

Legislation Fails.

Efforts were made, but failed, in the last legislative sessions, to put a minimum of two cents per barrel on oil, recognizing a minimum of \$1 per barrel value, if not price on oil. Then when the price was above \$1, the state would get its tax on the greater value, but would be protected against losses when the prices range down to the 10-cent level of last July and August, when it took five barrels of oil to pay the state one cent of taxes.

The state ought also to put a minimum of 4-10 of a cent per thousand feet on gas, recognizing the average 20 cent price at the well that exists over the nation. This 4-10 of a cent would be immaterial in the \$1.50 per thousand-foot final price paid by the domestic users of the gas.

W. E. Lea, outstanding democrat of the Southeast Texas country, is to be a candidate in all probability for congressman-at-large; but he said while in Austin early this week, that he is holding up a final commitment for or against the race until a little later.

Henvier soils that do not was dly should be broken in the hadly should be broken in the fall not less than eight inches deep, and lighter ones that are subject to washing should be plowed to the same denth as soon after January first as pos-sible. It is important to com-pletely cover all weeds and plant refuse so this material will quickv decay and not interfere with planting or cultivation. The garlen soil should be harrowed until thoroughly pulverised and level for planting. Freshly broken and harrowed soil should be allowed to the control of th settle for at least ten days be-

Before breaking garden land take a heavy application of well make a heavy application of well rotted barnyard manure at the rate of 4 to 10 tons per acro. Fresh manure may be used but should be applied in fall or winter and turned under early to decempore. Since manure is usually lacking in phosphorous add fifty pounds of super phosphata per ton of manure. As a substitute for stable manure or in sombination with it use such light grade fertilizers as 15-5-5 or 12-6-4 at the rate of one to two pounds to each 25 square fest. Work this theroughly into the soil before planting. 


