OFFICE HOLDING POLTERS CONDEMNED

R. F. C. Grants New Loan to Aid Texas Relief

SECOND LOAN APPROVED BY HEADQUARTERS

\$795,369 Is Allotted As Texas Second Share In Aid Fund.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation today granted a loan of \$795,369 to Texas to meet emergency relief needs in 142 counties from Nov. 1 to Dec. 31.

In the application Gov. R. S. Sterling told the corporation a committee composed of managers of the three regional chambers of commerce of Texas will administer the relief.

"Tax burdens of the counties and cities of Texas have reached a limit and delinquencies in tax collections and decreasing property values have greatly curtailed the ability of the county and city governments to meet future requirements for emergency relief," Sterling said.

The corporation previously authorized \$466,597 in relief aid to Texas. Directors of the three regional chambers of commerce last week asked the R. F. C. for \$1,400,000.

Governor Refuses To Proclaim Day For Medallion Sale

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—Gov. R. S. Sterling today said he believed he acted rightly in refusing to issue a state proclamation for observance of "medallion day," set aside for subscriptions to the national democratic campaign fund.

Governor Sterling pointed out that, as governor, he represents all the people of the state. "If I issued one for the democrats, I should also issue one for other parties," he said.

HOOVER ON LAST LEG OF CAMPAIGN

ABOARD PRESIDENT HOOVER'S TRAIN, Nov. 5.—President Hoover, invading the northwest in his final campaign tour, spoke briefly at Beloit, Wis., today, shortly after it had been learned two negroes were under arrest on suspicion of tampering with rails on the track over which his special service pass.

Secret service men minimized the seriousness of the incident.

President Hoover will deliver a major address at Salt Lake City Monday, it was announced today.

"Democratic sponsors of outright prohibition repeal," said Mr. Hoover at St. Louis, "know that their stronghold in the south will not accept the proposal, which means return of the saloon and lack of protection to dry states."

It was Mr. Hoover's first mention of the prohibition issue since his acceptance speech.

The highway extends across parts of Eastland, Palo Pinto and Erath counties.

German Youth To Play At Church

Larry Eisner, German student from Leipzig, Germany, who is helping to pay his way through school in the United States by giving organ recitals, will play at the First Christian church in Ranger this morning.

Mr. Eisner presented an organ concert at the Avenida theatre on Friday night and will give a 10-minute concert at the beginning of each showing of the feature picture against today and tonight.

Mr. Eisner said today that he expected to be in Ranger until Monday or Tuesday and would go direct to Birmingham, Alabama, where he was scheduled to present an organ recital.

CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR MAKE APPEALS

FORT WORTH, Nov. 5.—Two rival candidates for governor of Texas drew the state's political knot tighter today as their campaigns entered an end.

Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, democratic nominee, returned to her Austin home to await the command of the voting electorate on Nov. 8. Her husband, "Farmer Jim," carried his plea for party loyalty to Tyler. He will join his wife at Austin Sunday.

Ferguson bitterly attacked the claim of Orville Bullington, republican candidate, that the independent oil men would be "ruined" if Mrs. Ferguson is elected.

"All the troubles of the independent oil men have been inflicted during the reign of his good man Friday, Ross Sterling," Ferguson charged.

Ferguson is acting "abundant as usual," Webb Walker, chairman of the Roosevelt-Garner-Bullington club, asserted here today.

Frantic efforts being made by Jim Ferguson to coerce democrats into voting for him "testify to the effectiveness of Bullington's campaigning," Walker said.

Sunday Bullington will plead for a "new deal" in state government in the Panhandle, culminating his tour at Amarillo, Monday he will return to Wichita Falls where a home-coming rally is planned in his honor.

Rev. Shearer Will Finish Pastorate At Night Service

Rev. George W. Shearer, pastor of the First Methodist church of Eastland and formerly pastor of the First Methodist church of Ranger, will preach his last sermon as pastor of the Eastland church tonight as he has completed his fourth year in the pastorate.

Rev. Shearer said he was sorry that he was finishing his work at the church as it had been a very pleasant four years and he had many friends in this section of the country whom he would hate to leave.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 5.—Rev. S. D. Greathouse, said to be an Apostolic minister, was shot in the head and Mrs. Sophia Wilkins was shot in the abdomen here today as they emerged from an automobile truck equipped with a trailer hose.

Both were critically wounded.

Police held a man in connection with the shooting.

From Ranger the tour of inspection will go to Gorman, Okra, Rising Star, Cisco, Grapevine, and Ft. Worth, where various demonstrations, including improvements on bedrooms, yards and gardens will be inspected.

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—The right of present legislators to sit in session if members elected Tuesday appear to demand their places, was put squarely up to the legislature today by Representative W. L. Pope of Corpus Christi.

The house was still in turbulent debate over the proposal when adjournment was taken until Monday morning. The house did not reach the oil bill at all.

The senate said it was a committee of the whole on the proposed oil bill and heard Railroad Commissioner E. O. Thompson discuss its effects.

Belton Man To Be Tried For Torch Murder

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—Cal Yarbrough, former Belton city councilman, under indictment for murder in connection with the torch death of his foster daughter, will be tried here on a charge of venue.

Yarbrough is accused of killing the girl on Sept. 8, by setting fire to her while they were together on an automobile. The district attorney said the girl's life was insured heavily against accidental death. Yarbrough has been denied bond.

Tag Day Will Be Conducted On Armistice Day

A tag day will be conducted in Ranger on Armistice Day by the ladies of the American Legion auxiliary, it was announced Saturday by Mrs. D. W. Johnson.

Mrs. J. D. MacCister will be chairman of the tag day, and will have headquarters in the Gholson hotel. All money received by the sale of tags will go to the fund for bringing Christmas cheer to disabled veterans. Part of the money will go to furnish cheer to the veterans themselves and part will be spent for toys for children of disabled men.

The tag day will continue throughout the day, November 11.

STOCK PICKED FOR RANGER'S BIG RODEO

Sig Faircloth, general chairman of the American Legion rodeo to be staged in Ranger on Nov. 12 and 13, announced Saturday that he and W. N. McDonald, co-chairman, had made a trip to the Stoker ranch near Breckenridge and had secured some good rodeo stock to be used in the big Armistice celebration.

Brahma steers, wild Brahma calves and four rodeo broncs with wide reputations as buckers have been secured for the event, which are to be held at Lillard field.

Among the rodeo horses, which have been in action in some of the leading rodeos in the state, will be Brown Jug, Tackles, Wings and Navajo, four of the most famous horses owned by Jap Stoker, proprietor of the ranch and himself a well-known figure in rodeo circles.

The four broncs are among the hardest in the state to ride, having been in many rodeos and having won a wide reputation as bad actors.

Sig Faircloth said Saturday that he could testify to the fact that the calves would be hard to handle, as he roped one. Before he could get the calf thrown it had kicked at him, tearing the front out of his shirt and tearing his trousers with another kick before he could get it down. Mr. Faircloth is considered one of the best half ropers in the section of the country and the fact that he had trouble with one of the calves is enough to convince anyone that plenty of action will be seen when the calf roping events are called.

ROOSEVELT COMPLETES HIS CAMPAIGN

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Franklin D. Roosevelt made his final appeal to the American electorate and the supreme effort of his national campaign for the presidency at a mass meeting in Madison Square Garden Saturday night.

The democratic nominee went into the home stretch of the race with the apparent complete support of the man who was his chief rival for the nomination, Alfred E. Smith.

Smith, Friday night, re-emphasized party harmony and gave his principles support.

In his speech Governor Roosevelt attacked President Hoover for what he termed "misrepresentation and misquotation" of his declaration on the abolition of poverty.

Smith characterized Mr. Hoover as "the real leader of the dry party" and declared "the farmer was forgotten, but the tariff was not."

Charges Abuse To Hoover Aide



After John Marrinan, above, had announced his support of Governor Roosevelt he claims he received telephonic threats and abuse from Lawrence Richey, one of the White House secretaries, Marrinan for five years was an aide to President Hoover when the president was secretary of commerce. Marrinan, who lives in Washington, made his charges in a letter to A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Teamsters.

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HOUSE PASSES RESOLUTION ON SATURDAY

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—With 11 dissenting votes, the Texas house of representatives today adopted a resolution condemning the office-holding holder who deserts his party in the midst of a fight, or bites the hand that feeds him.

The vote was 83 for the resolution. Six present did not vote. A motion to reconsider the resolution automatically held up further discussion until the next legislative day.

President Hoover's Springfield address, referring to the times as presenting a crisis like that of the Civil War period was the basis of the resolution. It condemned a "vile threat to arouse sectional strife and to return to our state carpet-bag governors."

In such a crisis it was declared the duty of every official "who sought, accepted and holds office as a democrat to continue the fight under the banner of his enlistment." President Hoover was referred to as the "acting president."

No direct reference was made to Governor R. S. Sterling, who has announced his support of Orville Bullington, republican candidate for governor.

Friday afternoon 104 yards were given out and assistants were Mrs. Lola Mitchell from Methodist church, Mrs. E. F. Ganow, Church of God, and Mrs. Ruth Shelton, and Jean Day of the Civic League, who made three dresses.

Women helping Saturday afternoon were Mmes. J. M. Perkins, Theodore Ferguson, F. F. Ganow, M. J. Pickett, and Ruth Shelton, the corps having been increased as there was a greater demand and a larger number of applicants than on any week day.

Cutting sewing and apportioning material will continue throughout each afternoon of this week.

Insull Arrest Is Ratified By Court

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 5.—The appeals court today ratified the provisional arrest of Samuel Insull, former Chicago utilities executive, sought by Illinois officials on charges of embezzlement.

Insull had sought permission to remain in Greece for two months longer and had asked a continual police escort to "prevent kidnapping attempts."

HOOPER'S SPRINGFIELD SPEECH IS BASIS ON WHICH IT IS PASSED.

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Texas Voting Has Grown Much In Past 60 Years

The voting in Texas since 1872, when Horace Greeley and General U. S. Grant opposed each other for President of the United States, has grown from slightly more than 100,000 to near the 1,000,000 mark.

Greeley received 68,500 votes in 1872 and Grant 47,706 after the Texas election returns were tabulated.

In 1928, President Hoover received 367,036 votes and Alfred E. Smith, Democratic candidate for president, polled 341,032 in Texas. Tabulation of the election show 299 votes were cast for the Communist candidate and the Socialist candidate received 722 votes.

WHERE TAX DODGERS GO ON STRIKE

Chicago faces a strike of taxpayers. They owe in unpaid taxes \$200,000,000. A recent United States supreme court decision holding the assessment of taxes legal gave the city of Chicago authority to collect unpaid taxes. Well, the supreme court of the United States says the last word. Now the taxpayers may continue to strike.

A reminder that on the platform as shining ornaments when President Hoover made his Chicago speech were William Hale Thompson and Len Small. Thompson ruled Chicago 12 years as the high republican boss. When he was thrown out the city was bankrupt. Now he is the big republican boss once more on the outside looking in. He is backing Len Small, who is the republican nominee for governor. Well, who is Len Small? First, he was elected state treasurer of Illinois. He served several terms. He placed the taxpayers' money in pet banks. He collected the profits. Then he was elected governor of Illinois. Suit was brought for the collection of the money of the people. A republican supreme court of Illinois handed down the decision that Small was responsible for the money which failed to return to the strongbox of the state government. Now he is the G. O. P. nominee for mayor and Big Bill who wrecked the finances of Chicago is his chief pilot.

Why do all the pointing at Jimmy Walker? Why not take a potshot at Big Bill? Why not introduce in the picture of eminent reformers, Len Small, a banker-treasurer who knew where to place the people's money and where he thought the interest would do the most good?

14 WETS DEMOS IN CONGRESS RACE

According to the Woman's Organization for National Prohibition Reform, the poll the organization is conducting shows wet candidates for the 73rd congress exceed the dries 11 to 1. Replies are tabulated of 607 candidates from 43 states. Fourteen from Texas are listed as wets. According to the poll made public, the organization classified 553 of these replying as wet and 34 dry. It is said to be significant that 333 democrats are standing on their national plank while 135 republicans, avowed repealists, have parted with the republican restrictive plank.

They may be wet in Texas but how wet? There are many submissionists who are not wets. They are willing to submit the so-called "burning issue" to the voters of the 48 states. As revisionists but not repealers the showing may point to the modification of the Volstead act. Regardless of all this, it is a long road to Tipperary. All the democratic states of the South that batted four years ago are steadily democratic this year and there has been a remarkable change in the so-called pro sentiment in many of the commonwealths below the Mason and Dixon line. A presidential election has never been won until the votes have been counted. This for the guessers; this for the gamblers; this for the voters.

CHICAGO TAXPAYERS LOSE THEIR HIGH COURT APPEAL

Chicago property owners, contesting real estate taxes assessed by Cooke county for 1929, were given a solar plexus blow by the supreme court of the United States when that august tribunal refused to review the petition of 2500 real estate owners asking that the court pass on the assessment. Now the 2500 will be compelled to walk to the office of the tax collector of Cooke county and deposit the back tax money on the barrel head. It is possible to get blood out of a turnip—in Chicago.

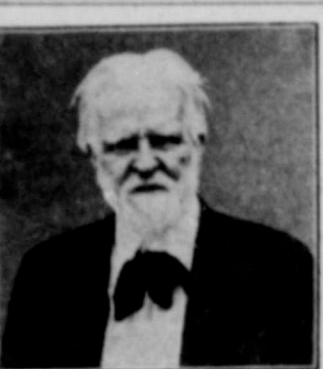

Happily for us, American husbands are good-natured martyrs. When informed there would be no dessert for dinner, they'd just grin and bear it.

But at last, the tyrant is giving the "human form divine" a chance. Curves are once more in fashion. In fact, in order to wear the new clothes, curves are really necessary.

And now's our chance to once again enjoy those delicious desserts. Here is a chocolate dessert recipe that will delight man, woman and child with its wholesome goodness and delicious flavoring:

Baked Chocolate Custard.

2 cups unweetened chocolate, cut in pieces
4 cups milk
4 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla.

Add chocolate to milk in double boiler and heat. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine eggs, sugar, and salt. Add chocolate mixture gradually, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Add vanilla. Pour into custard cups, place in pan of hot water, and bake in slow oven 40 minutes, or until knife inserted comes out clean. Chill. Serves eight.
