

ANOTHER TEMPEST IN THE TEA POT.

Chairman George W. Wickersham and his law enforce ment committee remind the American people that federal prisons are antiquated and everything else that calls for the censure of the wise and just as well as the inmates of the aforesaid pens. Indeed, the reports submitted to the president reminds the lawmakers, national and state, that the American penal system is a flat failure; that the parole system is a farce; that many penal institutions are reeking with grubs; many are without plumbing fixtures.


