SCRAMBLING THE ETHER.

Mexico has turned the ether into a modern Babel. She has done it by granting broadcasting licenses for the erection of a group of stations in the Mexican states bordering the international boundary line. These new stations, which have sprung up like mushrooms, are interfering in their broadcasts with the programs of stations in this country.

Obviously, the ether knows no national divisions. It cannot be subdivided into sovereign political states. The same channels, or frequencies, or wave lengths for the use of which the federal radio commission issues licenses are precisely the same channels, or frequencies, or wave lengths with which the Mexican government is concerned when it issues licenses to operate in Mexico.

The "broadcasting band" available for general purposes in North America extends from 550 to 1500 kilocyclesas everyone knows who owns a radio set. Frequencies outside of this range are reserved by international agreements for special purposes. When those international agreements were entered into, Mexico was not invited to the conference. She was ignored completely, and the failure to recognize that she has certain rights is the present

The United States walked off with the lion's share of the broadcasting channels. She has 79, while Canada has only six which she controls exclusively. She shares 12 more with this country.

That, we submit, is an unfair division. Every fair-minded person will agree that the United States is "hogging" the air under such an arragements, and that the failure to consider Mexico's rights was an inexcusable affront to the sovereignty of that country.

It is evident that the present chaotic conditions cannot continue. Yet nobody can blame Mexico for asserting her national property rights in the ether by issuing broadcasting licenses .- Venture Free Press.
