



IF you are a June bride, perhaps a few pointers on menu plan-ning will prove a decided help. To begin with, there are a number of important factors to consider. The age, occupations and sex of the people, you are to serve influence the choice of foods to a great degree. The amount of money you can afford to spend, the ability of the cook—whether it be you yourself or someone else—and the amount of help in the kitchen also determine what you can have

More than this, the needs of the body must be supplied in every meal of the day. The well-bal-anced menu contains, first, fuel foods to furnish heat and energy for the activities of the body.
