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COMMITTEE ADOPTS REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE ON THE RANGER FINANCING PLAN

The general committee, appointed by the Ranger city commission to go into the question of re-financing the city and making recommendations in connection with the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the city, met in the office of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Monday night at 7:30 to hear the report from the sub-committee.

Some discussion of several points was heard, doing chiefly with the ability of the city to operate under the proposed suggestions and the finances of the city in the years to come.

There were approximately 40 citizens present, including the 21 members of the general committee, many of whom asked for explanations of several of the items, which were given by the chairman of the committee and by W. S. Adamson, a member of the sub-committee.

LAREDO, Oct. 18.—District Attorney John A. Valls "lone wolf of the Rio Grande" today appeared to have made good his promise to call James E. Ferguson before the Webb county grand jury to disclose his sources of information on alleged illegal primary voting.

Valls said the sheriff at Austin had been sent a citation to serve on Ferguson.

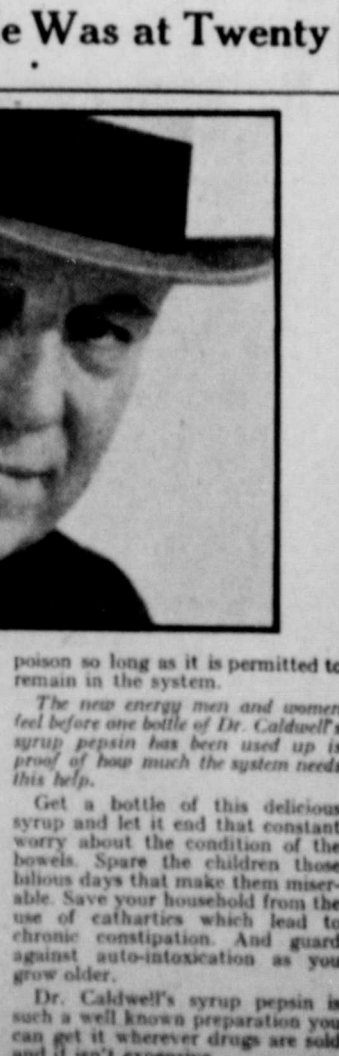

If your salad is prepared in the cool of the morning and the lettuce washed and crisped ready to use, you will find that the meal is practically ready when you want to serve it.

Many salads must stand several hours before serving. Jellied salads usually require at least two hours to become firm and may stand for 24 hours without harm.

Frozen Fruit Salad. One cup diced fresh fruit, 1-2 cup grape fruit pulp, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatine, 2 tablespoons cold water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-2 cup whipping cream, 1-2 cup mayonnaise, 1-8 teaspoon salt, paprika, lettuce.

Jellied Cucumber and Pineapple Salad. One cucumber, 1-2 tablespoons cold water, 1-3 cup boiling water, 4 tablespoons sugar, 4 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cups crushed canned pineapple, lettuce, mayonnaise, French dressing.
