used in Rio Grande turkey trapping efforts in the Texas Panhandle. "We hope to really accelerate our turkey trapping and restocking efforts during the next few years, and these nets will help us do that," said Wilson.

Most of the surplus turkeys trapped in the Panhandle are released in selected sites along the eastern fringe of Rio Grande turkey habitat to create self-sustained and huntable populations of birds, Wilson explained.

## STEP nets highest number of DWI's ever

DWI continues to be a problem in Randall and Castro counties. This was made evident by figures released by the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, which showed the results of the DWI STEP for April. This STEP Program is funded by the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation and is worked by off-duty troopers.

Sergeant Harold Price, STEP coordinator for Castro County, advised that 34 persons were arrested for driving while intoxicated by STEP units during the month of April. "This number is in addition to the numerous DWI arrests made by troopers working regular shifts, and other law enforcement agencies in the county," Price said.

Records indicate that 25 DWI arrests were made in Randall County during April. These figures represent the highest monthly totals for both counties since the crackdown started back in December 1984. Although these special units are concentrating on removing the drinking driver from our roads, they are also enforcing other traffic laws. Along with the DWI arrests in April, overtime troopers also issued 239 citations and 251 warnings for various traffic offenses.

"What we're trying to do is educate the public that being killed or injured by a drunk driver is not a natural phenomenon, its not something we have to put up with," Price stated. "With the new DWI laws, a drinking driver has more to lose than ever before. But regardless of what is said and written, or what the law is, some are going to drink and drive."

This extra effort to combat DWI offenders in Randall and Castro Counties has obviously made our highways a safer place for the motoring public. STEP is scheduled to continue through August.

The barn which housed the pickup was forced open.

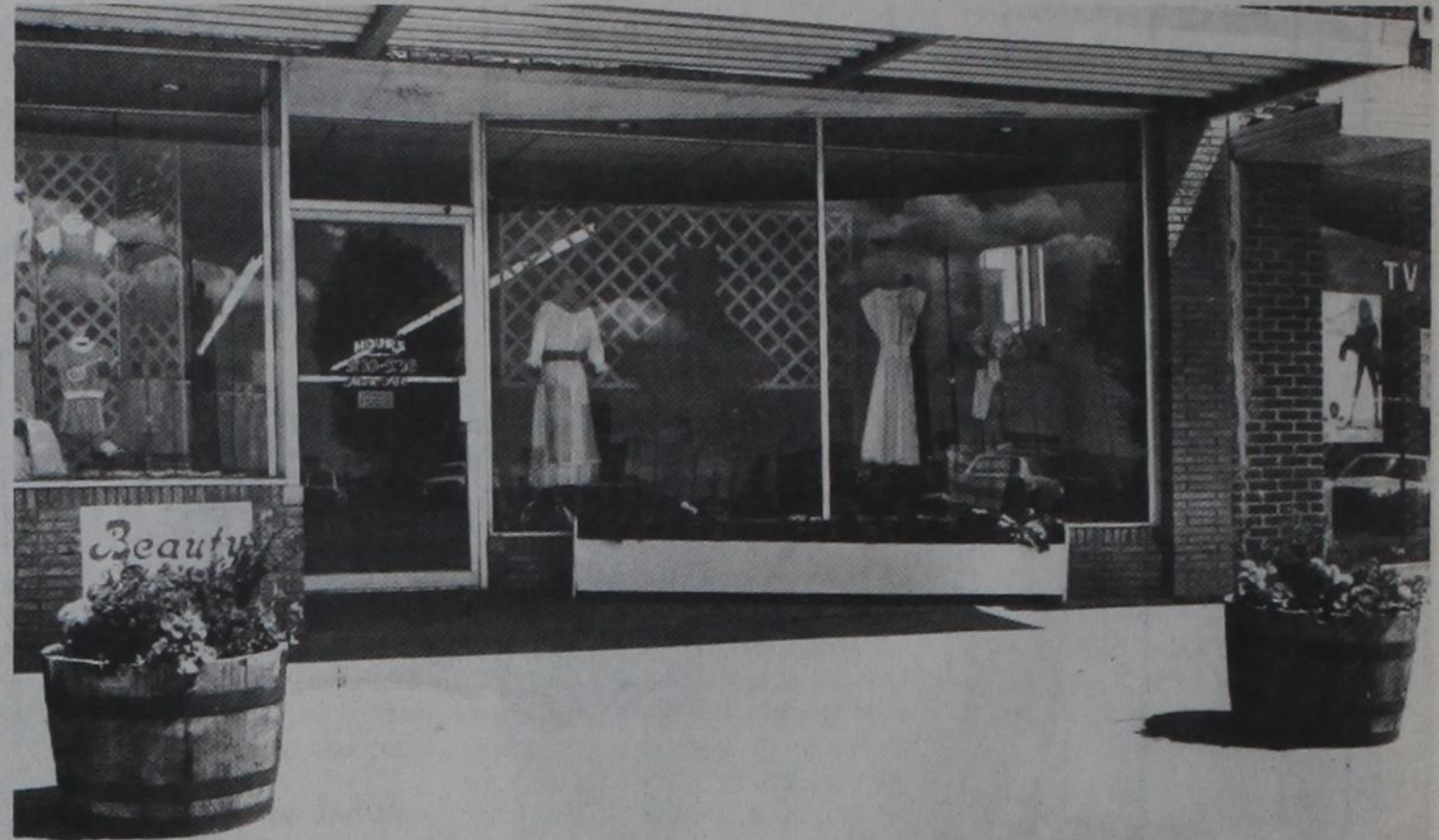

## Freddy, are you ready to try bran spaghetti?

Bran muffins, bread and cereals are well-known as foods that add fiber to the diet. Now spaghetti made with 10% bran can be added to that list.

"Spaghetti containing bran has more than three times as much dietary fiber and higher mineral content than regular spaghetti," says Marilyn A. Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Spaghetti with bran also passes the taste test with many consumers. Research conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) found that tasters who prefer whole wheat bread to white bread usually liked bran spaghetti better than spaghetti without bran, Haggard reports.

Pastas, such as spaghetti, are low in sodium, fat and simple carbohydrates and contain a high level of complex carbohydrates, she says.

The 10% bran spaghetti also contains much higher levels of

protein, iron, calcium, manganese, phosphorous and zinc than spaghetti without bran.

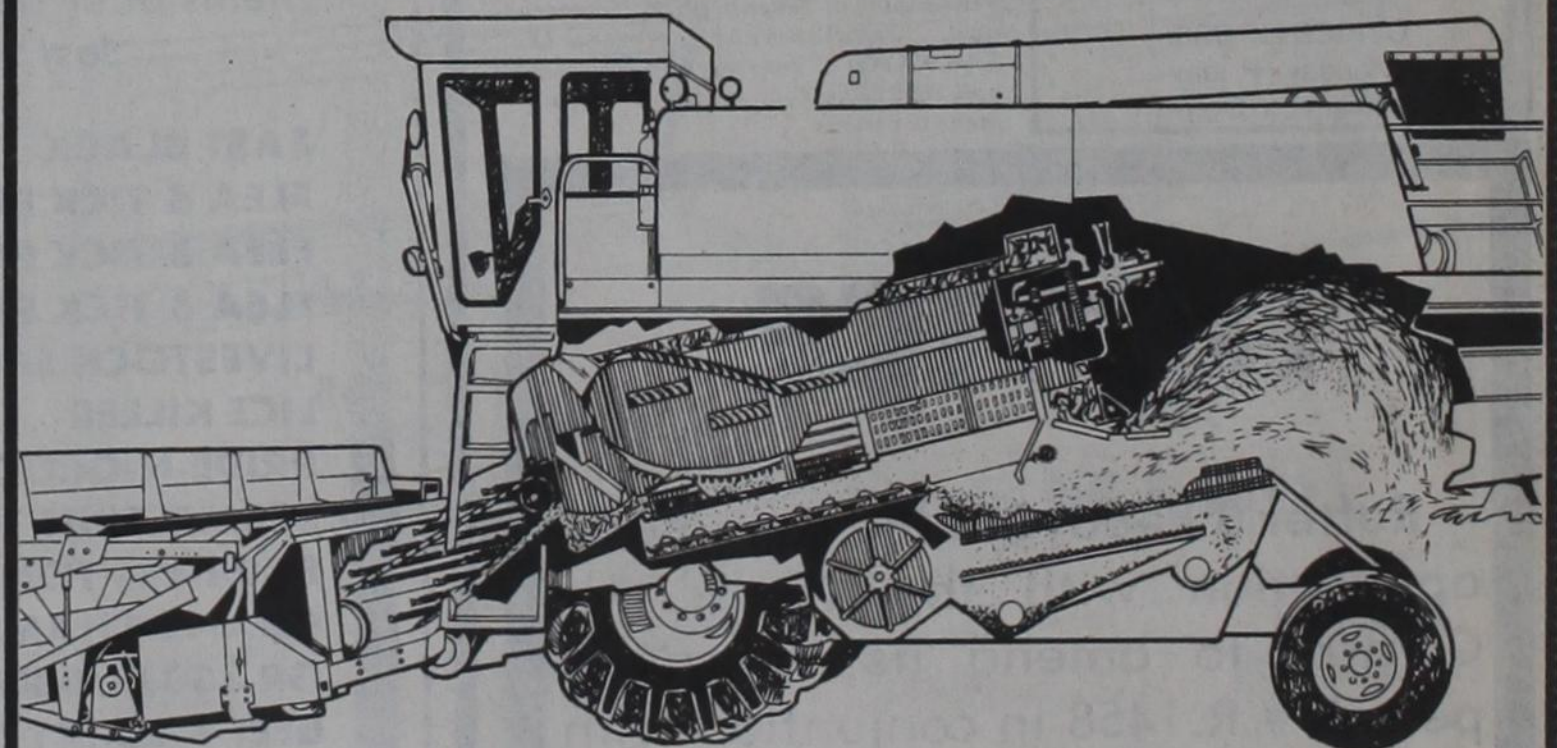

### Insects of interest

## Bagworms dangerous

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas.

Spring hatch usually begins in May on the South Plains, and insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. Soon they begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs, and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1½ inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate, and the females lay eggs inside their bags.

They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1,500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuringiensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

## Working women need a vacation

Many of the women who most need a vacation are least likely to have one, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Women who work full-time jobs and then come home to cook, keep house, sew and play chauffeur, often with little help from other family members, have the equivalent of two full-time jobs," says family life

specialist Diane T. Welch.

These women may be in a double bind at vacation time, she explains. Some tend to save up chores like sewing, house-cleaning, gardening or house painting to do on their vacation time.

Others may continue to carry the burden of house-cleaning, cooking and other tasks while the family vacations in a camper, cabin or condo. The surroundings may change, but the work doesn't.

Employed women who "vacation" in this manner are getting no vacation at all, says the specialist. "They return to work exhausted, but in a different way."

When vacation time comes around, employed women

should have a plan for using the time for self-renewal, she advises.

"Plan some time to relax completely when you do absolutely nothing and to do some activities just for enjoyment," Welch says.

Everyone — especially busy working women — need some true leisure time on vacation in order to go back to work renewed and refreshed, concludes the specialist.

## Social Security in Castro County

Several firms are operating across the nation that solicit people through direct mail and advertisement in various publications. These firms are selling services which are provided at no charge by every social security office.

The most common is the company which obtains local marriage records and then mails new brides an offer to change their name in social security records for a \$10 fee. This service can be obtained without charge at any social security office. In addition, the bride has to do everything for the company she would have to do if she contacted social security in the first place.

For a bride to change her name in social security records, she needs the original or certified copy of her marriage certificate showing both her new and old names. The bride can contact the Plainview social security office simply by calling 293-9623 to start the process.

The other service being sold is to obtain a copy of a person's record of earnings covered by social security or providing an estimate of future social security benefits. These, too, can be obtained through any social security office without any charge.

To get a statement of earnings covered by social security, all a person has to do is get Form SSA-7004PC, available free at any social security office, complete it, and mail it. In return he or she will receive an extract of his or her social security record.

People younger than 60 can get a benefit estimate by making the request on the form. People 60 or older can get an immediate benefit estimate at any social security office. There is no charge for these services.
