COL. TOM HUNTER AS A PEOPLE'S LOBBYIST

Col. Tom Hunter, who ran a vigorous third in the July primaries, will represent the cause of the people under the ig dome the coming winter. There is a state taypayers' association which is said to have a large membership, It held an important and largely attended convention in the city of Wichita Falls. Colonel Hunter was named as the head of its lobby at the next session of the legislature. He made a most aggressive speech on tax reform on accepting the place. A five year plan of organization tax reduction and governmental economy was adopted. A committee was established to study tax reform and suggest changes in the state constitution. It was resolved by the association that he special session of the legilature be adjourned immediaely without action now on reduction of state employes' salaries or appropriations not of emergency nature. Many changes are suggested in the state constitution. Many important recommendations are made.

First, reduction of the 135 state departments to 25. Now York, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and Georgia have adopted this plan. Reduction of the number of counties to 50, or as small a number as practical, is another reform recommended. More important than all is the reduction in the house of representatives to 62. A reminder that the Taxpayers' association will go up against the real thing in its state department reduction, as well as reducing the number of legislative districts from 150 to 62. Another constitutional change would give the governor a term of four years with provisions for an increased salary and a law that he would not succeed himself in of-

Publicity is the thing, according to the Taxpayers' league. Their leaders call for an educational campaign for taxpayers on the functions of government. It is admitted without argument that an educational campaign is necessary if the recommendations for changes in the constitution and statutory laws are to be brought about by the people. Col. Hunter appears to be in line for another aggressive campaign, with the office of governor as the prize in 1934. He is a most excellent copy maker. He will keep the newspaper tribe busy during the winter and spring months of

Narcotics Are Wrongly Called Drugs By Many

News writers and headline writers and headine writers often refer to "rug addicts," "drug fiends," and "drug raids," when they mean "nercotic (or dope) addicts, "narcotic fiends," and "narcotic raids."

Some "dope fiend" runs amuck, the police raid an opium den or archive.

rest an opium peddler, some one gets into trouble by selling opium

gets into trouble by selling opium or other narcotics, and the event is likely chronicled as the misadventure of a "drug peddler," when "dope peddier" or "narcotic peddier" is meant.

A drug is defined in the national food and drug act, as an article used for the purpose of curing, mitigating or preventing disease in man or other animal. Drugs are handled by over 60,000 retail druggists, who play a most important part in the health and economy of the people; by over 500 wholesale druggists by several hundred manufacturing druggists, all of whom are by inference

hundred manufacturing druggists, all of whom are by inference harmed when the word "drug" is used to designate that particular class of drugs known as "narcotics" or "dope."

No objection could possibly be had to the publication of the misdeeds or misadventures of "dope peddlers" or "dope addicts" but to describe them as "drug peddlers" or "drug addicts" does an injury.

Texas Coach Is An Inventor of Athletic Uniforms

AUSTIN.—An idea, a band of elastic and a strip of felt have made the name of Milton W. Kelly, athletic trainer at the Univer-sity of Texas, well known in ath-letic circles of colleges and high schools throughout a great part of

Kelly, known at Texas university as "Kel," couldn't find any knee pads on the market suitable for protection of basketball players and at the same time giving them freedom of action. So he designed pads for the university team.

A simple band of elastic to which was attached a curved piece of felt furnished protection light-ness and freedom of action. The

ness and freedom of action. The pad met with good results at the University of Texas, so Kelly patented his pad and began manufacturing them himself.

Since 1927, he has manufactured more than 50,000 of the pads, which have been sold principally in the midwest and southwest. Unable to find any suitable factories to produce his article, Kelly has set up a group of machines in the basement of his home.

Kelly's inventing didn't stop with the knee pad. In spare mo-ments from his training duties at the university, he studied other means of improving athletic equipment. Noting that athletes frequently had to don practice clothes still damp from the previous session, endangering their health and athletic fitness, kelly invented a simple terror of the structure of the struc nple hanger to be put in dress-


