#### STORES CLOSE AT ARDMORE FOR THE DAY

Americans and Mexicans Jam Carter County Courtroom for Hearing.

ARDMORE, Okla., June 10.—Salvador Cortes Rubio, nephew of President Ortiz Rubio of Mexico, testified today that the officers who shot his two companions to death did not identify themselves as officers until after the shooting.

He was the first witness in the hearing of Deputy Sheriff William Guess and Cecil Crosby, charged with murder in the slaying of Emilio Cortes Rubio and Manuel Garcia Gomez, prominent Mexican students.

The Carter county courtroom was jammed with spectators. More than 1,000 persons, including Americans and Mexicans, lined the walls and fought for seats. Judge Charles Champion ordered the doors closed to prevent the crowd from overflowing the room.

The state scored a point, attorneys said, when Matthew Alexander, Ardmore policeman who answered the emergency call after the shooting, testified the street where the car was parked was so dark he had to open the door before he could tell whether the car was occupied.

Under cross-examination by County Attorney Marvin Schilling, Alexander said he could not see any guns in the car, but told Defense Attorney J. B. Champion that perhaps Guess saw the pearl-handled revolver which one of the boys had.

#### OPENING DATE WILL BE SET IN FEW DAYS

Work Starts Today on Clearing Pool and Getting It in Good Condition.

Members of the Lions club swimming pool committee announced today that arrangements had been completed for the opening of the swimming pool formerly known as The Willows, and that it would be ready for the public within a week or ten days. Definite arrangements of the opening date will be made within the next few days.

The work of cleaning out the pool and renovating it thoroughly started today and it was estimated that it would require about one week to complete the work. The grounds are to be beautified and everything done to make the pool as attractive and convenient as is possible. With the natural beauty and convenience it will probably make one of the most desirable recreation centers in this part of the state.

All facilities possible are to be used in making the pool sanitary as the cleanliness is considered one of the paramount necessities toward its success. It is planned to drain and refill the pool several times during the season and to have the water circulated through a purifying process all the time the pool is in operation. In this way the water will be purified every 24 hours.

The Lions Club is to operate the swimming hole on a non-profit basis and a nominal charge is to be placed on the admission to the pool. Bathing suits and towels will be available to those who do not have them and a nominal charge will be made on the services.

It is planned to hold a band concert on the opening night through the cooperation of the Lone Star Gasoline company and the Lone Star Gas company. It is possible that the weekly concert that have been planned by the band through the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce will also be held there each week.

A man and his wife are to be employed to take charge of the pool and they will be selected within the next few days. Applications for the position may be filed at the office of the Chamber of Commerce immediately. The requirements for the man are that he be able to take charge of the pool, keep up the repairs and the machinery and be able to swim well enough to act as life guard. The woman must be affable and able to meet the public.

A cold drink stand and a candy stand is to be operated in connection with the pool and those who get thirsty or hungry during the time they are in swimming can secure these articles on the grounds. In speaking of the operation of the pool today members of the committee that worked out the details said that it was to be handled in an orderly manner so that anyone would feel that it was a desirable place to spend their afternoons or evenings.

A wading pool for the smaller children, a deep pool in which the larger children could swim and the deep water for diving will be the same as when the place was operated two years ago. The committee that worked up the details with the aid of other Lions is composed of Saul Perlstein, chairman; Clyde Davis, W. Wagner, Roy Gilbreath and Dr. H. A. Forsdon. The committee is to go around this afternoon to sell coupon books good for swimming at the pool any time during the season. These books are to be sold to assist in keeping the pool on a cash basis and the advance sales will be used in getting The Willows in condition for the opening.

TEXAS WEIGHS LONG SESSION LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN.—After trying an extension of a legislative session from 66 to 120 days in order to avoid special sessions, Texas is trying to decide if the change was a success.

Governor Ross Sterling does not think so. He has told the legislature the sorrow of seeing them depart from Austin is tempered by the prospect that they will be back.

The 120 day session was authorized by a constitutional amendment. In extending the session the voters also raised the pay of the 31 senators and 150 representatives from \$5 a day to \$10 a day.

Few Important Bills.—Outstanding acts of the 120 day session included a three cents a package cigar tax effective Aug. 22 and repeal of the 1971 Sunday law, so far as it affects Saturday movies. A limit of 24 hours was put on marathon events unless 24 hours rest intervenes.

Road Bond Issue Fails.—Among the proposed measures which failed to pass was a resolution to submit to popular vote a constitutional amendment to permit issuance of \$212,000,000 state road bonds.

Want Mail Plane Airport Atop New Detroit Postoffice

DETROIT.—When the new federal building for Detroit is completed its roof will be so arranged that air mail planes can land on it, if local aeronautical enthusiasts and business men can bring such a thing about.

William B. Mayo, chief engineer of the Ford Motor company, and William B. Stout, airplane designer, are the principal exponents of the idea.

"While it is not practical to land planes on the roofs of buildings now, it will be by the time this one is completed," Stout said. The new building, which will be erected on the site of the present postoffice, in the downtown section, will be 10 stories high.

"Of course, high speed planes could not make the landing," Stout added, "but planes of the gyro type, or with slow landing speeds could bring in the mail from the outlying airports. Much time would be saved in this way. Planes also could dip and drop mail on the roof."

Mayo said he believed the ordinary strong building roof would serve the purpose. It would have to be fenced to break up air currents, however, and equipped with a catwalk for taking off. The building will cover a square block.
