Bankruptcies Are Fewer In Texas During September

AUSTIN .- Fewer bankruptcies and smaller liabilities marked the record made in Texas during Sep-tember by Texas business firms. Weekly reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research during September indicate that only 47 firms went into bankruptcy during the month, as com-pared with 70 in August and 87

pared with 70 in August and 87 in September a year ago, declines of 33 and 46 per cent respectively. "Liabilities were only \$799,000, the first time in over a year that the total liabilities for any one month have been less than \$1,000,000," the bureau's report said. "This small volume of indebtedness of failing concerns compared quite favorably with the total of \$1,410,000 for August and \$1,518,000 in September, 1931. The average liabilities per failure, accordingly, showed a substantial drop from \$20,143 in August to only \$17,000 in September. The average weekly number of failures dropped to 12 as compared with 17 in the previous month and 22 a year ago.
