A GREAT ROAD YEAR.

Programs of federal, state and local governments for 1931 road construction call for a total expenditure of \$1,616, 000,000-an increase of \$15,000,000 over 1930. The federal government's contribution of \$249,897,000 is \$150,000,000 over 1930.

The problem of unemployment has perhaps been the most potent factor in increasing road budgets-coupled with the genuine need for more and better roads in a great many states. The farm-to-market road movement is coming in for increasing attention and more and more communities are finding that full-width, weatherproof, all-year-round roads are essential to agriculture in this modern age.

It might be said that the money we spend for roads gives us a better return than almost any other form of government tax expenditures. Quick and economical transport, of goods and persons, is vital to social and economic progress. Particularly is this true of those rural areas where roads have been in essentially the same state of unimprovement since the horse-and-wagon days. Only by building inexpensive, but good roads, can farming sections be given a place in the march forward.

STUDYING THE SILVER PROBLEM.

It is announced that the world silver problem is to be studied by a committee of experts appointed by the International Chamber of Commerce. These experts, representing the United States, Great Britain, China and perhaps other countries, will be selected on the basis of their knowledge both of silver and economics.

What ever recommendations the committee makes will be received with interest throughout the world. Low silver prices largely brought on by the fact that most nations have gone to the gold standard of coinage—play an import-ant part in the business depression. The various governments interested in silver must agree on a policy for its stabilization, and such investigations as the one now projected should produce invaluable information with which to



If the state wants to destroy its soil twice as fast as at present, the best way to destroy it will be to require that cotton land be turned into sorghum hay land, according to figures Representative Eugene V. Giles, Austin, has prepared to offer in contesting the cotton acreage bill. Corn, wheat, sorghum hay and oats all deplete the soil of its fer-tility units more rapidly than cot-ton, according to Representative

That means that by requiring cotton land of one year be planted in other crops the next, additional fertility depletion would be caused, Mr. Giles said.

The figures were based on nitrogen at 22 cents a pound, phosphate AC and potash at six cents a pound. Following are the amounts of fertility taken from an acre of land by average crops in one year by each of the five erops, according to Mr. Giles' figures:


