That was the issue as laid down today by B. F. Vance, state director of the Production and Marketing Administration. Vance urged all Texas cotton farmers to vote on December 15 in deciding The blizzard of which we were the issue, pointing out that every cotton farmer in the state will be affected by the outcome.

If cotton marketing quotas are approved by two-thirds of the cotton farmers in the U.S. voting in the referendum, this will be the situation, according to Vance.
