

Carrying mail wasn't always what it is today, he said. And Geiman knows, for he is the only man in the postal service who car-ried mail when rural delivery was established, on the route in Maryland. that first test

No Provision Has Been Made For Summer Schools

AUSTIN .- Texas has not ye made provision for summer school in its teacher colleges and other institutions for next year, final half the biennium for which other appropriations have been made. Having left out this \$550,000 item may partially have helped the appearance of this year's budget, but will not have made it any easier to provide the money for

the 1933 summer terms.
With the many thousand teachers why rely upon the summer normals to get their advanced training, and the students who make use of the summer terms to adjust their work for best results, and many of whom finish up in the summer rather than spend badly-needed time of the long sessions, failure to provide for next year's summer schools is unthink-

Facts are that many schools are now adjusted upon the three sem-ester system so that the summer third is as much a part of its organized work as are the other two





Lost Baby Planet

LONDON—Albert is missing.

Recently hopes of finding him were revived when Dr. Delporte, of United Processing Section 1988. of Upple, Brussels, discovered a minute heavenly body.

Albert's description, however, doesn't tally with that of the new Albert has a brother and a sis-

ter, called Ganymede and Alinda, and although each of these has been seen on several occasions since their discovery, their elder brother has refused to appear when astronomers were looking

Alinda, however, has been the subject, of strong censure by as-tronomers on account of her name. As an erratic body, she should, according to convention, have been given a masculine name, and indignation is felt at this violation of what is, for some reason, regarded as a male presentative

All three members of the family complete their orbits in about four years. Albert and his baby sister are only three miles in di-ameter. At their nearest approach to the earth they come 20,000,000 miles.

There are indications that this new planet may help to estimate more exactly the distance of the sun from the earth. According to calculations, the new planet, though it is going away from the earth, was, when discovered, the

nearest heavenly body, except the moon. Prevolusly this distinction belonged to the planet Eros.

According to the investigations of Dr. A. C. D. Crommelin, a former president of the Royal Asstronomical Society the tronomical Society, the new planet was, at the beginning of blishing company, intro-vice for the homes. The British and American graves registrations services already have hunted through the zone and recovered thousands of bodies.

French officials have announced that since last September 1,042 known and 1,561 unidentified French bodies have been found and 455 identified, and 1,717 unidentified Germans. Several bodies of English were found and sent to British cemeteries.

Waves of searchers are sent over the fields. They have been aided in their work by farmers, whose plows often open up a hidden burial place. Many of the dead were buried in unmarked graves, or the crosses blasted away by subsequent shellfire. Some of the dead were buried under heavy rocks and ground by shell explosions. Many injured men dragged themselves into shell holes, or dugouts and died there, to be covered later when those holes were filled in.

Rings, pencils and pens, and a few other metal fragments, are about all that remain with the bodies. It is from these few clues that the bodies are identified.


