Business Failures Show a Decrease Over August, 1931

AUSTIN.—An encouraging decline in average liabilities per failure counled with no gain in the number of bankruptcies resulted in a definitely good showing for commercial failures in Texas during August. The total number of failures in August, as reported weekly to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research was 70: 70 insolvencies were reported in the preceeding month also and 101 in August last year. Although the average weekly num-Although the average weekly number increased from 14 to 17 in August, the comparison with August a year ago, when there was an average of 20 failures per week, showed improvement.


