

### A NAVY THAT WILL SWEEP THE SEAS

A navy "as big as treaties will allow" has been voted by the senate. By 44 to 21 the Hale bill to authorize buildng up the United States navy to the limit set by the Washington and London conferences was approved and sent to the house. Those who opposed its enactment described the bill as militarism, and "a program of national suicide." If nacted by the house the program it would authorize involves approximately one billion dollars and the president would be authorized to suspend it upon the conclusion of any new disarmament agreement. Senator Hale of Maine put it over. Senator Hale is for peace and preparedness. He would build a navy that would sweep the seven seas, if the sweeping of the seas became necessary for the proection of American interests the world over as well as here at home. Great Britain is not going to disarm. France refuses to disarm without a security pledge. Soviet Russia s watching and waiting, and "Japan and China have signed a treaty pact." Manchuria has been taken over by the Japs. They have the loot tied to their chariot wheels and the loot is the richest of all the provinces is Manchuria. Great Britain has an Indo-Chinese empire. CALIFORNIANS DEFEAT OIL CONSERVATION ACT

California is one of the leading petroleum producing states. A referendum proposing control of the state's oil resources by a commission which would regulate production and storage went down under an avalanche of opposing votes May 3. As far as counted 823,295 ballots were cast against the so-called Sharkey act and 236,190 in favor of it. Gov. Ross S. Sterling on the eve of the election wired Gov. James Rolph of California that the Sharkey proposal if adopted would be certain to stabilize the petroleum industry in the commonwealth of California. Now what was the argument against it? Why, the independents declared the adoption of the Sharkey act would place the control of the petroleum industry in "the hands of the giants and forever obliterate the little fellows." A referendum measure to prohibit the leasing of state owned lands for oil and mineral developments won out by a safe majority. Conservation of oil resources and state regulation was given a very black eye in the silver strand state by the voters while Speaker John Garner was rolling up his plurality for the delegate prize.

### RAIL HOLDING FIRMS TO BE CONTROLLED And now the senate interstate commerce committee has

ven its approval to legislation to place railroad holding mpanies under the interstate commerce commission. Moreover the bill would permit the interstate commerce mmission to supervise the operations and issuance of curities by railroad holding companies. It would prevent The further acquisition of stock by holding companies in a railroad if the commission found acquisition might interfere with its own consolidation plan. Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas is chairman of the house interstate commerce committee. He is committed to legislation along the lines given the approval of the senate committee. Are the Amercan rails headed in the direction of government control and in the last analysis government operation? If it ever appens the people, the taxpayers of America, will have a fancy bill of cost to settle every year. Bus and freighter competition on the highways of America are taking the cream of the traffic from the steam rails as well as the electric lines.
