

Some changes will come, some things will remain the same, but the lasting effects of House Bill 246 on the Dimmitt Independent School District will be felt for many years to come.

"It will possibly take additional personnel (to fulfill the requirements of the guidelines)," Supt. Robert Ryan told the school board Monday night. "But we don't know for sure yet."

Besides adding physical education in kindergarten through second grade, and making any state-listed course available to 10 or more students requesting one, the schools must determine the essential elements of each subject and decide on ways of showing that students have mastered them.

The schools must also determine methods to "remediate" (or help catch up) the students who do not display mastery of those elements. Also, a system must be devised to keep records of what a student has mastered. A grade of 70 will be the minimum for passing.

The State Board of Education issued the guidelines in March for school districts to follow in implementing the provisions of HB 246.

The guildelines provide for a general graduation track and an advanced track, with the general track requiring 21 units of credit and the advanced program requiring 22 units of credit, including two units of foreign language study. Provision was also made for an advanced diploma with honors, which would require 22 credits, five of which would have to be from courses designated as honor courses (those modified by accelerating, providing greater depth, and expanding the courses and their essential elements).

The guidelines spell out what portion of each school day must be spent in each subject area in each grade level. For the seventh and eighth grades, science courses must devote 40% of the instructional time to laboratory or field activities and a half-unit (one semester course) of computer literacy



UETERAN'S SERUICES By BEDFORD W. SMITH

County Service Officer Certain unemployed vet-

erans may now be eligible to participate in a new program to train for jobs. Unemployed veterans of

either the Vietnam Era or the Korean Conflict may be trained for jobs in programs approved under the Emergency Veterans' Job Training Act of 1983 (Public Law 98-77). By payments being made directly to the employers by the Veterans Administration, the law makes it more attractive to hire veterans.

To qualify, veterans must have been unemployed for at least 15 of the last 20 weeks. The maximum period of training is nine months, except for veterans with service-connected disabilities rated 30% or more, or who are shown to have serious employment handicapping service-connected disabilities which are rated less than 30%. These disabled veterans can be trained for up to 15 months, if necessary.

Veterans who want to begin a program of training under this new law must apply by completing VA Form 22-8932, available at any VA office. Upon receipt of the form, and a copy of veteran's DD Form 214, the VA will determine eligibility. If entitled, veteran will be furnished with a Certificate of Eligibility, which he takes to the employer who is willing to train him for a new





A counselor, trained in the identification of children with special education needs will review the screening results with the parent or guardian of each child screened. A parent or guardian must accompnay each child participating in the screening. The total screening process should take about one hour.
