U. S. Can Boast Largest Air Line In Whole World

NEW YORK.—Americans, who went abroad and returned boasting that Europe surpassed us in aviation, will be interested in the report of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce that the United States now has the largest air transport system in the world.

United Air Lines is flying three times as many miles monthly, carrying twice as many passengers and nine times as much mail, as the largest European company, Deutsche Luft Hansa, according to statistics.

During a 30-day period it flew 1,125,000 miles, contrasted with 320,000 miles for Luft Hansa, and carried 8,000 passengers against 4,700 on the European system.

Coast Friends Watch Waters Fight For Bonus

PORTLAND, Ore.—To his friends back home, the rise of Walter William Waters, two fisted ex-cannery superintendent, to commander-in-chief of the army of unemployed veterans, now being Washington is not so astonishing.

Waters' life in the northwest has been sketchy—at least that portion of which his friends know. Born in Burns, Ore., 34 years ago he received his education in the public schools and later spent a year in a teacher's college.

Waters is a veteran of many campaigns. He joined the army in 1916 and went to the border with the 2d Idaho National Guard on duty at Nogales, Ariz. He was mustered out of service for only five weeks before the United States entered the World War.

He joined the army at Boise and was a teacher at Boise, Idaho, artillery, 1st army. Waters saw active service, he states, in every major engagement of the World War. He was discharged June 29, 1919.

It was over a game of pinocle with friends that Waters first formulated the plans for a bonus march on Washington. He had endeavored to obtain payment upon his bonus without success, he told friends, and the only solution to his problem was to influence congress to move forward the date of final payment.

Parisians Couldn't Find Enough Seats

PARIS.—Should the entire population of Paris decide to attend a show or movie some evening, nearly 3,000,000 spectators could not find accommodation. Recent statistics show that in spite of the reputation Paris has for being "the greatest theater city in the world" at the theaters, music halls, concert halls, circuses, cabarets, movie-houses, cafes-concerts, total only 260,000 seats. Movies lead with 180,478, the largest boasting of 4,500 seats, the smallest a mere 150. Theaters are second: 47,830 seats and music halls, circuses, cabarets and cafes-concerts grouped total only 26,450. Private halls rented from time to time for special performances make up the balance of the 250,000 accommodation.

Glacier Priest Finds a Valley

SEWARD, Alaska.—An "Alaska Yosemite"—a marvelous, hidden valley in uncharted areas of the Chignagak volcano — has been found by the Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, S. J., geologist of the University of Santa Clara, Cal. Turning from explorer to discoverer, Father Hubbard and his party of scientists put in a precipitous walled volcano harbor called Port Wrangell after a perilous voyage in Bering Sea in a motorship Polar Bear. The "glacier priest," accompanied by Red Chisholm, former Santa Clara athlete, Edgar Levin and George Peterson, rowed ashore and scaled the mountain barrier that hid the interior of the country from view. From the top of the ridge they gazed on stupendous 2,000-foot cliffs that dropped to a walled valley surrounded by towering snow-capped mountains. Ice was moving, grinding down glacier valleys. Waterfalls dashed over cliffs. A broad river entered the strange valley in a cleft of the mountains and swung through dense vegetation of the valley floor through another cleft to the sea. Big brown bears and small game and fowl were seen in abundance.

Salvaged Farm Surplus Will Aid In Soul Saving

CHICAGO.—America's farm surplus is to be salvaged and canned to feed Chicago's destitute population this winter, according to plans announced by Dr. Paul Rader of the Chicago Gospel Tabernacle.

"You can't preach to a man on an empty stomach, and so we're going to feed him first and save his soul second," Dr. Rader explained in announcing the organization of Paul Rader's Pantry. "Rotting on Ground" "From one end of this country to the other, fruits and vegetables are rotting on the ground because there is no profitable market for them; and yet hundreds of thousands of people are faced with starvation. Let the politicians give hungry men beer if they wish; the Chicago Gospel Tabernacle is going to give them bread." In dozens of more cities and towns throughout the country, Dr. Rader is preparing to organize huge "canning camps" manned by volunteer workers, who will gather up the surplus produce in nearby counties and prepare it for shipment to Chicago. Several manufacturers, he said, have donated canning equipment and the volunteer workers will be supervised by experts furnished by the National School of Pressure Cooking, Eau Claire, Wis.

Canning Camp "Our first canning camps," the Evangelist explained, "will be located in cities where the Chicago Gospel Tabernacle already maintains other tabernacles; but we are also planning to establish camps in many other cities before the summer is ended. Meanwhile, we are making an addition to the Chicago tabernacle to serve as headquarters for the Pantry and we are setting 6,000,000 cans or pounds of food as our goal. More than 24,000 needy Chicago families were fed by our organization last year, as the need is greater. Dr. Rader explained that in addition to the canning done in the canning camps, his workers also would solicit canned produce from housewives and field produce from farmers throughout the country.

**SPEAKING of SPORTS**

By SIDNEY C. LEE, United Press Staff Correspondent. "Babe" Didriksen After New Honors. A little over two years ago Miss Mildred (Babe) Didriksen's name would have meant a little less than nothing to followers of sports. Today that same name needs no explanatory remarks, and the owner thereof hopes to win new honors in the Olympic competitions.

Miss Didriksen wears the colors of the Employers Casualty team of Dallas. She not only expressed her hopes and ambitions but said she believed she would realize them. Many have like beliefs, among these her trainer, coach and discoverer, M. J. McCombs, former Texas A. & M. college and Missouri university athlete without whom the story of Babe Didriksen is incomplete.

"At least three of the Olympic events, the 50-meter hurdles, and the discus and javelin throws will go to Babe," said McCombs. "The 100-meters run is on the line—she has never run this distance in competition—but I know of no one who can beat marks she is making in practice."

"The running high jump will be the kid's severest test," he continued. "Jean Scheiley of Philadelphia holds the record at five feet two and one-half inches, but she used a scissors style. I have been teaching Babe the western style, and she has cleared five feet, three inches in practice."

"But doing it under the strain of competition is something else. However, if her trainer is doubtful the Babe makes up for it."

"It may sound a bit boastful," she said, somewhat apologetically, "but if I really believe I'm going to win all five at the Olympics, why not say so?"

"If I didn't think so, I'd say that." This amazing, 19-year-old girl whom McCombs discovered playing basketball for Beaumont high, had never seen a track meet two years and six months ago. She was selected All-American basketball one month after joining the Employers Casualty Company Golden Cyclones.

In 1930 she broke three world track and field records. The women's baseball throw mark was surpassed when she turned in a throw of 265 feet, 10 inches. She set a new javelin record (old weight) with a toss of 133 feet, five and one-half inches. Her running broad jump of 18 feet, 9 1/2 inches, also set a new world's record which stood only five minutes—long enough for Stella Walsh of Cleveland to take her turn with a leap of 18 feet, 3 1/2 inches.

In 1931, she beat the 80-meter hurdles world's record of 12.2 seconds held by Miss Clark, South Africa. The Babe's mark of 12 seconds is now under submission for official recognition. Unofficially, she tied the 100-meters run record of 12 seconds.

She crowned her 1931 achievements by smashing her own record in the baseball throw with a distance of 297 feet, 5 inches. This mark has never been approached by any other girl athlete.
