Swiftettes, Bobbies advance to regional

The Dimmitt Bobcats will compete for the bi-district championship tonight (Thursday) and the Nazareth Swiftettes and Dimmitt Bobbies will try for regional championships in Class A and AAA this weekend.

Bobcats

The Bobcats will square off against the Perryton Rangers in bi-district action tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 in the new Tascosa High School activities center in Amarillo, located just off I-40 and Western in the 3900 block of Westlawn.

Perryton is 19-9 on the season and finished second in District 1-AAA after winning a playoff game against Dalhart Monday night.

"They have a good ball club. They have two 6-3 boys who are their best players, and they go mostly to an inside game," said Dimmitt Coach Kenneth Cleveland.

Swiftettes

The Swiftettes will open the Region 1-A tournament Friday afternoon at 1:30 against Channing at South Plains College's Texan Dome in Levelland.

Channing, 24-5, advanced to regional with a 69-51 win over Lefors in area action Tuesday

night. In other first round games scheduled Friday Sudan (28-4) takes on O'Donnell (19-7), Vega (24-3) tackles Happy (27-5), and Lorenzo (22-10) faces Borden County (25-1).

If the Swiftettes win Friday afternoon they will take on the winner of the Sudan-O'Donnell game at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning. The regional championship match is slated to tip off at 7 Saturday night.

Bobbies

It's Abilene Wylie up first for the Dimmitt Bobbies in the Region 1-AAA tournament.

Dimmitt will take on the 25-4 girls from Abilene at 8:30 p.m. Friday in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

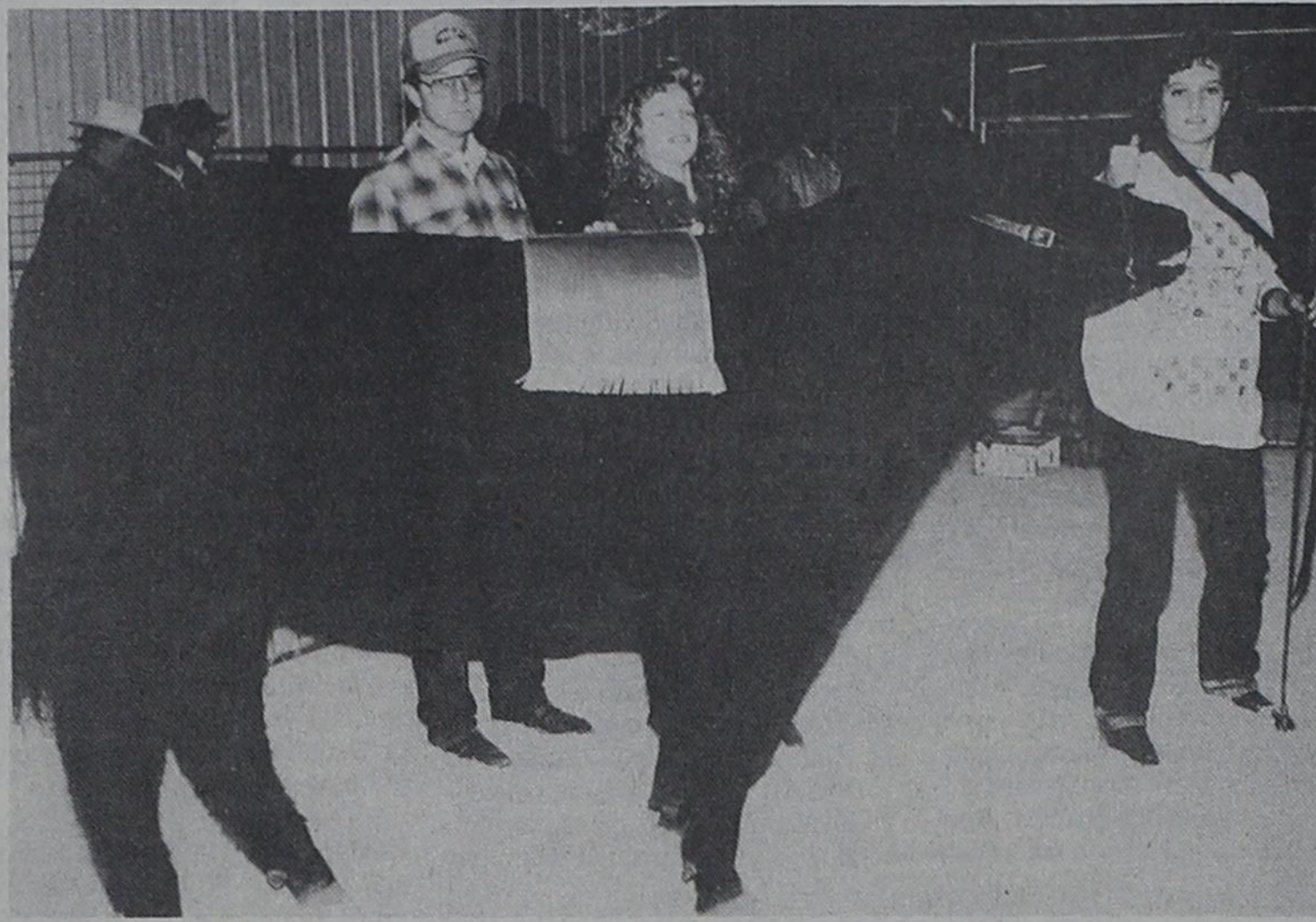
Abilene Wylie earned a trip to the regional tournament by defeating Sonora 58-55 for the area crown.

"We don't know a thing about them," said Dimmitt Coach Richard Wood Wednesday morning.

In the other semifinal contest, Canyon, 32-1, takes on Decatur, 28-3, at 7 p.m. Friday.

The championship game will be played Saturday at 1:30 p.m. in the Coliseum.

City paving is 'go'

At their Monday night meeting, the aldermen agreed to proceed with the assessment paving program and seek bids for the paving of every unpaved street in the city, except for the eastern-most block of West Grant.

Mayor Wayne Collins pointed out that other streets could be dropped from the project later if too many property owners object, but no streets can be added once bids are sought. The excluded block on Grant was left out because of objections from the property owners.

In another matter, Carl King told the aldermen his Texas Corn Growers office would be willing to pay half the cost of moving the city fire siren that is located near his office.

"I didn't want to make a federal case out of it, but I have some pretty important calls, and I've had to hang up because I couldn't hear while the siren was going off,"

King reported. "It's pretty disruptive."

The aldermen agreed to pay half the cost of having the siren moved, and authorized City Manager Reelford Burrous to seek bids on the project. Burrous had earlier reported that a local firm estimated the cost at \$625 for mounting the siren on the nearby water tower.

The aldermen voted to call a city election May 6 for the election of two aldermen and the mayor, all of whom serve two-year terms. The two aldermen whose terms are expiring are Richard Stahl and Jack Thompson.

Candidates may file for the three offices through March 22, and absentee voting is scheduled for April 17 through May 2. Mrs. Noel Gollehon was named as election judge again this year, with her pay set at \$4.50 per hour, and an allowance of \$4 per hour set for her assistants.

Combest visits

In a three-hour visit here last Wednesday, Congressman Larry Combest discussed topics ranging from child care to Medicare and from rural hospitals to beef exports.

Combest addressed an audience of 50 at a pot-luck lunch in the courthouse basement, then visited at the Senior Citizens Center. Later he met with several local cattle producers.

On child care, he said, "There are two totally different approaches" in Congress.

The far-reaching "ABC Bill," he said, "would, in my opinion, primarily set up another federal bureaucracy, with tremendous administra-

tive costs and rules concerning where you could send your children."

Combest favors giving tax credits for child care instead.

"There is a cry from the other side that (allowing tax credits for child care cost or for a mother staying at home with her children) would cost \$2-1/2 billion in revenues," he said. "But their program would cost \$2-1/2 billion. I say let's just keep the money and don't send it to Washington, and we make our own decisions."

Combest told local senior citizens that he is trying to get the Catastrophic Health Insurance Act repealed because "it's just not what it's cracked up to be."

"It doesn't deal with the problem of long-term health care, and that issue has got to be addressed," he said.

He noted that his mail also has been "extremely heavy" on this issue.

He said he shared senior citizens' concern over the future of Plains Memorial and other rural hospitals.

"Every problem of our rural hospitals is Medicare-related," he said. "We have to kind of fight some of

Italian POWs' graves located in Oklahoma

The bodies of five former Italian POW's who had died at the Hereford POW camp have been found buried at the Post Cemetery at Fort Reno, Okla., not in Italy.

All five graves were found in an addition to the original Post Cemetery, according to a document sent by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen from the Consul General at the American Embassy in Rome, Italy.

Clara Vick of Dimmitt and Teeny Bowden of Sunnyside began the search for the missing bodies after a trip to Italy last year. While

in Italy, the two met a young woman who asked if they could help her find where her father, Evaristo Fava, a former POW, was buried when the bodies of the five deceased POW's were returned to Italy in 1957. She said she was six months old when her father went to war and two years old when he died in the Hereford POW Camp, and her mother had tried to find some record in Italy. She wanted to see if the Americans could help.

Vick and Bowden, working through Sen. Bentsen's office, the

Dept. of Defense and the State Dept., were able to track down where the man and four other Italian POW's moved from the Hereford Camp were buried.

Bowden said they were still waiting to hear from Maj. David Vaughn with the Dept. of Defense about the high-level meeting between government officials from the United States and Italy about the discovery. She said they have sent a telegram to the Italians, informing them that the graves had been found in Oklahoma.

"At the clip it was going, we thought about halfway through the sale that it would set a new record," Dimmitt Young Farmers President Mike Odom said.

It did—by a long shot. The auction sale that ended the 1989 Castro County Junior Livestock Show shattered the record that had stood for three years as buyers shelled out \$206,420.54 for the 215 animals that made the sale, then added \$13,065.93 in donations to worthy projects through the "resale" process.

The final total: \$219,486.47. That figure was 8% higher than the previous high mark of \$201,968.01 that was set in the 1986 sale.

Buyers' clubs reported the best participation ever, and auctioneers Jack Howell, Johnny Davis and Kenneth Gregg called up prices that ran almost 20% above last year's.

"It was just great," Odom said. "We really appreciate the community for coming out and supporting the kids."

On top of the floor-price and premium bids paid to the county's 4-H and FFA youths for their animals, buyers donated \$6,796.53 to the Dimmitt Young Farmers, who conduct the livestock show; \$3,930 to help with the medical expenses of Gary Leatherwood, former Dimmitt 4-H and FFA member who is confined to a wheelchair; and \$2,399 to the Nazareth FFA to help the chapter continue improvements to its facilities.

The donations were initiated by buyers who donated their purchased animals back for "resale," with the resale amounts going to the specific projects.

Odom said the donations to the Dimmitt Young Farmers, plus their ticket sales this year, will enable the chapter to make the Dana Wall Memorial Scholarship program self-sustaining. Currently, three Dimmitt High School graduates are attending college on Wall Scholarships of \$1,000 per year each. The Young Farmers have averaged expending \$4,000 per year to scholarship students.

Rafter 3 Feedyard of Dimmitt provided the floor price on all steers in the show with a winning bid of \$75.75/cwt. Coleman & Stroud of Plainview provided a floor price of 63 cents per pound on lambs and 40 cents per pound on barrows.

Approximately half of the animals that made the local sale will be exhibited in the Houston Livestock Show later this month and needed only "guaranteed bids" here in case they don't bring higher prices there.

K-Bob's Steak House of Dimmitt guaranteed \$3.50 per pound for April Bennett's 1,165-lb. Grand Champion steer, a total of \$4,077.50.

Wesley Ralston's 220-lb. Grand Champion barrow brought a guaranteed bid of \$6.50 per pound (\$1,430) from three local cooperatives — Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., Castro Co-op Gin and Dimmitt Consumers.

Flagg Grain Co. guaranteed \$10 per pound for Kevin Bruton's 143-lb. Grand Champion lamb, a total of \$1,430.

Kay Gleghorn's 1,295-lb. Reserve Champion steer brought a guaranteed bid of \$2 per pound (\$2,590) from Bennett Cattle Co. of Hart.

Nikki Schulte's 210-lb. Reserve Champion barrow received a guaranteed bid of \$4.50 per pound (\$945) from Associated Insurance Agency of Dimmitt.

Flagg Farmers Gin and Easter Farmers Gin guaranteed \$5.50 per pound for Justin Gleghorn's 148-lb. Reserve Champion lamb, a total of \$770.

The premium sale maintained a clip of almost \$44,000 per hour throughout the afternoon — the highest in the show's 35-year history.

"We don't know for sure, but we've been told that our Castro County sale is probably the second biggest junior sale in Texas now, behind the Harris County show in Houston," Odom said.

The following is their account of their trip.

"The people are very friendly and eager to make you feel at home. Most of the people seem to be very educated and very aware of what is going on in the world. The newspapers are very good. We learned more about the USA in Ireland than we do from our own papers. The Irish people have had many hard times and seem to realize what is really important.

"We particularly wanted to visit a farm while we were there, and the hotel manager gave us the names of a farmer in a nearby village. When we finally found him, he asked us if we knew his friend, Bill Cleavinger of Hereford. We really did realize it is a small world then, because Bill is Lois' cousin. We spent most of the day on his farm and with his family. They have John Deere equipment and are very up to date and modern in their farming practice.

ces. He grows sugar beets, wheat, barley and oats. He has rock walls and hedges that are used as fences. These walls and hedges are found all over Ireland.

"There are lots of sheep and dairies, but he didn't have any. One of the most interesting facts about the country, is that he got \$6.60 a bushel for his 1988 wheat crop. If we were lucky, we got \$3.50 a bushel here. I bought a sack of flour and brought it home. It was \$1.47. The same flour in the US would cost \$2.48. The Irish paid twice as much for the wheat and the flour cost nearly half as much as it does here. The Irish farmers don't like the US farmers because they think we are trying to do away with their prices. We explained that it wasn't us, but our government that is trying to do this. We know he must be one of the top farmers in Ireland because we saw many more who didn't look as prosperous.

"Ireland is a very old country. I think the old castle ruins, rock walls, beautiful green countryside, the Atlantic Ocean on all sides and the friendly, quiet-speaking people were some of the finest things about the country."

Twenty-nine sugar cane farmers from St. Martin's Parish, Breaux Bridge, La., and their county agent, James Devillier, visited the Bob Kay family of Hart.

They arrived Feb. 13. The next day Bob took them to visit the American Fructose plant in Dimmitt. Eddie Adams gave a tour and explained the operation. They went on to Hereford where they were met by Tony Edwards for a tour of the Holly Sugar Corp. The bus then took the long way back to see area farms and many feed lots. At the Bob Kay Seed barn, the Kay family and friends and neighbors hosted a calf fry dinner.

Last Wednesday they visited the Hill Feedyard in Hart, where Dennis Hill took them through and explained the physical and financial aspects of the feedlot. Lunch was in Hart, where Janie and crew fed the group. After lunch Don Berrywinkle met them at the Estacado Industries feedyard and showed them

the sheep side of the feedlots. They came back by the Gilbreath and Kay farms, where Coby Gilbreath and Rocky Kay showed the beet planting and harvesting equipment. By then the group was damp and cold, so the bus headed for Lubbock, where they stopped at the mall and had a steak supper at the 50-Yard Line restaurant.

Last Thursday Bob had them back on the road to Hereford and the Frito Lay facilities. After lunch at K-Bob's they went to Arrowhead Hills, where Margie Ford showed the specialty food items produced there. The bus headed back to Dimmitt to the Junior Livestock Show, where they saw the animals and area young people, and visited for a while. From there it was back to the Kay Seed barn. The group brought crawfish and cooked a real Cajun meal for everyone.

All of the men were sugar cane farmers. They own their own corporation there. We were favorably impressed with them and hope they were impressed with our area and people.

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HISD schedules elections

The Hart School Board scheduled its 1989 trustee election for May 6 at its regular meeting Feb. 13.

The terms of J.D. Myrick and Weldon Davis will expire this year.

The board appointed Glynn Reed as election judge and Marlan Hart as alternate. Nancy Bowden and Nelda Ethridge were appointed as absentee voting clerks.

A tax report was presented to the board by Nancy Bowden, business manager for the HISD. According to the report, 91% of the current school taxes have been collected as of Jan. 31.

The board passed a resolution to begin taxing automobiles for the 1989-90 school year.

Mark Owens with United Group Insurance Co. met with the board and explained the student accident insurance currently covering HISD students, and Clendon Billington with Commercial Industrial Builders discussed alternative solutions for the science facility with the board.

The board offered a two-year contract to High School Principal Mark Stroebel, and extended the contract of Athletic Director James Mireles by a year. Contracts of Shirley Barnes, administrative assistant and counselor; and Nancy Bowden, business manager, were extended a year, forming two-year contracts.

The board also accepted the resignation of elementary aid Betty Griswold and employed Francisca

Caezuela to complete the remaining school year.

Brenda Campbell was recognized for coordinating an Apple computer repair workshop at HISD.

The purchase of two Olivetti work processors for business classes at Hart High School was approved by the board and Superintendent Phil Barefield reported on the arrival of a new Ford school bus.

In other action the board voted to advertise for bids on a 1976 Dodge 60-passenger school bus. Bids will be due in the superintendent's office on March 6 and will be opened at the regular meeting on March 9.

The board voted to change the March board meeting date to March 9 at 8 p.m. due to a conflict with the scheduled spring break. A special meeting will be held March 8 at 10 a.m. to discuss science facility alternatives.

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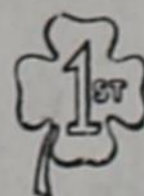
We salute everyone who had a part in our 35th annual Junior Livestock Show's success, and in the record-shattering sale Saturday.

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

Many urban hospitals realize the problem, also, he said.

He added, "If we ever lose our rural hospitals, they're gone—we won't ever get them back."

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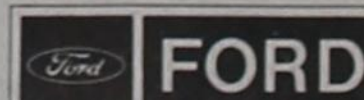

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

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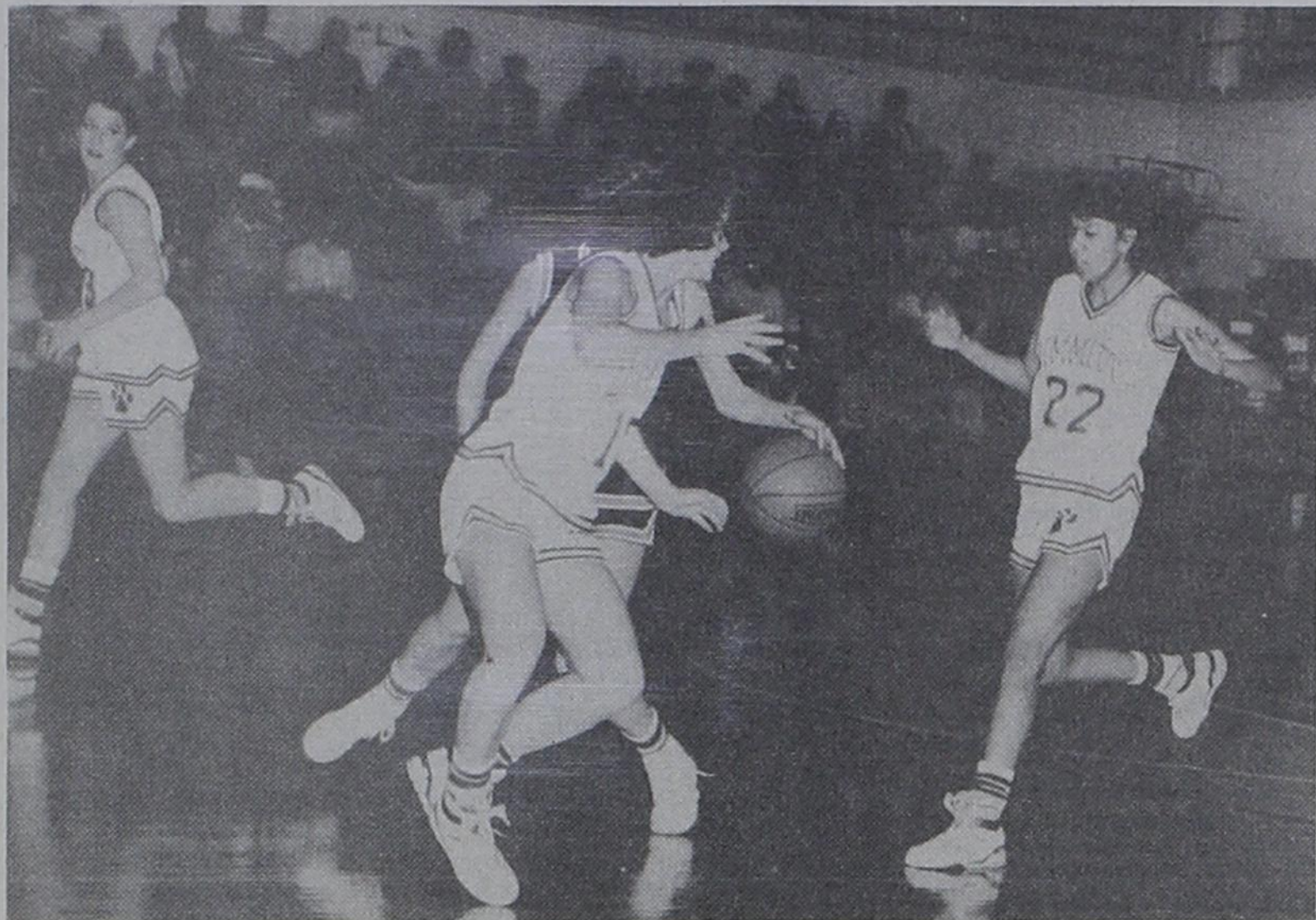

Bobbies top Dalhart for bi-district crown

Neither the Bobbies nor Dalhart's Wolverines had a good offensive game Friday night.

But the Bobbies were able to dominate — despite shooting only 28% from the floor the first half — and held the lead all the way to a 47-42 victory to capture the bi-district championship.

It may not have been pretty, but it was a big victory for Coach Richard Wood, who has taken all four of his Bobbies teams into the playoffs, only to be turned back at the bi-district level the last three years.

"Although we didn't play that well offensively, I thought we played a good defensive ball game," Wood said. "Three of our girls were playing sick, so I was worried, because Dalhart has a good ball club."

Both teams were noticeably uptight as they telegraphed their passes, missed layups and watched their shots rim out in the first half.

The game was 1:20 old before the first basket was scored — a driving layup by Dimmitt's Gloria Gauna.

Except for two free throws by Renae Josselet, the Bobbies depended on Gauna for all their first-quarter points. The 5-8 junior post scored three baskets from the paint and added a free throw on a three-point play to finish the period with seven as the Bobbies took a 9-4 lead going into the second quarter.

The quarter was almost half over before Dalhart got its first point, a free throw by tall playmaker Toni Kuster. A basket by all-district post Thedra Mayo and a free throw by post Chris McKlesky rounded out the Wolverines' first-quarter scoring.

"We got a lot of turnovers early that I thought put them out of the game," Wood said.

Both teams had a scoring drought from the last 2:28 of the first period until 6:35 of the second, when Josselet ripped a three-pointer. The next eight points came from a free-throw contest as Becky Rodriguez and Gauna swished two apiece for Dimmitt and McKlesky

and Deana Griego sank two each for Dalhart.

The two teams traded field goals the rest of the quarter, all on follow shots and fast-break layups, until Rodriguez sank a jumper with 0:01 left and made a free throw to complete a three-point play, giving the Bobbies a 23-14 halftime lead.

They needed that pad as the tall Wolverines charged back in the third to pull within three points, 33-30. Alicia Shippy with a follow shot, Gauna with two baskets underneath and Rodriguez with a pair of jumpers accounted for all 10 of Dimmitt's third-quarter points.

Threatened by Dalhart's third-period charge, the Bobbies put together their best quarter in the fourth, opening the period with five unanswered points by Josselet and Sydelle McDonald to build their lead to 38-30 before Dalhart could find the basket. McDonald did all of Dimmitt's scoring for more than three minutes with three free throws and a turnaround layup while Cunningham, Mayo and Kuster combined for nine points to bring the Wolverines within two,

41-39, with 3:04 remaining.

But that was as close as the Dalhart girls would get. KaLinda Dutton sank a follow shot, Gauna scored an open layup after a full-court feed by Rodriguez, and Dutton sank two free throws with 14 seconds left to rebuild the Bobbies' eight-point lead, 47-39, and ice the win. Dalhart's Nikki Strong popped a three-pointer before the buzzer to end the scoring.

Free throws again were the Bobbies' secret weapon as they connected on 16 of 22 (73%) for the night to keep the Wolverines in the hole.

Three-pointers fly freely as Bobcats win shootout

Dimmitt's Bobcats and Littlefield's Wildcats turned Plainview High School gym into Three-Point City last Thursday night.

Five players on the two teams swished 18 baskets from three-point range — 10 by Littlefield and eight by Dimmitt — as the Bobcats won the District 2-AAA championship playoff, 82-73.

It was Coach Ken Cleveland's 750th career win, and it was a satisfying one for the Hall of Fame coach. Littlefield had been the pre-season favorite to win the 2-AAA title.

Cleveland said he felt Dimmitt's fans had a big hand in this year's district championship.

"Our crowd has always been supportive, but it seems like they've been putting out an extra effort this year, pulling for us and helping us," he said.

Dimmitt's Emilio Arce popped six three-pointers and finished with a game-high 32 points. Justin Shultz netted 12 points in the second half to finish with 16, and Jason Long delivered nine points in the fourth quarter to finish with 13. Mat Bradley added eight, Brac Wardlaw netted seven (including two three-pointers) and Robert Ruiz scored six.

For Littlefield, longshot specialist Stephen Hernandez swished five three-pointers and finished with 22, while Junior Hernandez added 16 (including three threes) and post Mark King scored 13. Jerry Servan-

tez got the game's other two three-pointers.

The Bobcats took the lead at 4-3 on a short jumper by Arce, and never trailed after that in the rapid-fire contest.

"I thought we played about as well as we could play," Coach Cleveland said. "I was real proud of the way our boys were ready to play."

Dimmitt scored seven unanswered points in the first quarter to go up by 16-7 before Servantez fired his first cannonball and John Hall sank three free throws to bring the Wildcats back within two, 16-14, at quarter's end.

Bradley, Long and Shultz sagged on King inside and held the premier post forward scoreless in the first quarter. Besides jamming the passing lanes to him, "We wanted somebody in front of him when the shot went up so he couldn't hurt us on the offensive boards," Coach Cleveland explained. "He's plenty capable of hurting you."

He added, "Even though they hit all those outside shots, I still feel that their strength is inside. If I played them again, our first priority would still be to try to stop their inside game."

Dimmitt's front-court defensive trio also did a brilliant job of stealing and drawing charges anytime a Wildcat ventured down the baseline or into the paint.

The Bobcats took command of the game in the second quarter, outscoring the Wildcats 25-17. Wardlaw and Arce opened the period with two three-pointers, then Arce fed Shultz and Long for layups to give Dimmitt a 26-14 lead before King countered with his first basket of the night. The Bobcats maintained a healthy lead the rest of the half and went up by as much as 41-28 before Stephen Hernandez launched a three-point missile to cut it to 41-31 at halftime.

Dimmitt stretched its advantage to 16 (51-35) in the first three minutes of the third. Arce went on a 13-point rampage during the period, including three threes, while Shultz netted six and Bradley two. Dimmitt led by 62-49 at the third-quarter buzzer.

Junior Hernandez quickly cut Dimmitt's lead back to eight, 62-54, as he opened the fourth with a bomb and a pair of free throws. From then on, the fans in the jam-packed gym looked like they were watching a tennis match as the two teams traded baskets to the tune of 44 points — 24 by Littlefield and 20 by Dimmitt. The Wildcats could never get closer than seven as Long and Shultz set Dimmitt's fourth-quarter scoring pace with nine and five, respectively.

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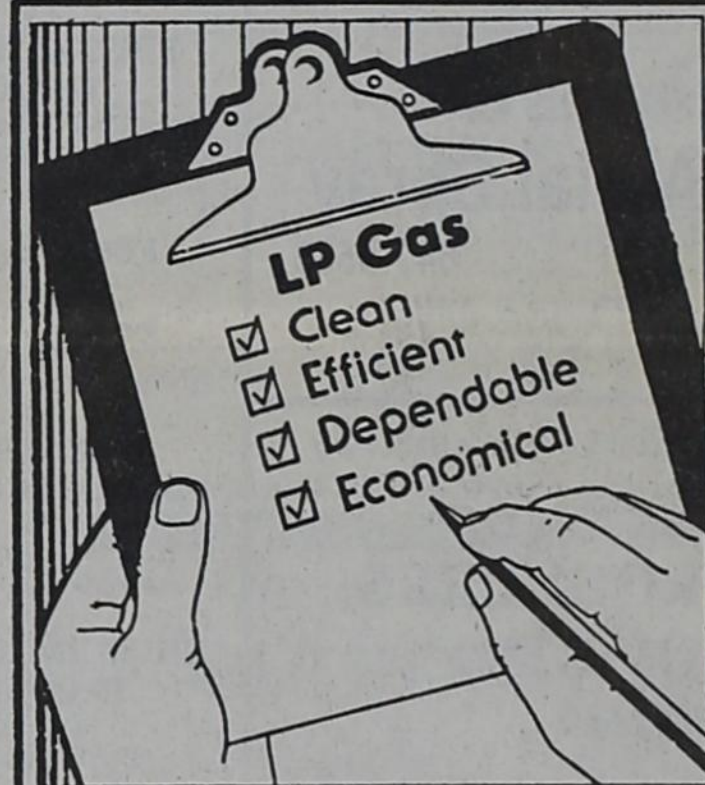

Bobbies zap Brownfield

In a magnificent effort Tuesday night, Dimmitt's Bobbies took control of the Brownfield Lady Cubs and zapped the defending state champions, 68-51, for the area championship.

The heady victory in the Texan Dome at South Plains College, Levelland, vaulted the Bobbies into the Region I-AAA tournament, where they'll meet Abilene Wylie in the semifinals Friday night at 8:30 in Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum.

The Bobbies put it all together Tuesday, hitting 56% of their field goals (24/43), swishing an impres-

sive 80% of their free throws (12/15) and outbattling the taller Lady Cubs on defense to dominate the game from start to finish.

Brownfield (28-4) was ranked No. 3 in the state going into Tuesday night's game, and Dimmitt (28-6) was ranked No. 12. The Lady Cubs had defeated the Bobbies 47-33 in the Caprock Tournament in December.

But it was a different Bobbies team that came out and swished three three-pointers in the first quarter Tuesday night, then hit eight of 12 shots in the second quarter to take a commanding 32-

18 halftime lead over the frustrated Lady Cubs.

Dimmitt post Gloria Gauna, surrounded by taller opponents underneath, still dominated the boards and chilled the Lady Cubs with 10 first-half points on nifty moves. Gauna finished with 24 points, including a perfect 4/4 free throws in the fourth.

Senior wing Sydelle McDonald played a steady game throughout, hitting two jumpers each quarter and going 3/3 at the free-throw line to finish with 19. The Student Senate president also snared a big share of defensive rebounds to deny the cold-shooting Lady Cubs a lot of second shots.

Senior Becky Rodriguez hit some of the game's most thrilling shots — two three-pointers in the opening period, another three-pointer in the third and a crowded long shot at the third-quarter buzzer. She was fouled on the last shot and made the free throw to complete a three-point play that put the Bobbies back up by 16 over the charging Lady Cubs. Rodriguez, who also turned in an excellent defensive game in Dimmitt's full-court press, finished with 14 points. She played the last 11:24 of the game nursing four fouls.

Sophomore guard Renae Josselet rang up the game's first three-pointer to put the Bobbies up by 5-3 and serve notice on the Lady Cubs. The Bobbies never trailed after that. Josselet also was a key in Dimmitt's full-court press that forced three straight turnovers in the second quarter, made Brownfield give up the ball twice behind the time line in the first half and caused the Lady Cubs to hurry their

shots all night. Senior post KaLinda Dutton rounded out Dimmitt's scoring with four points while sharing time with senior Alicia Shippy. Both girls made their presence known on the defensive boards.

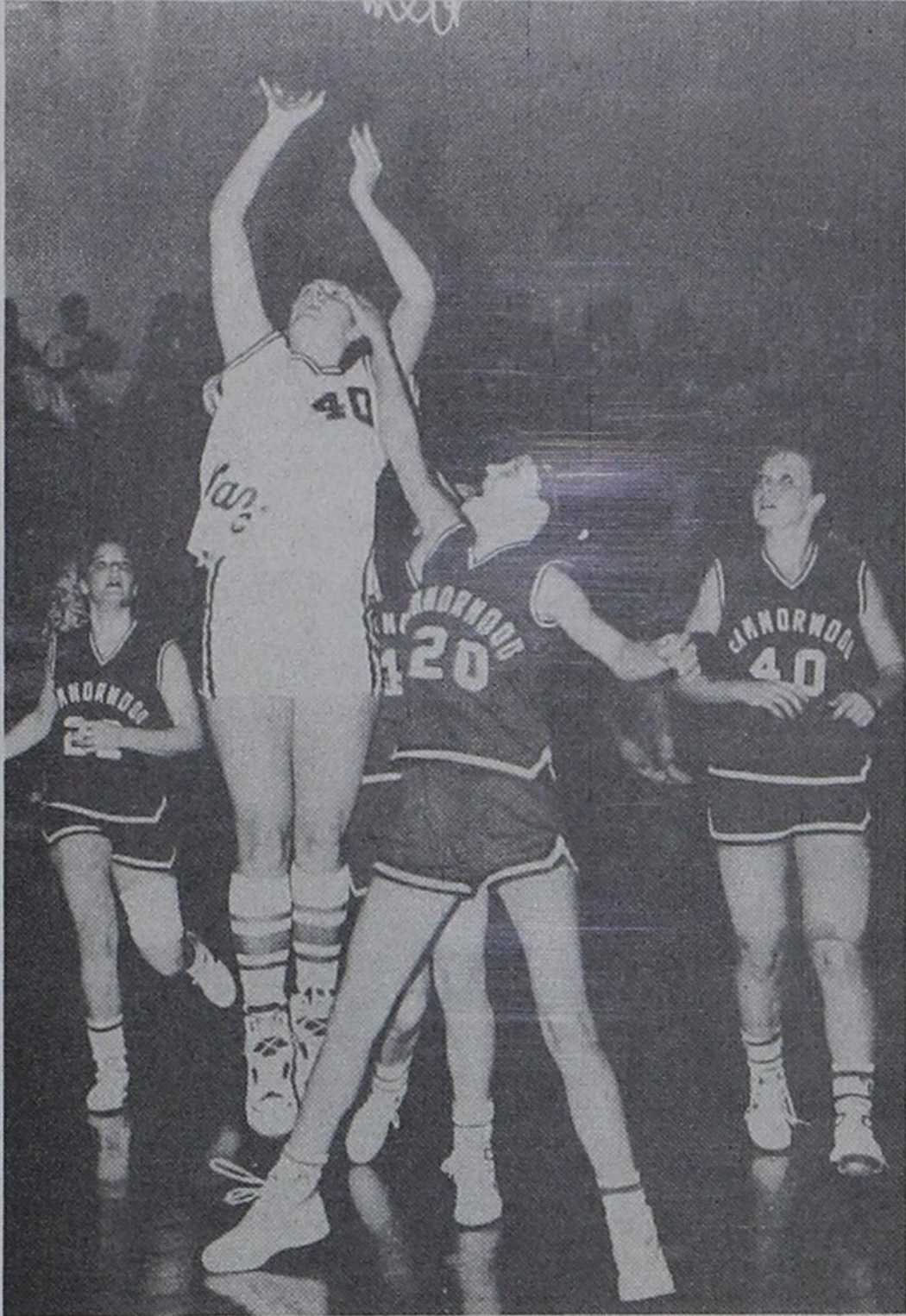
Sheryl Swoopes, the Lady Cubs' 6-0 all-stater, carried the scoring load for her team, including 13 straight Brownfield points in the fourth before fouling out with 41 seconds remaining. She scored all but 17 of Brownfield's points—34 of 51, including 21 points in the second half.

"We tried to bottle Swoopes up, but she's too good an athlete—she's going to get her points," Wood said.

The Bobbies effectively shut down all of Swoopes's teammates, building a 15-9 lead in the first quarter and stretching it to 32-18 by halftime.

Brownfield made a run in the third and cut Dimmitt's lead to 38-30 with a series of steals, layups and follow shots. But Gauna on the inside and Rodriguez on the outside came to the rescue, netting 10 points in the final two minutes—despite three blocked shots—to give the Bobbies a 16-point pad, 48-32, going into the fourth.

For most of the fourth quarter, it was Swoopes vs. Dimmitt. The all-stater opened the quarter with six unanswered points to trim the Bobbies' lead to 48-38. But Gauna, McDonald, Dutton, Rodriguez and Josselet combined for 20 points during the final 6:30 to complete a thrilling victory that brought a standing ovation from the big Dimmitt crowd when the area championship trophy was presented.
