



Both Dr. Cornish and Archibald now are turning their attention to chemical structure of purified vitamins and expect to have this largely worked out within the com-

ing year.

As yet scientists have found no reliable test for a vitamin except by feeding it to an animal suffer-ing from a deficiency of that par-

ticular vitamin. At this stage enter the rats, the fore-runners of the new "synthetic" diet planned for the future. Not only are the rats used for experimental purposes given the most excellent care, but they are fed food more expensive than that served people in the best restaur-

The rat's "feeders" are chosen from the most proficient of the research workers.
