GOVERNOR ROLPH GIVES HOPE TO MOONEY

Governor Rolph, Jr., of California must be a practical politician. He flatly declined to issue a pardon to Tom oney. He said the punishment fitted the crime.

Well, the very next day he made the interesting announcement that he had not "closed" the Mooney case; that he was ready to receive and read new evidence and that the way to freedom was open to the famous convict . via the parole route. Mooney had refused all along to accept a parole. Now the governor has hinted that an application for a parole may bring about favorable results.

Governor Sterling has a parole policy that is very appealing. There are three former judges of high standing members of the Texas parole board. They pass on all applications for parole or pardon or commutation. All three are men who rank high as lawyers and jurists before they were called to the service of the state to deal with the issue of elemency that should be shown convicts with clear and clean records of service behind the bars. They send the results of their investigations to the office of the governor. If they recommend a parole, the parole is granted by the governor. And why not? It pays to temper justice with mercy where the individual record of a ward of the state indicates that there has been atonement and repentance and a sincere desire to lead a life within the pale of the law, if granted the boon of beginning anew the daily grind of free existence.

### WILBUR SCORCHED BY CONNALLY OF TEXAS





R HUBARB is invaluable as a fruit extender, a "stretcher." so to speak. Strange as it may seem, this common garden plant with its characteristic tartness has the peculiar quality of increasing the bulk of jams and conserves made of delicately flavored fruits vitnout materially changing the

Strawberry and rhubarb jam is delicious and hard to distinguish from all-strawberry jam but the rhubarb increases the quantity and makes for economy.

Strawberry and Rhubarb Jam One pound rhubarb, 2 pounds strawberries, 2 pounds granulated

Wash and skin rhubarb. Wash and hull berries. Put rhubarb through the food chopper, catching the juice that drips from the crank case. Combine rhubarb juice and sugar. Add berries and lot stand until sugar is dissolved. Let stand in vinegar for one hour. Add to first mixture with all the remaining ingredients except the nuts. Cook slowly, stirging frequently for two hours. Add let stand until sugar is dissolved.
