## Agricultural Extension News

From the Office of the County Agent and Home Demonstration Agent

Gardening persons, whether they live on farms or in towns, are natural Extension Horticulturist farmers and are bound to have gardens.

To that larger group of persons of the more calculating sort we would offer two solid reasons why gardens should be made even if it be at the expense of considerable manual toil and mental anguish. Gardens cut living ex-

penditures amazingly, either in town or in the country, and garden produce furnishes many of the essentials for a healthful diet. In fact it is doubtful if most housewives, even though they appreciate the importance of vegetables in the diet, can find means with out a garden, to provide the great abundance of green stuff demanded by Nature as the price of health.

He who limits himself to bread, meat, potatoes and sugar is bound to suffer certain bad results. "All vegetables contain minerals and for this reason are of great value as foods. They help to build bones, teeth, tissue and blood. Milk and fruit and vegetables furnish the large share of the phosphorus, calcium and iron in our food. When combined with eggs, meat and grains they form a balanced diet."

Fresh vegetables are much preferred in the adequate diet, but canned or dried vegetables are wholesome and should be eaten when it is possible to obtain fresh ones.

When planning the garden it is well to keep in mind the adequate diet and make plans to provide fresh fruits and vegetables as well as to con, dry, brine or preserve some for the winter months and for dollars and for sheer love of the job that we garden. That this effort may give the most bountiful return we offer some suggestions.

Locate the garden in the vicinity of the house if possible, that the housewife may not be compelled to walk an unreasonable distance from her kitchen to secure her vegetables. Choose a place that has slope enough to be well drained, and where there is sufficient air drainage to prevent a possible pocketing of frost.

Practically any type of soil can be used for a home garden, if properly fertilized, but a sandy one is preferred. Sandy loam soils are more easily worked, warm up more quickly in the spring, respond more readily to fertilizers, and are not injured by tramping when wet. The heavier clay and black land soil types are usually more fertile, but are harder to work and the crops growing on them do not respond to commercial fertilizer as readily as do sandy soils. The gravelly soil types are usually deficient in organic matter but when supplemented with stable manure or green manure crops to increase fertility and water holding capacity, become satisfactory garden soils.

Heavier soils that do not wash badly should be broken in the fall not less than eight inches deep, and lighter ones that are subject to washing should be plowed to a depth of eight inches after January first as possible. It is important to completely cover all weeds and plant refuse to this material will quickly decay and not interfere with planting or cultivation. The garden should be harrowed until thoroughly pulverized and level for planting. Freshly broken and harrowed soil should be allowed to settle for at least ten days before seeds are planted.

Before breaking garden land make heavy application of well rotted barnyard manure at the rate of 4 to 10 tons per acre. Fresh manure may be used but should be applied in fall or winter and trowed under early to decompose. Since manure is usually lacking in phosphorus add fifty pounds of super phosphate per ton of manure. As a substitute for stable manure or in combination with it use such light grade fertilizers as 15-5-5 or 12-6-4 at the rate of one to two pounds to each 25 square foot. Work this thoroughly into the soil before planting. For early and leafy crops nitrate of soda or ammonium sulfate may be applied as a side dressing at the rate of one pound to 200 square feet. Severe burnings of plants may result if this material is

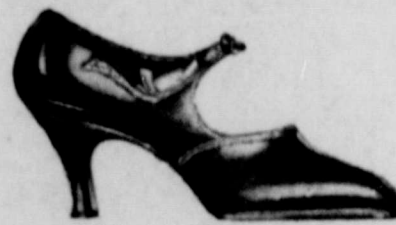

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**Old-Fashioned Birth Custom**

 TORONTO, Ont.—The old-fashioned custom of partially starving mothers to lower death rate to do away with discomforts of pregnancy has been criticized by Dr. H. B. van Wyck, professor of obstetrics at the University of Toronto in a recent announcement.  
 The practice, of pathological nature, was first mentioned in a paper by the University of Toronto which had resulted in experiments which have reduced the death rate of mothers by 25 per cent.  
 The discomforts of pregnancy and the discomforts of motherhood were eliminated, the doctors said.  
 The doctors announced they were able to eliminate almost all deaths from toxemia of pregnancy. They estimated that approximately 2,000 women die each year from toxemia, a disease which in the United States alone costs \$80,000 in the world.  
**Medical Regulation.**  
 Medical regulation is necessary for the cure of toxemia, the doctors said, but it does not mean that a salt diet should be prescribed prior to childbirth. The doctors said their new diet contained no risk and eliminated all conditions at present prevailing to parents and physicians. They said their treatment would accomplish beneficial results in abnormal cases.  
 The doctors planned to read a paper on their discoveries before the New York Obstetrical society in February.

**Cars Show Increased in Texas**

 AUSTIN—The trend of the motorist is toward used cars. License fees in the 10 leading cities of Texas for 1931 indicated a decrease in the registration of new cars. The decrease was 31 per cent last month as compared with a year ago, when 1,727 new cars were registered last month, 16 per cent less than those for November.

In 1931, 31,728 new passenger cars were registered in the 10 counties included in the report, as compared with 45,380 cars in 1930. Totals for Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Harris, McLennan, Nueces, Porter, Tarrant and Travis counties were much less than 1930 totals, the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas reported.

 Melt butter and add onion peel and minced celery leaves, mustard, salt and pepper. Simmer over a low fire until onion is tender. Stir over heat, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and strain. Return to heat with shrimps and parsley and heat thoroughly. Serve with a sprinkle of paprika over the top.

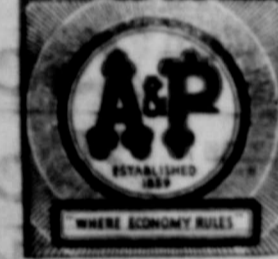

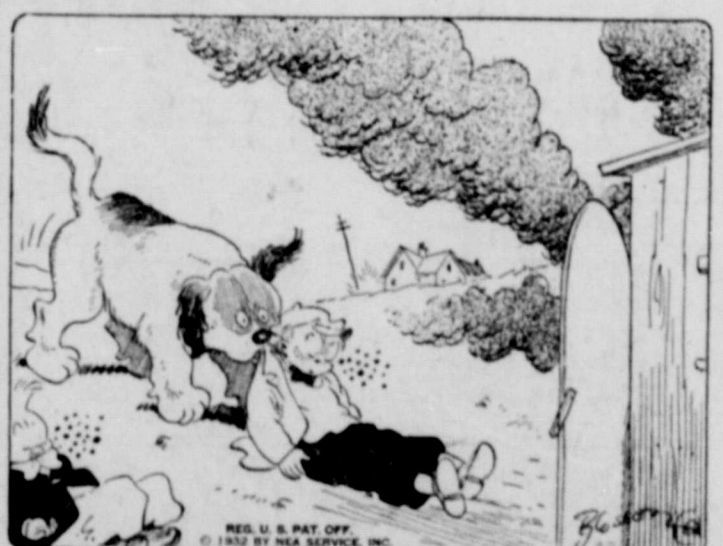

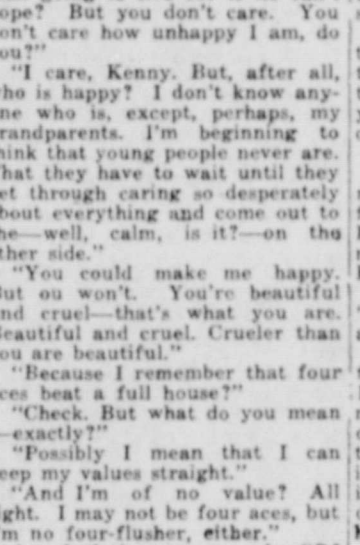
