#### HUNTING ACCIDENTS.

Another hunting season is here with its ever-present threat of accident and fatality. Unlike previous seasons the present season opens at noon, that being an innovation introduced by the federal game preservation bureau as a means of halting the great slaughter of ducks that usually occurs the first morning, and giving the game a chance to discover that their lives are in danger and to observe precautions. Ducks are said to be capable of that. The prolonged drouth which the country has experienced has served to diminish the number of ducks and the government is concerned to prevent their extinction,

But ducks are not the only game of which the open season takes a toll. Unfortunately, due to excitement, carelessness and accident, human life and limb is annually sacrificed to the sport. With fields crowded with hunters, a countryside once open but now uniformly well populated, a loaded gun is an insistent menace, particularly if that gun is in the hands of an inexperienced hunter. Few of those who take advantage of the open season have so much as handled the weapon they now employ during the many months of the closed season. Many more, with the thought of bagging game in their minds, give no serious thought to the direction of their shots. They seem to take it for granted that the rest of the world has simply moved out of the way to permit them to lay down a barrage of buckshot and all will be well. The excitement of the hunt overweighs the normal caution American Can they would exercise and they forget that people in the peaceful countryside through which the boom, boom of their recreation resounds do not spead their time and of their recreation resounds, do not spend their time dodging from ditch to ditch or cover to cover, but assured in the doc- Auburn Auto trine that the burden of caution rests upon the hunter, pursue their normal vocations and go their normal ways with little thought of casualty. But the greatest toll is taken among hunters themselves. Triggers unintentionally pressed in the excitement of a moment, a clutching twig, a stumble, or any of those minor mishaps that we experience daily without noticing, become, with a loaded gun in hand, trage-

There are some rules that should be unvaringly observed in hunting, rules that even the rankest amateur appreci- Gen Elec ates. The most important is to keep ones head and another Gillette's is not to transport another gun. The less time that a gun is loaded the less chance there is of accident. Shotguns should housen but Come be broken in going to and from the hunting resort and un-der no circumstances should they be loaded within the city fimits. 
