SIX NATIONS TO COMPETE IN BIG AIR RACE

By United Press.

BERLIN.—Six nations will be represented at the International Round-Europe Flight of 1932, according to the Aero Club of Germany. The event is tentatively scheduled for August.

France, Italy, Germany, Poland, Switzerland and Czechoslovakia have given assurance of participation in the flight, which will be over a distance of 7,500 kilometers, to be covered in three laps of 2,500 kilometers each.

Prizes totaling 300,000 French francs, to be contributed by the participating countries, will be offered. First prize is 100,000 francs.

The tentative itinerary is Berlin to Rome, via Poland, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Hungary and Yugoslavia; Rome to Paris via Southern France, Switzerland, Germany; Paris to Berlin via Holland, Germany, Denmark, Sweden. The final lap, over which maximum speed is to be judged, will be flown over a triangular course of 250 kilometers between the Staaken and Tempelhof airports here.

Flies will be required to cover the three major laps within two days, or the entire flight within six days. A day of rest in Paris is contemplated upon completion of the second major lap.

The announcement of the Aero Club of Germany, as organizer of the flight, voices its regrets at the failure of England and Spain to participate this year. England's non-participation is explained by the fact that her light planes are "hors concours" owing to their weight. The announcement points out that the Aero Club of Germany was not in a position to adjust the weights of British planes to those required under the rules of 1929.
