Farmer Believes Gold Filled Cannon Hidden In Bayou

HOUSTON.—Chris Casey, 64-year-old farmer, still believes there is a Spanish cannon filled with gold somewhere beneath the waters of Cedar Bayou, and has resumed his search for it.

Many persons smile at the famous legend of the gold-filled cannon, but not Casey. Harris county's leading buried-treasure enthusiast, he is firmly convinced of its existence.

He tells about other buried treasures, too: A pirate ship with a cargo of gold sunken in Trinity Bay off Anahuac; a Mexican treasure ship in the mud of Barnetts Bay, and many more.

The gold-filled cannon is his favorite, however, and he is certain he will find it some day. He believes it contains \$50,000 in gold.

According to Casey, the cannon was on a sailboat belonging to Santa Anna, the Mexican general, and was sunk during the Texas revolution to prevent its capture. Such an incident is mentioned in most authoritative histories of the Texas revolution.

Several years ago, according to Casey, a Houston man found a cannon and managed to drag it to the sloping bayou bank. He rushed to Houston to get help in salvaging it and when he returned it had disappeared. Casey's theory is rolled back into the bayou.

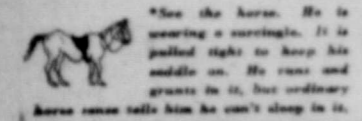

The girls' basketball team won over Morton Valley at a game played in the high school gym Thursday night. The score was 19 to 9.

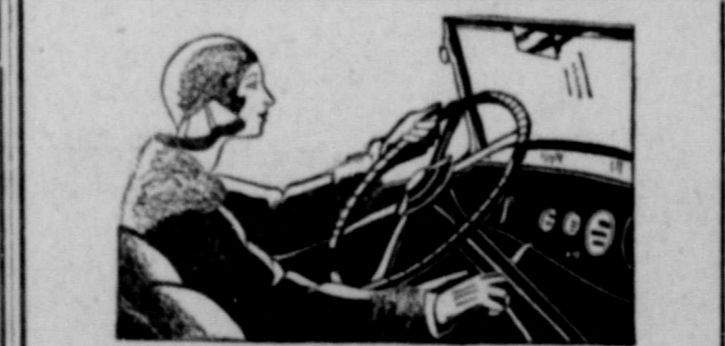

SPEAKING OF THANKSGIVING AND TEXAS

Thanksgiving is on the way. Now it is said production cost of turkeys in DeWitt county, "the turkey raising center of the world," is being cut to a low figure this year. Producers have fattened their birds "on feed raised on the farm." Splendid records have been made by the growers. One couple raised 293 turkeys from 15 hens at a total feed cost of \$64.54 of which \$13.80 was skimmed milk. For this season buyers are talking opening prices of around 11 cents. Although no price level has been set in the Cuero area opening of the market was scheduled for Monday, Oct. 31. There is an enormous crop of turks. There is a lower purchasing power than in former years but the buyers are ready and the shipments to the larger cities of the republic will be as heavy if not heavier than ever before.

Four years ago Senator Borah and his fellow campaigners promised "two chickens in every pot daily and a garage for every home owner." William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, reports 9,700,000 idle workers in the United States, which is a slight deduction as 650,000 idlers found jobs or half-jobs in the month of September. 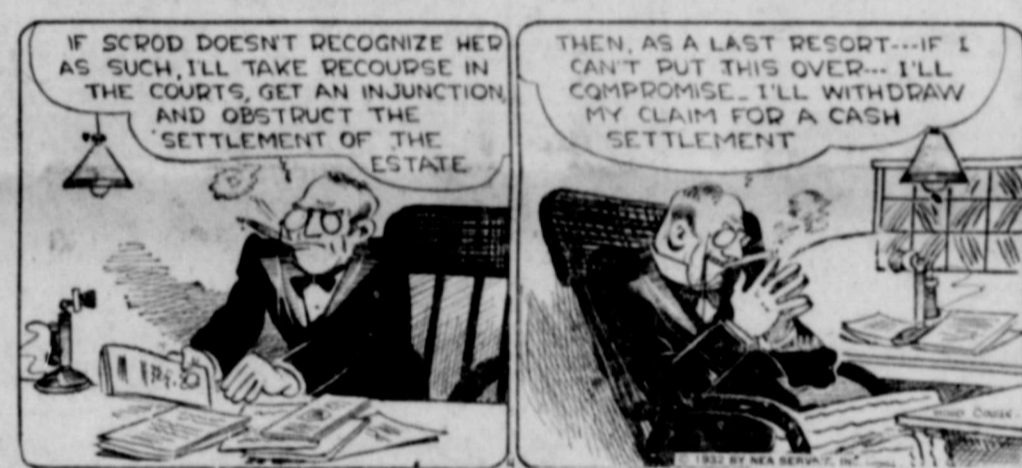
