



IRISH SECTION HAND IS RAPIDLY PASSING

Succeeded by Sleepy, But Steady Mexicans.

Twenty years ago the Irishman with his clay pipe was a common sight on the railroad. Natives of Erin's sod took readily to railroad labor, and they made up the section gangs generally in the western country. But the old Irishman is now living with his son, who is the section foreman, or the roadmaster, or has gone higher up in the service, or engaged in other business. The young Irishman soon took on the American spirit, and the section 1,672 did not appeal to him and when he got on his feet, he relieved the old man

1,052 of his burden. The section gangs in the west now are composed of Mexicans, and their service is satisfactory to the railroads. True, they are slow, but all section laborers are slow. However, the Mexicans are steady workers, easily handled and fairly intelligent. With a white foreman, they soon learn their duties and perform them as well as could be

673 expected under the circumstances. Homesickness is the greatest trouble with the Mexicans, who are very clannish. They will go back to Mexico, visit their famililes for a week. and then return to their railroad work. 1,134 This is rather expensive for day la borers on the section, but the Mexicans don't count expenses when they have the price. And it is surprising the amount of money the Mexicans can save out of their pay. They live simply and often the poorly clad Mexican laborer who can live a day on five cents worth of chili is able to dig up more ready cash than the man with ten times his income,


