Thanksgiving Day is truly an American religious festival. Other countries celebrate their New Year, Hallowe'en, and Christmas but only America has a day set aside each year upon which to give thanks for the blessings we have.

The Plymouth colony cele-brated the first Thanksgiving Day after the harvest in 1621, four young men having been sent hunting to provide for the feast. Such days were ap-pointed after this at different intervals, and for various objects in New England and New York.

Thanksgiving Day yearly, dur-ing the Revolutionary war: but from 1784 to 1789 there was no

national celebration of the fes-tival nor appointment of days. In 1784 a day of Thanksgiv-ing was set aside to celebrate the adoption of the constitu-tion. And in 1785, Thanksgiving was observed because of the suppression of a riot. For years Thanksgiving was mostly a New England custom, later spreading westward and southward, each state appointing its own

During the Civil war, procla mations for public thanksgiving were issued for 1862, 1863 and 1864, and since that time the day has regularly been appointed by the president of the United States and is usually the last Thursday in November.
