#### DISTRIBUTION OF CHRISTMAS CHEER IS COMING

Furthermore he said \* that \$160,400,000 would be used to purchase Christmas presents; \$123,000,000 for permanent investments or savings: \$48,000,000 to take care of year-end bills and other commitments; \$44,000,000 for taxes; \$26,000,000 for mortgage interest and similar charges; \$22,000,000 for insurance premiums; and the balance of \$9,000,000 for \* education, charity, travel, and similar purposes.






