Research at Kentucky shows that feed required by a brood sow during gestation can be cut in half if good pasture is available. In addition, sows farrowed more and larger pigs, than sows confined to dry lots.

Their work indicates that sows on good green pasture will need only two to three pounds of a 16 percent protein breeding ration per day during the first two thirds ever, five to six pounds per day should be fed for 30 days prior to farrowing to insure that pigs will have maximum size and weight at birth.

Anything that small grain will do legumes will do better, says Generally, oats and wheat are the specialist. Good pasture, especially legume, is a rich source acids required by swine.

ment that refunds or credit slips will be given for products returned within a specific period of time or know that otherwise th sale is final. Investigate. Ask your friends or

neighbors what their experience has been in making purchases rom a particular advertiser. Beware of "free gifts" offered

regardless of whether you buy a particular item. If you don't buy the item, insist that the gift be

Shop around elsewhere and examine similar products to assure yourself that you are getting a product of good quality at a fair Exercise caution when buying

any product at public auction, especially if you bid from the rear of the room without being able

to examine the product.

If you are offered a free certificate toward the purchase of a product, make sure that you are not being charged above the market price of the product to make up for the free amount offered by the certificate.

If you feel you have been treat-ed dishonestly in any business transaction, report this fact to your local Better Business Bureau or the Attorney General's office nearest you.

Don't Save Grain Sorghum For Seed

"Why can't I save grain sorghum to plant for seed next year? paid plenty for the seed this CITY OF DIMMITT year, the harvest should be good enough to plant again." This

A quick look at a plot of grain sorghum at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Re search Center at MacGregor wil soon convince even the staunchest doubter that saving grain sorghum for seed is folly.

The plot at the Research Center was planted with seed held out from harvest the previous year. Some heads in the field were four or five feet high, while others were a scant two feet from the round. This means more foliage has to be run through the combine to harvest the grain.

In addition, there were numerous white heads in the field. This is caused by the genetic make up of seed saved from the product of firstcross grain sorghum harvest. Mixed grain always means a dock at the elevator, and many times it is difficult to find a buyer at any price.

Many of the heads were mature and ready to be harvested, but there were also heads that were immature and could not be harvested, or at best, would raise the oisture test. Again, U means a dock at the elevaor.
