## State conducting agriculture census

Report forms for the 1997 Census of Agriculture will soon begin appearing in the mailboxes of farmers and ranchers across the nation. For the twenty-fifth time since the first Ag Census in 1840, farmers and ranchers will play the key role in providing the country with a statistical picture of U.S. agriculture at county, state, and national levels
The 1997 Census will provide a detailed picture of the changes in agriculture since the last Census, in 1992. The focus of the current Census includes number of farmers, farm size, operator characteristics, crop and livestock production, agricultural product sales, and production expenses of farmers and ranchers. Report forms will be mailed late in December to collect data for the 1997 calendar year. Farmers will be asked to return

Census of Agriculture statistics make up the only national, state and local-level agricultural information database available. These statistics are used by many different organizations and individuals for a myriad of purposes, including:

- Farm machinery manufacturers use Ag Census statistics to locate their industries where they are needed by using county and state statistics, resulting in economic benefit to farm operators
- Researchers and legislators can use county-level data o define problem areas and help farmers recover from tbreaks of disease and pests.
- The agricultural community as a whole uses Censu information for evaluating programs affecting agricul-

Set in the years immediately following the Civil War, 1865-1875, "Horns" tells the tale of a war between the Indians, buffalo hunters, U.S. Calvary and Texas cattlemen to gain control of the huge grasslands known as the Llano Estacado
"There's a wide variety of history in the Texas Panhandle and no one's ever written about it," said McCathern, a retired farmer and former activist in the American Agri-
the history of the Panhandle with lively, colorful characters.
McCathern describes the book as an exciting fictional story around historical facts in the style of Louis L'Amour that every lover of western fiction will enjoy Most of the historical facts were gathered from the Panhandle Plains Museum i Amarillo, McCathern said.

A book reviewer for the Amarillo Globe wrote that McCathern demonstrated a tal ent for story telling and that the nove leaves the essential elements of the traditional west alive despite tinkering with
"Horns" is a take on what might have happened if the first Anglo settlers had been friendly to the Indians and if the federal government had chosen to hono its treaties and protect the buff a herds natural source of food for native inhab tants of the Llano Estacado.
