TWO FIGHTS AVERTED IN CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Oct. 2.—Two encounters without blows occurred in the state capitol today after presentation of a resolution in the Texas senate condemning Governor Ross Sterling and Sen. Joe Moore of Greenville for defacing oil lobbyists of temporarily occupying the bill to authorize state drilling in the Sabine river.

COL. AND MRS. LINDBERGH IN PLANE CRASH

HANKOW, China, Oct. 2.—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh narrowly escaped death when their big Lockheed monoplane crashed into the Yangtze river.

The famous flier and his wife were thrown from the plane when the motor failed and it struck the water with a crash a few minutes after it had taken off. The big ship slipped over on its back but both the passengers had been thrown clear and escaped injury.

Sailors on the British airplane carrier Hermes, who saw the plane plunge into the water, launched a boat and sped across the water to the badly wrecked plane, fearing the Lindberghs had been caught beneath it.

They found them swimming in the river, side by side, a few feet from the plane.

The accident occurred just as the plane started on a second flight over the area where millions are fighting disease and starvation in the wake of a flood.

Lindbergh's plane will be shipped to Shanghai Monday where it will be repaired by the China National Aviation Corporation. If Colonel Lindbergh waits for its repair he will have to stay in China some time. The company offered him another plane if he desired to use it to continue his tour.

The accident today was the second in which the famous flying couple has been involved. Before their marriage Lindbergh took Miss Anne Morrow on a flight in Mexico which ended in an emergency landing. Neither was hurt.

MAY BE CALLED TO DECIDE ON DISTRICTING

Governor Indicates He Believes Another Session Needed.

AUSTIN, Oct. 2.—Gov. Ross Sterling will call the Texas legislature in an immediate third special session for congressional redistricting if it fails to act on that topic before adjournment, he indicated today.

"Don't you think they ought to be called back to carry out a constitutional duty," he asked, in turn when asked what he will do.

"It was suggested in the House today that you will call them next January and would submit it then," the governor was told.

"What would I call them then for?" he asked.

Meanwhile a motion to postpone congressional redistricting indefinitely was pending in the House when it adjourned for luncheon.

SILVER USE GROWS.

The low price of silver has stimulated its use in industry. It has, as well, resulted in increased sale of silverware and silver jewelry. The use of silver solders is expanding, and silver is being used in some form in manufacture of airplanes, turbines, radios, electric refrigerators, chemical apparatus and similar products.

While this will not immediately solve the silver problem, or bring the metal back from the depths to a fair value, it all aids in stabilizing markets for the future through new and valuable uses for the metal.

MORE LAWS, MORE CONTEMPT.

"The growing contempt for law is attributable in large measure to a mistaken zeal for more and ever more law," said Governor Ritchie of Maryland a short time ago.

It is refreshing to hear this thought echoed by a high public official. Too few of them are sufficiently candid—or courageous—to do so. But almost all who have studied the crime problem have come to the same conclusion.

We are a nation of law-breakers largely because we are a nation of law-makers. We have abrogated human liberties—and crime has been increasing on a greater scale than in any other supposedly civilized country. We have passed laws which have acted as boomerangs and have in actual practice benefited the criminal class which they were supposed to suppress—such as the various anti-revolver bills in effect in several states.

We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that America is a lawless nation. In almost every great city authorities are ill but powerless against the depredations of a well organized, well financed underworld. Simpler and fewer laws, more justice and less litigation, surer punishment for offenders—in that direction lies victory for society in its war against the criminal class.

SCHOOLS FOR CRIME.

The move aimed at the separation of youthful criminals in our state institutions from criminals of the hardened type aims strong argument from the confession of Johnnie Martin to the Harris county grand jury, according to the Editorial Digest, which sees in our present penitentiary system, where young first timers are herded promiscuously with out-graduates in crime, nothing but a university of the criminal arts.

"Keggy" Jones, who paid the price of his criminal career in the muzzles of gangster guns, is pointed to as a notable example of the success of the Texas prison system in turning out anti-social practitioners. "Keggy," the Digest points out, seems to have been sent to the Texas prison system, while in his teens. "It is patent there was good material in him—a genius for organization that should have been salvaged to society," it declares. "But the facts are that 'Keggy' Jones was sent to a school for crime. Young, deep and impressionable, he made a brilliant student for the faculty of safe-breakers, hi-jackers and gunmen.

"In time he graduated from the 'School for Crime' to which the State of Texas had sent him. Versed in the devious ways of criminality, he bent his talent for organization to the forming of a gang of criminals that victimized an entire state. Branches of his 'super' organization looted safes in Fort Worth; another subsidiary robbed stores in Brownsville; and yet another trafficked in stolen automobiles in Beaumont.

"Keggy" Jones fell a victim, not to the law but to the weakness of criminals with whom he was associated. That is the full story of the ramifications of his enterprise is now known, is due solely to the determination of one of "Keggy's" retainers that the men who murdered the "chief" shall pay the supreme penalty. Whether we like it or not, "Keggy" Jones, while he lived, successfully hoodwinked the constabulary of the greatest state in America.

"Such is the fruit of a system that sends youngsters to prison where they mingle with past masters in the art and science of criminality. It is a damning indictment of Texas' penal practice."

Eastland county does not have to go to Harris county to find such an example. Those who followed the experiences of Robert Hill, sole survivor of the bandit gang which robbed the First National bank here several years ago, will recall Hill's account of his adolescent days when he was sent to the reformatory for a minor crime, and his own admission that he was definitely started on a criminal career by what he learned at the state institution. The contribution which our prison system has made to the ranks of social enemies is amply attested by hundreds of similar examples in which juveniles which would have contributed to social good have been turned into liabilities in institutions whose purpose is to protect the state against crime. The state owes it to itself, more than to the subject of discipline, to take serious thought along the lines of reforming its prison system. It must hope to cope with the rising tide of crime when its efforts to reform, to salvage righteous citizenship from delinquency, are turned ironically into training courses for future criminals.

UTILIZATION OF PETROLEUM.

It is probable that no other raw material enters so many fields of utilization as petroleum.

Crude oil, subjected to a series of refining processes, releases gas that is the source of fuel gas, carbon black, and naphtha. The first products of distillation are naphtha and refined oils, which yield gasoline, commercial solvents, and kerosene fluids. The refined oils include kerosene, illuminating oil, stove and tractor oil, furnace oil, etc.

The intermediate distillates produce gas oil and absorber oil, both of which have important industrial uses, and likewise yield gasoline, by the cracking process, and Diesel oil from the heavy distillates come waxes, lubricating and medicinal oils and similar products.

But the use of petroleum does not end here. The residues of distillation produce other things, road oil, asphalt, tches and coke.

A great many of the commodities we use in our daily life, from candy to medicine, are made up in part of petroleum products. The oil industry has proven itself, time and again, to be a cornerstone of modern civilization.

Votes will be canvassed as quickly as possible, it was said by Robert Knerim, of Bronte, in a communication to the board of city development, which has worked with the Coke county delegation from the very beginning to see the bonds voted. It is hoped the contract can be let at the November session of the highway commission.

County commissioners from Tom Green county are to meet a week from next Monday to call an election about Nov. 15 for the paving of highway No. 70 in that county, which will call for about \$80,000 as the county's part of the construction. Thirteen miles of paving would be constructed, meeting the San Angelo-Ballinger pike six miles out of town.

Tom Green county has already put in seven bridges and done most of the grading on the road which would be paved. The bond issue will care for two additional bridges, besides the paving.

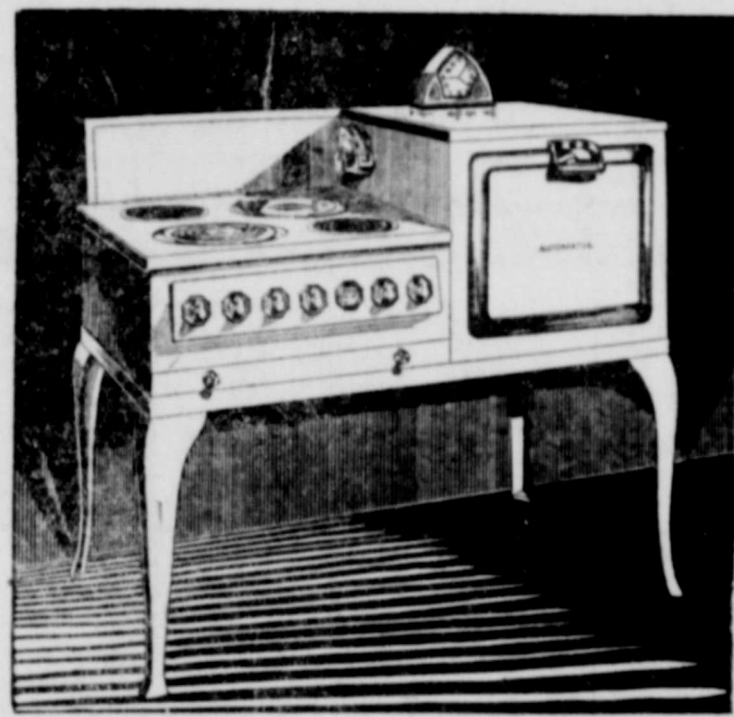
Highway Work In Nolan Co. To Start Soon

Sweetwater, Texas.—With the highway paving contract let for highway No. 70, from Sweetwater to Roby, last week, the voting of \$175,000 in bonds Saturday in Coke county for a \$700,000 highway building program, and Tom Green county's calling an election in November to vote \$80,000 in bonds to pave from the Coke county line to the San Angelo-Ballinger highway, a busy winter and spring appears in this section of West Texas.

The contract for the Sweetwater-Roby highway, a double bituminous topping of 19.6 miles, is to cost \$123,227, the contract having been let to the Morgan Construction company.

Coke county's election Saturday will close one of the worst gaps in the state highway system between cities the size of Sweetwater and San Angelo, and Judge W. R. Ely of Abilene, chairman of the state highway commission, has promised that the contracts will be speeded as quickly as possible to get the work under way this winter.

Many Coke county citizens went to the polls to vote for the meas-



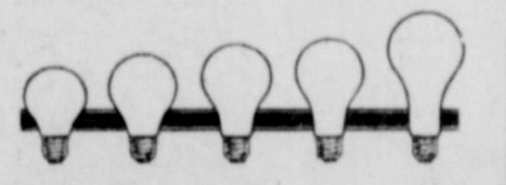

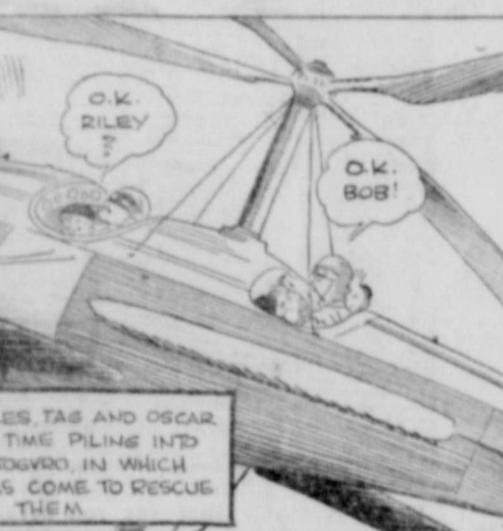
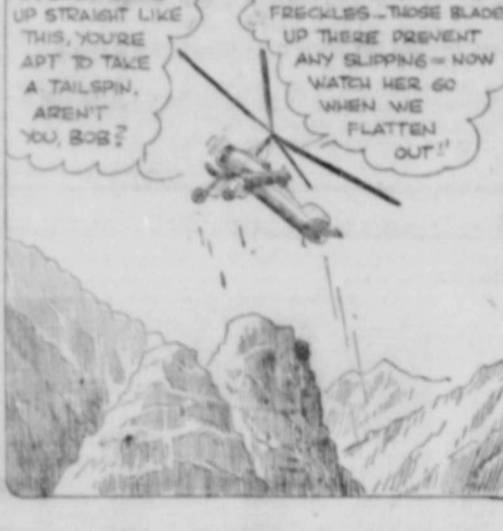
Test Case Made of Insurance Levy

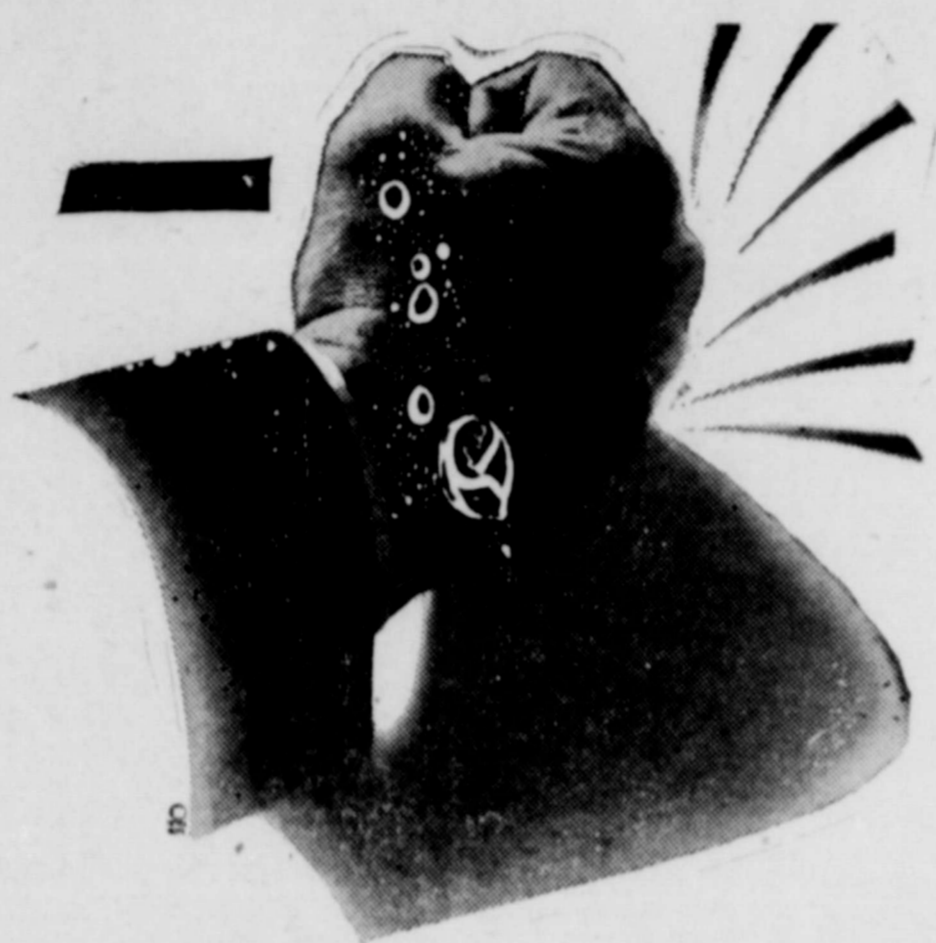
