

"Keggy" Jones, who paid the price of his criminal career t the muzzles of gangster guns, is pointed to as a notable xample of the success of the Texas prison system in turnng out anti-social practitioners. "Keggy," the Digest points ut, seems to have been sent to the Texas prison system, hile in his 'teens. "It is patent there was good material in im-a genius for organization that should have been salaged to society," it declares. "But the facts are that Keggy" Jones was sent to a school for crime. Young, dept and impressionable, he made a brilliant student for the aculty of safe-breakers, hi-jackers and gunmen.

"In time he graduated from the "School for Crime" to which the State of Texas had sent him. Versed in the devi ways of criminality, he bent his talent for organization the forming of a gang of criminals that victimized an enre state. Branches of his "super" organization looted afes in Fort Worth; another subsidiary robbed stores in rownsville; and yet another trafficked in stolen automobiles

"Keggy" Jones fell a victim, not to the law but to the iwlessness of criminals with whom he was associated. That ne full story of the ramifications of his enterprise is now nown, is due solely to the determination of one of "Keggy's' eutenants that the men who murdered the "chief" shall pay he supreme penalty. Whether we like it or not, "Keggy" ones, while he lived, successfullly hoodwinked the constabul-

ry of the greatest state in America.

Such is the fruit of a system that sends youngsters to prison where they mingle with past masters in the art and ience of criminality. It is a damning indictment of Texas' enal practice."
