EXTENSION OF NORTHWESTERN IS RAPIDLY NEARING COM-PLETION.

IS SURVEYED TO SAYRE MAKES THREE - SPEECHES

Work on Line to Choctaw to be Start ed Soon-Thompson Due October 1st.

The Wichita Falls and Northwestern will be in operation as far north as Mangum by October 20, according to announcement at the offices of that road this morning. The construction gangs are hard at work beyond Altus and good progress is being made. Beyond Mangum, a survey has been made to Sayre on the Chocta division of the Rock Island, where the next extension will be. It has not yet been decided whether the road will go to Sayre or Elk City but this will be settled as soon as the Mangum extension is com-

R. A. Thompson, who will be again connected with the Northwestern, is due to assume his duties with that road on the forst of October, next Friday. He has not yet arrived.

The management of the road has not yet given out anything regarding the proposed extension from Sayre or Elk City to Woodward, concerning which several items have appeared in Oklahoma papers recently. This extension is contemplated but is not thought to be among the nearly plans of the road.

Individual Method is Elected By About Forty Banks Out of Five Hun-

Austin, Sept. 29 .- Since the bank guaranty law became effective about six weeks ago, the state banks have been notifying the department of banking of their choice of one or the other of these methods and to date four hundred and forty-one have adopted the

assessment plan. It appeared at first that the bonding plan was without friends, but one or two banks announced in favor of it and a number of others quickly got in line, there being a total of forty-four. Thirty banks have not yet indicated any selection, but will probably do so before the end of the year, when the law really becomes effective so far as depositors are concerned.

PRESIDENTS WILL CROSS BOUN-DARY LINE, BUT FLAGS AND SOLDIERS WILL NOT.

IS NOW IN NORTHWEST

Swing of Circle Will Soon Be South ward to Califronia and Then-Texas

El Paso, Sept. 28 .- The offical program for the meeting of presidents Taft and Diaz at El Paso and Juraez made strictly international. The program consists of two visits by Taft to Mexico and one by Diaz to the United States. No troops of either country will cross the boundary nor will flags of either nation be carried across the line.

El Paso, Sept. 28.-When Presidents Taft and Diaz meet here on October 16th, they will cross the border to visit each other, but no troops will accompany either executive and no flags will be carried across. A large number of Mexican troops will be assembled. at Juarez and about four thousand American regulars will be stationed at El Paso, but neither will cross the Rio Grande. Taft will wear a dress suit and Diaz a uniform. An interpreter will be on hand at the conference but Taft may choose to speak Spanish which he learned in Cuba and the Philippines.

Helena, Mont., Sept. 28 .- The feature of President Taft's visit here yesterday was his visit to the old Leonard copper mine at Butte. The presidential party went down 1200 feet into the earth, exploring the famous mine with electric lanterns and enjoying the novel experience thoroughly.

The Aldrich-Vreeland Act Will I No Longer Effective After July, 1914.

Washoington, D. C., Sept. 27,-In something less than five years, to be exact, on June 30, 1914, the Aldrich-Vreeland financial act will expire by limitation, and unless before that time it is replaced by a wisely-framed measure of broad scope, the country will again be in the perilous situation that is commonly believed to have resulted in the panic of 1907-08. There is a general realization of the necessity of legislation on this subject, but wide difference as to far. Speaker Cannon believes that a mere extension of the present law, with perhaps a few amendments in details, will suffice. President Taft looks with favor upon the proposition to create a great central bank, and there are all sorts of intermediate schemes, Probably that which commands the greatest support will be based upon the recommendations of the Monetary Commission, which has been quietly but effectively at work for more than a year gathering material for the construction of the actual legislation. A campaign of education is about to

begins, for it is understood by Senator Aldrich, who heads the Commission and by the students of finance, that it will be difficult to arouse the interest of the mass of the people in the details of this rather abstrause subject, and that only by general agitation can the National Legislature be brought to the point of action. If it required ten years to bring about a revision of the tariff, certainly a period of less than five years is none too long to perfect and enact legislation on a subject so complex and important as is involved in a general revision of the entire financial system of the republic. Therefore, soon after the return to America from Europe of Senator Aldrich and Professor Andrews and other members of the commission, which is expected to be about the middle of next month, preparations will be made for the publication of the preliminary report of the commission, and it is hoped that this can be ready for submission to Congress when it re-assembles in December. This will be only the beginning, for the full report is to be comprehencompleted within another year, but this will serve the purpose of directing public attention to this important subject and will afford the Senators and representatives material for study to fit themselves to grapple knowingly with such legislation as may ultimately be proposed by the Monetary Commis-

Congress will be fixed at 225,000 for each congressional district. The increase in population it is asserted, will entitle Texas to six more congressional districts ,making a total of twenty-two in all. The population of this, the Thirteenth District is given as 373,000, and that of the El Paso District as 450,000. The latter, without disturbing its lines other than dividing it in half, has sufficient population to entitle it to two congressmen. By cutting off a few counties on the district adjoining the Thirteenth, another district could be made, and doubtless this will be done when the time comes for edistricting the state.

"Since that time a reaction has set in and there has been a movement in the direction of the greater simplicity. This has taken two forms, as exemplified in the census of 1900 and 1905 In 1900, the schedule was simplified materially by the elimination of certain inquiries and the consolidation of others, notably the inquiries in regard to capital and employees. THE STATE APPORTIONMENT FOR WICHITA FALLS DISTRICT IS TOTAL OF \$8,916.50.

Many Families Have Moved In From Other Points-Total Revenue is Large.

Wichita Falls will receive a total of \$8,916.50 from the public school fund of the state for the support of the schools of the Wichita Independent School District this year, being entitled to the sum of \$6.25 for every child of scholastic age. There are 1,426 children of scholastic age in the districtaccording to the school enumeration, which gives the above amount.

This amount does not include the apportionments for transfers, which will be quite material, as a large number of new families have moved into this city since the beginning of the year, entitling the schools of this city to a certain proportionment of the individual apportionment.

The direct tax of fifty cents per \$100 valuation for the district, figured on the city valuations will give the schools an additional revenue of over-eighteen thousand dollars and the total income for the support of Wichita's Institutions during the present session will be over twenty-six thousand dollars.
